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Welcome

It has been another busy and successful year as we continue to strive to develop Football across the Army. This edition of The Soldiers' Game provides details of so many of the comprehensive achievements from Army Football over the past season.

The new 2018/19 season promises to be an extremely busy, but beneficial "campaign". I make no apologies for highlighting the 100th Anniversary of the end of the First World War. Just under 300 professional footballers (from the 40 or so professional clubs that existed) joined up and were killed in the Great War, several 1000s joined up and fought, and tens of 1000s of amateur players and fans joined up, fought and died – some in what were known as Football Battalions. Players like Captain Walter Tull from the Middlesex Regiment who played for Tottenham and Northampton Town, for example. On the home front, women not only played a crucial role supporting the war effort but also replaced men's football to keep the game alive and raised money for the casualties of war. At that time women's games attracted 40, 000 spectators and it is fabulous to see the women's game now starting to attract increasing levels of support again.

To mark this special year, Army Football are organising an ambitious commemoration project; likely to be the Army's largest outside of London. The project is called the Greatest Games of Remembrance. Working with our partners, the Woodland Trust, Royal British Legion, Never Such Innocence and National Football Museum, the event centres around a commemoration match day which will see the British Army (men and women) play the German Armed Forces in Nottingham on Thu 8 Nov 18. I have recently written to the chain of command to ask them for their support; to create a video tribute to the footballer/soldiers who may have joined their units in the First World War or who come from the teams that their soldiers support. The England team did their video at St George's Park prior to eparting for the World Cup and planted trees at St George's Park as part of the For Club and Country initiative with the National Football Museum.

The National Game is the Soldiers' Game. That is why Football is the most participatory sport in the Army; regular, reserve, men and women, all cap-badges and hundreds of units. We strive for success at the very highest levels of Army sport but we are equally driven by the need to make football accessible to all, safe, efficiently delivered, and contributing to the needs of the Army by developing your soldiers, maintaining morale, improving the opportunity for as many as possible, contributing to overseas engagement and supporting civil engagement. Football is also a gatekeeper to many people, networks, conversations and opportunities that other parts of the Army cannot easily reach; it is a powerful community engagement tool.

All that said, recognising our volunteers better is my number one message this year. As with all extra-curricular activities in the Army we utterly rely on volunteers to help make things happen. I am determined that those who volunteer to enable sport in the Army are recognised appropriately – whether trustees, organisers, managers, coaches, officials or players. I also conclude by thanking our valued sponsors, and, indeed, to our permanent football staff in Aldershot under the guidance of Billy Thomson.

Enjoy the season.

REME Corps Football Club

A challenging season for REME with a number of experienced players departing and then attempting to maintain consistency in team selection against the Corps' wide variety of commitments. Of note, Cpl Jason Silver, an Army striker, was posted to a phase one training regiment, thus limiting his time afforded to Corps football. This was having a profound impact on results with REME scraping the odd goal and not being able to kill games off. It was therefore no surprise that we found ourselves languishing near the foot of the table. The scene was set for a tough relegation battle in the Massey run-in, which would be decided in the final game of the Quadrangular Tournament.

Once again, player availability was an unwanted influence and resulted in 17yearold Cfn Bryn Beanage being propelled into team. From the off he stood out, with his quick feet posing real problems for the opposition. Without

doubt he will be a future star within the Corps and hopefully beyond.

The first game of the Quads was against an already relegated Royal Artillery side who had suffered a very disappointing season. What should have been a comfortable win for REME saw the Gunners one up at the turn, despite REME dominating possession. Frustrations abounded when REME had a goal disallowed with ten minutes to go and a requirement to gain 4 points from a tournament with strong Sapper and Signaller teams. The twist in the tale came in the 80th minute, when an opposition defender was sin binned and REME turned up the pressure equalising in the 89th minute. The climax was in the in the 93rd minute when a rash challenge resulted in the Gunner keeper bringing down striker Cpl Isaac Sands and another sin binning.LCpl Gav Meacham stepped up and effortlessly hit the back of the net; a crucial goal.

a stunning 20-yard volley, made it 2-0 after 20 minutes. By half time the Signals had pulled one back.

The second half started as the first left off with REME soaking up pressure before counter attacking at speed resulting in a second from an exuberant Crawford, which was immediately countered with a Signals goal. With 15 minutes remaining, the advancing Signals keeper fouled Meacham in the penalty area. Up stepped Crawford to claim his hat-trick which he did after his initial shot was saved. The game finished 4-2. Aside from the scorers an all-round team effort was rounded with spectacular performances. Despite constant pressure and a twenty-five yarder from Cfn Sean Thomson rattling the bar,REME were unable to get a result. Survival was now down to getting a point from the last game.

The final fixture of the Quads and the season pitched REME against the Royal Signals, who came into the game after

a convincing 4-1 win against the Royal Artillery. The scene was set with General Boyne present to witness the fixture named in his honour and present the trophy. The Signals had emphatically beaten REME 7-1 at Stafford earlier in the season. Requiring a draw to stay up – the pressure was on in this season defining fixture. From the off, REME stuck to the game plan and forced the Signals to either play or pass into wide areas. Notable performances from Cfn Adam Crawford whose incredible work-rate confounded the UK Armed Forces Centre half pairing he was up against. Crawford scored the first and Dec Shuttleworth, with



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Football in the Army Reserve

- Season Review by Major Steve Clout

The Season opened for the Army Reserve with the Challenge Cup winners 154 Regt RLC playing 1 Yorks in the Super Cup. The fixture, that sees the Army Reserve Unit Champions play the Army Champions, is in fifth year and the Army Reserve was yet to get its first win. This season was not to change that statistic with 1 Yorks getting an emphatic eight - nil victory.

The Army Reserve Challenge Cup entries have been growing over the last five years and this season we had a full draw with 32 units entering a team. The first round matches kicked off in September with the holders falling at the first hurdle. They were narrowly beaten by 6 SCOTS would go on to reach the final in April. Their opponent would be 152 (North Irish) Regt RLC in what was their fourth year in succession and the seventh time in eight years. The previous three years they had lost but 2018 was to be their year. They came out of the starting blocks determined to win and despite a valiant challenge from 6 SCOTS, 152 Regt RLC got their hands on the trophy.

This season has seen the Army Reserve Women's Team become a Representative

Team rather than a development squad, the focus has been to reduce the size of the squad, concentrate on developing a specific playing style, and become a more professional outfit. In addition fixtures were scheduled against a higher level of opposition in order to test the side, but also allow them to play at the right standard. This has without a doubt been an overall success with some outstanding performances, playing 7 games over the season winning 4 and losing 3. Highlights have seen the team challenge a number of the Corps sides this year, with success against the RLC in Aldershot in early February which saw a fantastic hat-trick from Pte Lauren Daley during the 7-1 win. A hard fought 3-0 win in March against the AMS when the team was invited to play in a charity match in aid of a former player

and in April the RE invited the side down to Chatham where the team ran out 2-0 winners. The training camp in Aldershot/ Berlin this year allowed the team to further develop playing against some very good sides, all of which highlighted areas within the side to move forward with. A very close game in Aldershot against Alton Ladies, fitness proving to be the difference saw the team start with a 5-2 win. Berlin was very different, the team needed to dig deep, defence was very much the focus against FC International and SV Blau Weiss BerolinaMitte, both of who ran out 4-0 winners. The season ended with participation in the Armed Forces day match against Llandudno Ladies who are currently playing in the Welsh Premier League.



Army Reserves

The men's season was hit by teams pulling out of fixtures, the weather and player availability. Although the team did strengthen with some new players at the trials the season really did not get started until May when they flew out to Cyprus. There they enjoyed four challenging fixtures interspersed with training and recovery sessions. Having played and trained in the Cyprus heat the team were able to adapt to the sunshine in Llandudno where they played the Welsh Premier League Team as part of the towns Armed Forces celebrations.

The Infantry added an Army Reserve 11-A-Side knockout competition this season which was won by 4 LANCS. In the summer 4 LANCS had won the AR 6's held in Grantham, made it to the semi-final of the AR Challenge but went one better by getting victory in the Infantry Cup which was played the same day as the Regular Final. The Infantry also won the inaugural Army Reserve Corps Championship. Seven Corps teams entered the competition that was held over a weekend in March.

We are currently looking forward to the Army Reserve 6's with 20 means teams and four Women's teams looking to challenge for their respective competition that will be held over an August weekend in Grantham. And then we are off again for another season.

Men

It has quite simply been a fantastic year. Our men's team won every trophy in-sight and has without doubt been the best team in the Army this year. An absolute clean sweep of six trophies including the Inter-Corps version of 'the treble'. The performance of the squad has been nothing short of magnificent. Resounding victories at crucial times saw the players' confidence rise and their ability to step-up their play to overwhelm opposition has resulted in 55 goals scored in a clean sweep and football of really impressive quality on a near consistent basis. That doesn't happen without having gifted coaches and our Corps is blessed in having SSgt Keith Stubbs (now a UEFA B qualified coach) and WO2 Al Brown getting the best out of our players. A very flattering score-line in extra time against a spirited and well organised AGC saw the Woolwich Cup retained in the Chatham Trophy Cabinet. This silverware was closely followed by the Vickers Trophy (v. RSIGNALS), the Phillips Trophy (v. REME), the Vickers Trophy (v. RA), the Quadrangular Cup and finally the coveted Massey League Division One Trophy; getting ahead of the impressive Royal Logistic team has been no mean feat. The season also saw the inclusion of several players into the Army and three into the UK Armed Forces Representative team (3RSME Regt's LCpl Cairney & Spr Stoneman and 101 Engr Regt's Spr Atkinson). Ten further players were awarded full Colours.

The Royal Engineer Association Football Club (RE AFC) was formed in 1863 and dominated the early years of the FA Challenge Cup, eventually winning the coveted trophy in 1875. Today the club is still going strong and has three main teams; Mens, Ladies and Veterans who all operate under a 'one club' concept. The RE AFC's objective remains to further increase the number playing 'The Soldiers' Game' (now at 621 soldiers and officers) and build an organisation within which representative teams can dominate inter-corps competitions. A big thanks must be directed towards Mid Kent College and TQ who as our Club sponsors play a large part in enabling this to happen.





Ladies

Our Ladies team has had its best season ever and when you consider that the Ladies set-up is only four years old, reaching the semi-final of their Cup competition and finishing fourth in the league is a significant achievement. The Ladies team coach, Cpl Matt Kenny (26 Engr Regt) has worked wonders for the Ladies because after their first win against the Royal Artillery in January, they did not lose a game for the rest of the season! We know his award for 'Contribution to Corps Sport' made by the Chief Royal Engineer at the Sapper Games was for more than getting them winning but Cpl Kenny's recognition is richly deserved! The team has gone from strength to strength and they now have a robust depth to the squad which is essential for when people can not be released for matches. The season has also seen some outstanding individual performances, most notably LCpl Derbyshire for setting a goals scored record and for also for winning both Manager's and Players' Player of the Year, and for Spr Weston getting selected for the Ladies UK Armed Forces team. Four players were awarded Corps Colours, including the first female Officer (Capt Ruth Breslin, 22 Engr Regt) and first female Reservist (LCpl Sarah Abraham, 75 Engr Regt). We have CAMUS and the AAC as part of club and so it was great to see our goalkeeper Musn Cat Christie be awarded Corps Colours. Fittingly, the final award of Colours went to our captain and leader, LCpl Annalise Ryan, 33 Engr Regt.





Veterans

Two cancellations of fixtures (against the Police and Fire Service) saw the Veterans team eager for a game which was played on the traditional RE AFC Reunion FA Cup Final Day. A result saw the visitors "Upton Park Football Club" raise the Generation Cup for the 3rd successive time. The match is always played in good spirits and is greatly valued by both clubs. The fixture also marked the farewell to our long standing RE AFC President, Colonel Andy Phillips who captained the Sappers for the final time as a serving Officer. After 32 years with the RE AFC as Guard of Honour on the Corps' No1 Pitch it was a fitting way to bid farewell to a mainstay of football in the Corps Though still in the discussion phase there is a plan to establish a small group of "Serving Veteran Teams" which would allow several games to be played over a season.

Regimental

The popularity and quality of Regimental football is also fantastic to see. Three interunit competitions took place this year and a different unit won each tournament. Preseason saw 32 Engr Regt win the Sapper Sixes. We use this event to spot developing talent and eight new players represented the Men's Corps team this season as a result (Spr Redmund Cockburn, 26 Engr Regt being the star breakthrough player of the year). If we can develop your potential, you'll get a Corps shirt on your back - it's that simple. Every unit (Regular and Reserve) entered the Sapper Cup for the first time in manu years and 1RSME Regt came out victorious in a tough match against 101 Engr Regt (EOD). At the end of the season, in glorious Scottish sunshine, 21 Engr Regt won the football at the Sapper Games in Kinloss. In addition, 3RSME Regt flew the Sapper flag in the Army Cup reaching the final but were sadly defeated 2-1 by a strong 1YORKS side. The days of a single unit housing all of our footballing talent are long gone. The quality of football in the Corps at unit level is truly impressive.



Overseas Tour to Florida

The culmination of the season was a joint club tour for both the Men's and Ladies teams to the United States of America. Each side was due to play three games however our tour coincided with a tropical storm that reduced games to two for each team. The ambitious tour was a resounding success, recognised by the Army FA who have invited the RE AFC to the Army FA



All 44 participants performed brilliantly over the four games and displayed excellent dedication and focus. Most rewarding for the coaches and management was the success of joint training and the simple desire to get on and learn and play well. The participating personnel consisted of male and female officers, regular male and female soldiers and reserve male and female soldiers; one Army, one club. Touring costs money and so a huge thank you to the Army Sports Control Board and the Corps Sports Control Board for your

contributions that enabled us to make our #onecluboneconcept work.

Preparations are already underway for the 2018/19 season with the RE Sixes competition being held on Wed 12 Sept 18. With the continued support of our units and hard work from our players we are very optimistic about what next season will bring!

Army Crusaders is the Army Officer Corps' representative football team. Formed in 1922 it consists of a First Team and a Veterans (Over 35s) Team. Both teams remain alive and well, continuing to thrive.

Successes this season include a mixed First and Veterans team winning the annual Liverpool Easter Tournament which consists of 2 full games played on Good Friday and Easter Saturday with the eventual winners being those who score the most goals; thus encouraging attacking football

The tournament is hosted by Liverpool Ramblers who have a long history and appeared in the very first FA Cup. Army Crusaders have been ever present for the 63 years this tournament has been held, last winning in 2007 so this was a long overdue repeat victory.

Army Crusaders traditionally play Ramblers in the first game of the tournament and this year were boosted by a younger attendance than usual with a number of recent RMAS Graduates turning out. This made a huge difference and the first game was won 7-1 meaning a 3-0 win in the second would provide overall victory. This was achieved in a nervy second game against much stronger opposition and the Boot Trophy was awarded as shown in the below picture.

A prior success for the Veterans started the

season off well – winning the triangular AGC / RAF ICARUS / Army Crusaders tournament in September at Aldershot. The first game was a 1-1 draw with ICARUS but the second was a resounding 7-2 win against AGC. This was after being runaway winners of the West London Veterans League (WLVFL) Division One and promotion to the Premiership; where we maintained mid table mediocrity this season. Capt Jamie Lynch was awarded the League Top Scorer with 14 goals.

The First Team had mixed fortunes this season; unbeaten before Christmas but tailing off mainly due to inability to raise a side, often due to short notice withdrawals. There was however, the opportunity for a premier event with a game versus Price Waterhouse Cooper (PWC) who had recently won the Industry Cup. This took place at the less than salubrious Wormwood Scrubs ground but resulted in a well earned 3-1 win

Going forward the aim is for the First Team to go back to its roots by reaching out to UOTCs in order to energise the fixture list. This would also adhere to the Raison D'être of Crusaders to publicise the Club and offer recruiting opportunities.

Looking ahead a Crusaders mixed team plan to once again play the UK Parliamentary FC in a Game of Truce in support of ABF – The Soldiers Charity. This will replicate the game of 2015 played at London's Burton Court in front of a less than partisan local schools crowd

This is also Army Crusaders' year to conduct an Overseas Tour and this will take place late September / early October in USA with games against USMC, LAPD and a BAFTA XI in Los Angeles with a 4th game against local opponents to be played in Las Vegas.

A vote of thanks must go to the retiring Brigadier Steve Vickery who has stepped down as President of Army Crusaders. The new President is former Chairman Colonel Colin Francis with Colonel Dave Jones stepping into the Chairman's role. The First Team Manager is Major Ali Beard whilst the Secretary and Veterans Team Manager remains Major Andy Campbell should anyone wish to engage / enrol with Army Officer's Football?

Former European Cup winner and Nottingham Forest legend John McGovern was our guest for the day too and presented medals at the Men and Women Cup Finals in the afternoon.


Special emphasis was also provided for the forthcoming Games of Remembrance matches being played on Thursday 8 November in nearby Nottingham.





ARMY FA SOUTHERN LEAGUE



1. INTRODUCTION

The Army FA Southern League season runs in line with the Army FA's Forecast of Events to encompass both a regional league and Major & Minor Units Knockout Cup Competition.

2. BACKGROUND

The league and cup competitions are contested between Units that fall under the UK South Regional Points of Commands¹ structure encompassing both Major and Minor Units. This allows a competitive approach whilst reducing the T&S burden.

This ensured both teams could still play the fixture and encouraged the 'Sport for All' message.

6. All eight divisions saw a huge amount of competitiveness and all matches were

3. The 2017/18 season ran from 4 Sep 17 through to the 30 Apr 18. The league included 70 teams whilst the Knockout Cup had a total of 63 teams². The Regional Six-A-Side Competition saw 22 male teams enter with 4 qualifying for the Army Six-A-Side Competition.

4. LEAGUE

The Army FA Southern League Structure comprised of 7 divisions, this was to standardise the division size³ and also include LONDIST teams. The league was then split into 3 sub-regions⁴. The breakdown of the divisions was:

- a.Central Premier 7 teams.
- b.Central Division 1 9 teams.
- c.Western Premier 9 teams.
- d. Western Division 1 10 teams.
- e.Western Division 2 9 teams.
- f. Western Division 3 10 teams.
- g.Eastern Premier 8 teams.

- 5. The divisions ran themselves; Units arranged fixtures and booked referees for all their matches through the Regional Referees' Secretary. We had, on occasions fixtures that couldn't be facilitated by an appointed referee, however locally sourced and qualified referees where used at the acknowledgment of the Referees' Secretary. This ensured both teams could still play the fixture and encouraged the 'Sport for All' message.

- 7. The Western Premier Division saw 1 YORKS secure the league title to accompany their success with winning the Army Challenge Cup Major Units 2-1 against 3 RSME, yet another successful season for the Battalion. As 1 YORKS won the Premier League it was 19 RA came out as Western Division 1 Champions. The second and third divisions of the Western Region were won by 4 REME and 11 Sigs B side respectively. In the Central Divisions, the premier league was won bu the 3 RSME who finished runners up in the Army Challenge Cup Major Units. The Central Division 1 League was secured by ATR W who finished up runners up in the Army Challenge Cup Minor Units losing to ARMCEN in the final. The inaugural Eastern Division (that was made up of LONDIST teams and teams in the Kent area) was won by 1 RSME Regt who have retained the title for yet another season.

- **9.** This competition was a fitting way to end an extremely successful season.
- 10. Knockout Cup. The Army FA Southern League Knockout Cup was in 2 parts; Major and Minor Units. Units competed against one another throughout the season⁵ culminating in the finals that were held on 11 Apr 18 at the Aldershot Military Stadium.
- **11.** Minor Unit Final. The Minor Unit final was played between 47 Regt RA and ATR W. This was a return fixture after ATR W defeated 47 RA in the Army Challenge Cup Minor Units semi-final. This time 47 Regt RA became victorious by putting in an extremely professional performance, with the final result finishing 2-1.
- 12. Major Unit Final. The Major Unit Final saw 1 YORKS face 11 SIGS. Albeit a weakened 11 SIGS side, they still put in a sterling first half performance. 1 YORKS began to dominate, starting to gain significant advantage and eventually ran out as comfortable winners, with the final score being 5-0. Congratulations to 1 YORKS.
- 13. Unit League Champions. The identification of the Army Unit League Champions was to ensure each region had a representative team to go forward and challenge against other regions to earn the prestige title of Army Unit League Champions. Within the UK South region it was decided that the Winners of the Western Premier Division, winners of the Central Premier Division, winners of the Eastern Premier Division and the highest league points scoring team in the other divisions would enter a semi-final and final to overall determine the UK South Unit League Champions. The competition comprised of 1 YORKS, 3 RSME, 1 RSME and ATR W. After one fiercely fought semi-final between 1 YORKS and 3 RSME, the final comprised of 3 RSME and ATR W. 3 RSME after recovering from the Army Challenge Cup Major Units final disappointment and defeating 1 YORKS

Spr Sam Atkinson then smashed one in from range before Luke Noble grabbed a second with on the rebound from his own strike. Wakely wrapped things up for the Army with his hattrick finish from a couple of yards out. The Navy grabbed a late consolation goal, but the Mercury Cup was firmly in the hands of the Army Skipper when the final whistle blew. Army 7 Navy 3.

RAF v Army

Just a week later the Army travelled to Shrewsbury to meet the RAF at their adopted home ground, Shrewsbury Town FC. The RAF started well and early signs were that the Army would be in for a tough evening. 10 minutes into the game a tough challenge from LCpl Ryan Paddock R SIGNALS, was judged to be a foul by the referee and the RAF had their first real opportunity. They took it, a great strike from the edge of the box saw the RAF go 1-0 up, game on! The response was swift, with Sig Luke Noble showing his pace and storming into the box to smash one off the post, Wilkinson was quickest to react and

volleyed in from 10 yards, 1-1. 10 minutes on and the RAF had a stroke of luck as the referee judged that the Army skipper had pulled the RAF Centre Forward to the floor inside the box. The cheers of the RAF crowd were guickly silenced as LCpl Luke Cairney RE threw himself across his goal to pull off an outstanding save, which ultimately changed the game. The next break for the Army saw Wakely ghost past his defender and square the ball for Wilkinson to collect his second with another good finish. The game had barely restarted when Noble showed his pace once again, outstripping the recovering defenders to finish with some style. 3-1 to the Army at the break.

The second half became a war of attrition, the RAF huffed and puffed but couldn't break down an Army side now brimming with confidence and despite their best effort the tie was sealed with only minutes to go when LCpl Sean Woolley RLC broke down the right and placed an inch perfect cross on the head of the late runner, LCpl Pete Williams R SIGNALS, who nodded home inside the 6 yard box. The Final whistle went and a jubilant Army side celebrated their 3rd Constantinople Cup in a row.

11 goals for and four against in both fixtures, worthy winners.

The Army Team had also entered the Aldershot Senior Cup and after waiting 5 months to play our 2nd round fixture we tore our way through Godalming Town, Fleet Town and Eversley/California, which put us into the Final; however, a fixture clash on the projected date meant we had to withdraw from the Competition.

That said it was another fantastic Season, resulting in the Army picking up The Mercury Cup (Navy), the Carrington Cup (RAF), the Southern Counties Championship and the Constantinople Cup(Inter Service Cup)



BUILDING BRIDGES:

Manchester United Experience Army Life

Pre-season training is often a time to forget for footballers, dominated by high-intensity sessions designed to get players back to a high level of fitness quickly.

Not so for the professionals of Manchester United Women's Team. Reformed after a long absence, the Red Devils took on the challenge of the British Army just days before they played a historic fixture against local North West rivals - Liverpool.

In an event designed to build team cohesion and communication, the team visited Fulwood Barracks in Preston where they met their Army counterparts.

The Army Women's Football Team hosted a variety of challenges designed to test their own players just as much as their guests.

Leadership events such as a gun run adapted to include an oil barrel, two large tires and a log for the gun – were accompanied by the challenge of extracting equipment from a cordoned off area before an assault course awaited both teams.

As the challenges got underway it did not take long for the professional nature of all the footballers to shine through as Corporal Nikki O'Donnell from the Army Women's Football Team and Royal Military Police explained:

"The characteristics of both sides were very similar, team comradery comes on different levels and we can boost team cohesion through other avenues other than just football."

As well as providing physical and mental challenges, the day was also a chance for both teams to gain an appreciation of each other's daily routine.

The side from Manchester was given the opportunity to learn about the everyday life of the Army soldiers' - while also experiencing how they integrate football with the Operational needs of the service.
