

Chief Executive's Report

Since the impact of Covid-19, it has been an exceptionally challenging period for grassroots football in Essex, and for wider society. As we entered into January 2020, I think very few people could have predicted the position we find ourselves in today and the impact Covid-19 had in bringing many sectors of society to a standstill, including the grassroots football sector.

Before Covid-19, we were on-course for another successful season as well as looking forward to the inspirational prospect of Euro 2020 and the positive impact major tournaments can have on participation at the grassroots level.

Then, in March, the terrible impact of the pandemic hit, and our focus and thoughts turned to everyone who has been affected during this time. It is also important to acknowledge the NHS staff and key workers throughout this period and the tremendous work they have undertaken.

During this period, we have had to take some very difficult decisions to help balance the financial position of the organisation. It was well documented that Covid-19 had a significant blow on The FA's finances where it was disclosed The FA planned for £300 million of losses up to 2024. This, naturally, had an impact on the funding distributed down to County FAs.

However, the financial position of the association has served it well during this period and allowed the Essex County FA to continue to focus on serving its members and trying to support the many thousands of volunteers and players across the game to come back to the game when it was able to return.

This was demonstrated with the decision to offer free affiliation, along with a 100% contribution for Public Liability Insurance and 50% towards Personal Accident Insurance for the 2020/21 season for our members.

Despite the challenging climate that we have been in, the grassroots football workforce has shown tremendous resilience, and commitment, to respond to the ever-evolving and changing situation around Covid-19, to be able to provide the opportunity for players of all ages to participate in the game.

Credit, rightly, goes to everyone behind the scenes at club and league committee level involved in making that happen, as well as the coaches, volunteers, parents, referees and stakeholders.

Progress also continued in the delivery of our 'Moving Forward Strategy 2018-21' and at the heart of our strategy is our vision of "Creating a united grassroots football environment which delivers football opportunity for all".

We are now approaching the end of this three-year strategic plan but what has been achieved during this period gives a strong foundation to build upon towards 2024. Our strategic objectives were set out in four Strategic Pillars:

Engagement: 'To develop new and enhance existing offers to engage all stakeholders and formats of the game by putting the participants' needs at the heart of the game'

Engagement with our stakeholders, and the ability to grow and utilise modern communication platforms to engage with more participants, has been vital. During this period we have grown our Twitter following to nearly 26,000, making the Essex County FA the most followed County FA in the country.

As well as this, Essex regularly achieved the most engagements in the country to the FA National Grassroots Survey in successive years which, in turn, has allowed us to listen to the feedback and adapt services to meet the needs of stakeholders.

Our network of clubs and leagues has been critical in the process of engagement and, through our award-winning Club and League Participation Reviews, we have been able to utilise data and insight to help inform clubs and leagues with their own decision-making to help engage more participants.

Overall, this has contributed to an 8% increase in the number of teams playing football, with nearly 4,700 teams playing football across Essex.

<u>Corporate Governance:</u> 'To be an inclusive, accountable and transparent decision-making organisation to develop, safeguard and support football'

Our work in this pillar has focused on our progress towards achieving Tier 3 status of Sport England's Code of Governance and, more recently, The FA's Code of Governance for County FAs (which you can see at http://bit.ly/CFACOG).

This work underpins all aspects of the organisation and changes to the Essex County FA Articles of Association have seen the Board increase in size from five directors to nine. There is also a new open application process in place for Independent Non-Executive Directors (INEDS) to come directly onto Board, helping to enhance skills, knowledge and experience at Board level.

This allows for more business skills to be married with the football knowledge within the organisation, maximising the impact of the County FA and helping ensure good governance practices are in place.

This has led to four new INEDS or Board Advisors coming onto the Board, as well as the reinvigoration of our Inclusion Advisory Group (IAG), with new members and a new IAG Chair who links directly into the Essex County FA Board of Directors, ensuring equality and inclusion matters are represented at the highest levels of decision-making.

Progress has been made on our application for the Intermediate Status of the Equality Standard, which is on-track for submission in June. The Board also welcomed a new Chair in Andy Chaplin, who was appointed at the end of the 2019/20 season to lead the Board going into the 2021/22 season and beyond.

Business: 'To develop a sustainable business model that promotes innovation and continuous improvement, attracting inward investment'

The Covid-19 pandemic, and cuts in FA funding, have placed pressure on the income streams of the business but, despite this, the business has remained in a very strong and secure position. We continue to undertake prudent financial management and budget-planning across all our financial investments whilst maintaining high levels of service towards grassroots football.

We have also developed strong partnerships with outside organisations which have helped to drive inward investment, both into the Essex County FA, but also into grassroots football.

The securing of funding from the Football Foundation towards the development of the FA Parklife Scheme at Parsloes Park, in partnership with the London Borough of Barking &

Dagenham, has led to circa £8 million of investment allocation into new football facilities in the borough.

Operations: 'To be the strategic lead for football in Essex'

Each department has a specific department-focused strategy which drives the day-to-day and season-by-season activity of the department. The focus across each department has been to use data and insight to drive decision-making. Our growth since 2018 in specific areas has been significant despite the Covid-19 impact going into the 2021/22 season:

- the male pathway has had a 7% growth in youth football, 3% in open-age, 7% in veterans football and a 26% growth in Walking Football
- the female pathway had had a growth of 56% in youth football and 19% in open-age, as well as more than 80 Wildcats centres being delivered across the county
- the disability pathway has had a 12% growth in youth and 5% in open-age
- at the end of the 2019/20 season, the number of referees had grown by 5% and, within that, included an increase in referees from ethnically diverse communities and the number of female referees
- our Coach Education Department delivered a high-quality programme, engaging more than 2,000 learners on an annual basis
- our Safeguarding Department continued to ensure a safe environment for grassroots football as we continue to achieve the FA Safeguarding Operating Standard
- our Governance Department continued to support the rollout of technology through player registration, where we are now at almost 100% player registration coverage

These represent an example of some of the progress made, but there is more detail contained within this report highlighting the excellent work which has taken place within each department.

THE BOARD

Wayne Deller remained as Chairman for the 2019/20 season, with Barry Fitzgerald, Andrew Chaplin, Dave Emerton and Toyin Higgs beginning the season as the Directors of the Essex County FA, along with the Board continuing to oversee all matters of company operations.

However, in March 2020, Toyin Higgs resigned from her role as the Essex County FA's first Independent Director. Toyin's work commitments, which saw her take on a role with The FA, meant she was unable continue to provide full commitment to her role on the Board with the Essex County FA.

Although only a relatively short period on the Board, Toyin helped support the organisation to continue to develop, with a specific focus on safeguarding, and the Essex County FA wished her well in her new role.

Due to the impact of Covid-19 the Board elections due in May were delayed, taking place in July 2020. These elections saw Wayne Deller step down from his role as Chairman and Andy Chaplin was appointed as the new Chair of the Essex County FA to lead the Board going into the 2021/22 season and beyond.

Andy considered the appointment a true honour, saying: "Having served on the Board for the last four years, I've been involved in supporting the creation of our Moving Forward Strategy. I know, in Brendan [Walshe], we have a forward-looking Chief Executive and excellent and knowledgeable staff who are ensuring we, as an organisation, are delivering on the strategy's key objectives."

"As Chairman, this continues to be my key focus and making sure that, as a Board, we help to continue to drive forward for the benefit of football across Essex. Becoming Chairman is a great accolade, and is probably one of my proudest achievements to take a key role, alongside the CEO, staff and my fellow Board Members, in supporting the Association in these difficult times."

Although Wayne stepped down as Chairman, he was re-appointed as a Director along with-Barry Fitzgerald. There was also a new appointment onto the Board to fill the vacancy left by Touin Higgs, and Sheryl MacRae was appointed as Director.

The work around the FA Code of Governance for County FAs also saw changes to the Articles which would lead to an increase from five to seven Directors going into the 2020/21 season.

COUNCIL

Wayne Deller continued as Chairman of the Council for the 2019/20 season. There were also a number of positions which were due for elections on Council.

The following individuals were re-elected onto Council: Barry Fitzgerald (Group 4 Open-Age), Kevin Curran (Group 3 Open-Age), Kim Farmer (Women's & Girls Football). Graham Hall also continued to serve as the Essex County Schools FA Representative.

In addition to these re-appointments, Craig Pullen resigned as the Essex Referees Association Representative and was replaced by Andy French, who joined Council in March 2020.

The volunteer Council Members again undertook their regulatory and management role and they were involved in many Council, disciplinary, refereeing, competitions and rules meetings throughout the 2019/20 season.

STAFFING

By the end of the 2019/20 season, the County FA employed 26 members of staff - 23 full time and three part time. In addition, we continue to have around 70 casual employees who carry out coaching, tutoring and physiotherapy roles.

There were some staff changes during the 2019/20 season which saw James Ellis depart to explore new opportunities outside of the football sector.

There were also a number of new recruits to the Essex County FA throughout the season, with Beth Morrell as Football Development Administrator, Karl Sear as Senior Football Development Officer, Cairo Duncan as Investigations Officer and Jake Ling as Football Development Officer.

FA Referee Courses

This year we recruited and trained 302 trainee referees (formerly known as Level 9s) from across Essex, who all successfully qualified over the 14 FA Referee Courses held.

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FA Referee Course

During the 2019/20 season, 302 learners were trained to become a referee over the 14 FA Referee Courses we delivered across the county, utilising the following venues: Writtle University College (Chelmsford), Wickford Town FC (Basildon), Forest Row Centre (Havering), University of Essex (Colchester), Thorpe Hall School (Southend-on-Sea), Philip Morant School (Colchester).

Unfortunately, two FA Referee Courses were postponed due to Covid-19, which had 48 learners due to attend across both courses, utilising the following venues: Wickford Town FC (Basildon), Frenford Clubs (Ilford).

FA Futsal Referee Course

With the continued growth of Futsal in Essex, we delivered another FA Futsal Referee Course to support this. 13 learners were trained at the University of Essex (Colchester) in refereeing Futsal.

Refereeing Walking Football Workshop

Walking Football is a fairly new and fast-developing format of football. In partnership with the Essex Walking Football League, we delivered a Refereeing Walking Football Workshop, at which 13 learners attended Beauchamps High School (Basildon) to be upskilled in refereeing this format.

County Cups 2019/20

Following very careful consideration of all factors involved, the Essex County FA Board of Directors made the exceptionally difficult decision to conclude all of the 2019/20 season's County Cup competitions at the point the Covid-19 suspension of football commenced.

Essex Clubs in National Competitions 2019/20

The Covid-19 pandemic had a large influence on national football competitions, with the Football League and National League concluding their season via a points-per-game formula and records expunged at Steps 3-6 of the National League System, affecting Essex clubs in the Isthmian, Essex Senior and Eastern Counties Leagues.

Southend United's four-year stay in EFL League One ended with a miserable campaign which saw the Shrimpers record just four league wins. The Blues were situated in 22nd place when the season was suspended on 13th March, and their relegation was confirmed on 9th June when clubs voted to end the incomplete season.

Points-per-game was also used in League Two, where a final regular-season match victory over Carlisle United meant **Colchester United** qualified for the play-offs. The U's defeated Exeter City 1-0 in the semi-final first-leg at the Community Stadium but suffered an extra time defeat at St James' Park to bow out 3-2 on aggregate.

In the National League, **Dagenham & Redbridge** finished in 17th place, whilst **Chelmsford City** were the highest-placed Essex club in the National League South in tenth. **Concord Rangers** and **Billericay Town** were 16th and 17th whilst **Braintree Town** finished 21st. There was no relegation from the National League South.

The plaudits in the FA Cup were undoubtedly earned by eighth-tier **Maldon & Tiptree**. The Jammers famously defeated League Two side Leyton Orient 2-1 at Brisbane Road in the First Round Proper before suffering a narrow 1-0 home defeat to Newport County in a televised tie at the next stage. Sixth-tier **Billericay Town** also lost 4-0 at League Two Forest Green Rovers in the First Round.

There remained the prospect of some Essex success in the FA Trophy as **Concord Rangers** reached the final of the 2019/20 competition. The Beachboys defeated Halesowen Town in a one-legged semi-final in September to set-up a clash against Harrogate Town, now in the Football League, at Wembley Stadium.

Three Essex clubs reached the Third Round Proper of the FA Vase. 1984 winners **Stansted** lost 4-0 at Stowmarket Town and FC Clacton narrowly failed to match their best ever run in the competition as they were edged out 2-1 at home to Eynesbury Rovers, whilst **Stanway Rovers** took Woodbridge Town to a replay before suffering a 4-0 defeat at The Hawthorns.

Colchester United retained Essex interest in the FA Youth Cup for the longest before suffering an injury-time 4-3 defeat to Oxford United in the Second Round Proper. Three non-league clubs reached the First Round Proper: Aveley losing 1-0 at Croydon, Bowers & Pitsea being edged out 2-1 at AFC Sudbury and Brentwood Town going out 5-1 at Broadhall Way against academy outfit Stevenage.

In the FA Women's Cup there was an historic run to the Fourth Round Proper for **Billericay Town** before an agonising penalty shootout defeat to FA Women's Championship club Lewes. Billericay beat Dartford, Harlow Town, Woodlands, Gillingham and Actonians to reach the last 32.





Coaches

As with all departments across the association, the 2019/20 season was unlike any other for the Coach Education team.

The season started well, with plans to deliver the most extensive course and workshop offer to date. Following a review of the previous season, we moved to releasing our courses in more regular intervals throughout the year, which led to a more fluid offer for busy volunteers and clubs alike.

Thanks to a supportive network of facility providers, and our dedicated tutor workforce, we were also able to enhance the variety of course formats offered. In total, eight Monday evening FA Level 1 courses were delivered, as well as five in a weekday format, servicing close to 240 volunteers.

A shortfall in courses was identified in previous seasons, particularly in our London Boroughs, and in the Thurrock local authority. We increased delivery in these areas, to help meet the needs of local clubs and volunteers.

Feedback remained very positive from learners, with emphasis upon course content, delivery and organisation. Quotes from our learners can be found elsewhere in this section. It's been fantastic to hear how these courses have positively impacted so many individuals and clubs across the county.

Despite the challenges of the second half of the season, we were determined to continue offering learning opportunities for our valued volunteer workforce. We began work on assembling an online offer for coaches, which included live webinars and pre-recorded interview content.

Our Essex County FA YouTube channel was updated with 'coaching playlists' to store this material, making this accessible to a wider community of coaches.

Continuing our focus on supporting youth teams to have a qualified coach, the 2019/20 season ended with 91% of youth teams meeting this criteria.

Coaching Support

In addition to the formal FA qualifications, we also encouraged coaches to access a wide range of free resources and support. Face-to-face and online support was offered throughout the season to ensure learning and development opportunities were readily available.

Once again, these events were well-attended, with over 600 individuals accessing these opportunities, as well as many others viewing the recorded content online. The 2019/20 season also saw a series of 'showcase' coaching events, aimed at engaging and supporting a wider audience.

Guests included: Graeme Carrick (FA Technical Lead - Youth Development Phase), Gary Piggott (FA County Coach Developer), Steve Bartlett (Head of Coaching at Leyton Orient FC), Dr Anna Stodter (Senior Lecturer in Sports Coaching & PE at Anglia Ruskin University), Tom Hartley (Senior Coach Developer at UK Coaching), Jon Whittingham (England Partially Sighted Team Manager), Tom Weal (Head of Academy Goalkeeping at Norwich City FC).

May 2020 saw the beginning of a new 'Coach Interview Series' feature, aimed at providing insight into the various journeys of Essex-based coaches. We were fortunate to welcome a range of guests to share their experiences, including: Emma Burden (Essex County FA Football Development Officer), Ashley Ward (White Roding Veterans FC), Neal Akhtar (Head of Youth Football, Frenford YFC).

FA Coach Mentor Programme

In the first half of the 2019/20 season, the programme continued to provide on-the-ground support to a wide range of coaches and clubs across Essex. The move to introduce 'project leads' in the 2018/19 season paid dividends and allowed targeted support to be offered, particularly to those working in underrepresented areas of the game. Projects included:

- Girls and Women: increased mentor hours were assigned to Wildcats Centres and clubs establishing new female teams. 16 learners from a female FA Level 1 course were also offered follow-up sessions and support
- Soccability League: support for coaches, following on from a successful FA Level 1 course
- Diversity & Inclusion: targeted mentor support for Frenford YFC, a proactive club in the heart of Redbridge who are passionate about developing their workforce and providing opportunities for young people

Unfortunately, due to the impact of Covid-19 and subsequent restructuring at The FA, the Coach Mentor programme ended in April 2020. Since its inception in 2013, hundreds of volunteer coaches across Essex have benefited from the support and expert guidance of our mentor team.

We hope many more coaches will continue to benefit from the legacy of this work, through the experienced and knowledgeable workforce across the county. We'd like to take this opportunity to thank the fantastic team of FA Coach Mentors, who provided an invaluable resource to coaches across Essex.

Mini-Soccer

Mini-soccer within Essex has grown by 5.1% (68 teams) during the 2019/20 season to 1,380 affiliated teams, representing 45% of youth football teams across the county.

Each age group experienced growth in team numbers from the 2018/19 season, with an average growth of 5.1% at each age group, the largest growth being at Under 10s with an increase of 8.1% (28 teams).

Six of the seven youth leagues who offer provision for mini-soccer teams experienced growth in membership numbers across at least one age group, with the biggest being 11.11% (25 teams) by the Brentwood Community Football Alliance Youth League, across all their mini-soccer age groups.

As part of our support to our affiliated clubs, we delivered four Foundation Phase Workshops, covering all the key regional group areas to offer bespoke learning and Continuing Professional Development (CPD) to our clubs and coaches working within the early stages of a player's journey. This ensured they can develop grassroots football at the earliest ages.

Youth Football

In the 2019/20 season, youth football approximately represented 77% of the County FA's overall affiliation. With twelve age groups from Under 7s to 18s, there were 3,038 teams affiliated, representing an increase from the previous season of 4.14% (121 teams).

More specifically in the Under 11s to 18s category of youth football, there was a 3.3% (53 teams) growth from the previous season. Notably, 62% of those age groups specifically experienced growth in team numbers and player participation.

The largest increase was seen within the Under 17s age group, where an increase of 57% (32 teams) was recorded. This is further demonstrated by the 1% of growth within the youth leagues across the county.

Saturday Open-Age

Work continued with adult football providers across Essex to slow the decline in team numbers. Bespoke league reports were produced and shared with our respective Saturday leagues to provide them valuable insight on club, team, and player data.

This ensured they had accurate and relevant information to inform strategic decisions and future planning. Notably, from the reports, there has been an increase in representation by the 18-21-year-old and the 22-25-year-old age categories in Saturday football, which equates to 49% of the format's participation.

This growth has seen the Saturday open-age leagues tailor their communications and developments to this growing target audience to provide the best environments possible.

Sunday Open-Age

Like open-age Saturday football, the decline rate has continued to decrease relating to team numbers.

Four Sunday leagues within the county showed a team increase in the 2019/20 season. Player registration data shows that 76% of all Sunday open-age players are aged between 18-30.

Veterans Football

Veterans football in Essex has experienced a 3% (five teams) growth during the 2019/20 season, now with a total of 165 teams playing across the county.

In Essex, the three veterans' leagues have demonstrated sustainability within their team numbers across the Moving Forward Strategy. The Essex Veterans League experienced growth for the 2019/20 season, and now represents 70% of the teams affiliated.

Walking Football

Walking Football in Essex has positively grown season-upon-season, and increased the number of teams affiliated by 20, from the 2016/17 season when affiliation began recording the data.

More recently, the growth within Walking Football teams up to the 2019/20 season has increased by 15% (up five teams) from 2018/19. Walking Football in Essex is widely represented across the county and the Essex Walking Football League continues to provide a competitive environment for the format.

Recreational

Throughout the 2019/20 season, there were 21 Just Play Centres across the county which were providing opportunities for male players (13 open-age, 2 Futsal, 6 Walking Football, 1 veterans).

The Just Play programme facilitates recreational opportunities on an informal basis which allows grassroots football to connect with local communities.

Clubs

FA Charter Standard accreditation is becoming ever-popular to clubs and leagues across Essex, with more and more clubs and leagues expressing an interest in ensuring they are providing a safe, fun and inclusive environment.

All 233 Charter Standard clubs who were required to complete an Annual Health Check in season 2019/20 retained accreditation status, demonstrating that The FA's Whole Game System is becoming a very user-friendly administrative tool for volunteers in the game.

The Charter Standard Club criteria remained, and there have been no changes for the season. All Coach Education qualifications and the Annual Health Check now fall in-line with one another and Charter Standard clubs were still eligible for a bursary to reduce the price of coaching courses. The Charter Standard Adult percentage increased from 33.6% to 35.34%.

Some of the clubs who have joined the club accreditation scheme in season 2019/20 include: Notley Youth, Harlow Town Youth, Pitsea Athletic Youth, Sands United Essex, Romford Youth and Lawford Ladies.

Leagues across the county continue to work with the Essex County FA Development Team to reach the accreditation level in order to increase sustainability, professionalism and the overall environment they are providing to their member clubs.

To ensure we are providing stakeholders with relevant strategic guidance, we began the production of Club Reports to our 68 biggest clubs across the county. Those clubs with 20+ teams will receive a data report providing insight into their volunteer workforce, affiliation data, community engagement and social value.

Both Hutton Youth and Heybridge Swifts have been a part of The FA's Club Improvement Programme where they have had direct one-to-one support with an FA Club Consultant and access to various online support platforms, supporting the development and longevity of the club.







Female Pathway

Mini-Soccer

Both the Essex County Girls' League and the Brentwood Community Football Alliance Youth League (BCFAYL) provide opportunities for girls' mini-soccer teams to access regular fixtures.

In the last twelve months overall, the increase from season 2015/16 to 2019/20 is a 181% increase (from 21 teams to 59). The BCFAYL continue to pilot girls playing one age group down within a mixed league environment, which supports growth, particularly in the Under 8s and 9s age groups.


The largest increase has been within the Under 8s age group, with a 33% increase, followed by the Under 10s, with a 7% increase.

Youth Football

Female youth participation figures continue to climb, with 170 teams affiliated during the season, seeing a 12.5% increase compared to last season (151).

The biggest increase was seen in the Under 13s age group, which was 57% up from the previous season (21 teams to 57). Just under a third (29.5%) of affiliated girls' teams played within the BCFAYL during season 2019/20, whilst the remaining two thirds played within the Essex County Girls' League. One team played within the South-East Essex Primary Mini-Soccer League.

The growth has been supported by various initiatives such as Wildcats (pictured), the Essex County FA Under 12s Girls County Cup and the Girls Schools Football Programme taking place within secondary schools.



Adult Football

Women's affiliated teams during 2019/20 saw a decline by 6% from 47 to 44 teams. The Essex County Women's League ran with two divisions, and included 17 teams.

Five teams were competing in the Eastern Region Women's League, with four Essex teams playing within the National League Division One and the Reserve Division. The remaining clubs were from college/university programmes, representative and Walking Football opportunities.

The number of recreational opportunities increased across the county, with seven Female 'Just Play' Centres on offer across three out of the four geographic areas.

Recreational Football

Nearly 50 women took part in a Recreational Festival in partnership with She Can Play in October. The festival was set-up to initially see if there was an appetite for further recreational opportunities.

The event proved extremely popular and plans are to host further events once we are out of the pandemic. Two teams have since gone on to affiliate and play within the Essex County Women's League after being involved with the Snickers Just Play Recreation Programme.

Player Development Centre

She Can Play continue to drive the coordination of the Essex County FA Girls' Player Development Centre (PDC). The programme provides a weekly training programme for aspiring female players, and with a formal link to the Regional Talent Club (RTC), which enables girls to be seen by coaches from the elite programme.

The PDC also provides female coaches with access to an environment to develop their skill set and gain the confidence to take the next step on their coaching path. Trials took place at Noak Hill in Romford and attracted nearly 200 girls across four age groups: Under 10, 12s, 14s and 16s.

80 players were successful in obtaining a place. The Girls' PDC is now in its tenth season. The technical programme runs sessions once a week over 30 weeks at Noak Hill.



Regional Talent Club

Essex's Regional Talent Club (RTC) is still a Tier 2 Licence of the Elite Female Player Pathway. RTC centres, nationally, remain at 34 clubs across three tiers.

The programme was in its seventh year at the start of the 2019/20 season, and the trials saw over 200 females attending. Our female coaching network continues to grow, with Carla Dickinson, Paige Wakefield, Christa Osman and Amy-Lee Gullefer all supporting the development of female players and heightening their development within the game.

Throughout the season, the Centre had England WU15 training camp call-ups for the Under 16s (Mia Filipiak) and Under 14s (Ellie Moore and Kelsey Morgan). Meanwhile, Emily Dilliway, Lucy Lyon and Amy Taylor were selected for the FA Women's Under 14s National Talent Camps. Leonie Telford and Elizabeth Way (Under 16s) represented the programme at the NDP Talent Identification Day.

Essex County Schools FA Representative Football

Despite an incomplete season due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the girls' programme was not without its highlights. Both age groups, the Under 16s and 14s, progressed to the later stages of the English Schools National Cup Competition, with two very exciting quarter-finals.

The Under 16s were involved in a nail-biting game against an extremely talented Somerset side, who went on to be crowned joint winners with Lancashire. The game went to extra time, with Essex scoring in the duing minutes and eventually losing out 6-5!

Meanwhile, the Under 14s squad were successful in their national quarter-final when they faced Gloucestershire and came away with a positive 3-1 win.

Unfortunately, the semi-final was not so convincing when the girls faced an extremely gifted Middlesex side and, in a similar fashion to last season's SEESFA Final, lost 7-2. Middlesex were also crowned joint winners, sharing the title with Lancashire.

Two members from the Essex squads were successful in gaining a place within the England Under 15s Girls schools team - Katie McClean from Davenant Foundation and Leonie Telford from Philip Morant. Both players were fantastic ambassadors for the Girls Schools Programme and thoroughly enjoyed their experience.

In addition, Katie was awarded first place in the Epping Forest Sports Awards, winning £1,000 to support her with her football career.



Disability

Disability football continues to grow within Essex, with 74 teams affiliated around the county. There has been increased engagement from mainstream FA Charter Standard clubs looking to engage within disability, adding Soccability under their club banner.

As a result, there has been growth in Youth Soccability, which has also aided in the sustainability of these opportunities. 17 of the 74 sides participate in our countywide competition. The Adult Soccability League is run by the County FA and has central venues in Colchester and Southend.

The Adult League has 17 teams across four divisions (Premiership, Championship, League 1 and League 2). Members of the Essex Soccability League entered the 11v11 South-East Regional Disability Cup. The Youth Soccability League has become independent, and each club hosts an event on a monthly basis, catering for Under 12s to 16s, with five per age group.

Each season, we deliver a minimum of 16 Schools Soccability Events (four per Group Area). Due to the impact of Covid-19, we were only able to deliver six events. Our Schools Soccability Festivals are open to mainstream schools and Special Educational Needs (SEN) departments. Overall, we engaged with 80 young people.

We also launched our editable Mental Health Poster for clubs to download, add their name and place in their clubhouses, handbooks and websites, featuring guidance and useful contacts. We were due to deliver four Wellbeing Festivals but, again due to Covid-19, we delivered one where four teams attended.

College Soccability continues to grow. The events are all hosted at PlayFootball Romford and teams come from all over the county.

Due to the impact of Covid-19, the Soccability League devised a weekly challenge for all Soccability teams via social media, helping many players to keep active during the pandemic. Soccability players from all around Essex were involved in the weekly challenges.

Witham Town are our first Step 5 club to incorporate disability under their banner. They also supported Level Playing Field's 'Weeks of Action' campaign.

Additionally, we started working with care homes to deliver tailored sessions to their residents. We arranged four in Basildon and four in Canvey Island, prior to Covid-19, which were well-received.







Youth Forum

The 2019/20 season saw the Essex County FA Youth Forum continue to evolve, with Gemma Stubbles appointed as Chairperson towards the end of the season, taking over from Ciaran Whatley.

Despite the Covid-19 pandemic stopping the group meeting in person, they have continued to meet virtually, keeping in contact and driving projects forward for when football could resume. This included an 'Encouraging Youth Volunteering' Guide.

This seasons FA's National Leadership Academy was delayed, again due to the virus, and was delivered remotely in August 2020. However, we did have four members participating.

The Football Futures Programme, which is overseen by The FA, remains under review. We have, however, supported many young people with volunteering opportunities.

Small-Sided

Small-sided football has remained steady in the 2019/20 season, with a number of commercial providers operating across the county and new 3G pitches hosting leagues during off-peak periods.

We now have nine affiliated small-sided football providers outside of those who affiliate nationally, delivering opportunities across all four Group Areas. These nine providers have over 130 teams participating weekly across Essex.

Work has continued to make sure all our small-sided football providers are affiliating their competitions, and our Referee Development Officers have ensured registered referees are aware of unaffiliated providers, plus the consequences of officiating in their leagues.



Futsal

The 2019/20 season saw Futsal continue to grow, with more football clubs adopting Futsal provision. In the 2018/19 season, 23 clubs offered either a bespoke or dual-Futsal offer, with 2019/20 growing to a combined 35 clubs.

Educational teams were also included, with the University of Essex and the Anglia Ruskin University either offering Futsal within their educational programme or as part of their sports participation programme. The increase in participation highlights the countywide appetite to create alternative offers and explore different formats of the game.

The Football Foundation released funding for affiliated Futsal Leagues. Eight leagues were supported, and funding was provided. Meanwhile, eight FA Level One in Coaching Futsal Courses engaged 168 learners and continued to support and develop the growing workforce.

Plus, our County Futsal Competition for Under 10s through to 16s was open to schools and grassroots clubs this year. Each Group Area held specific qualification rounds before progressing to finals held at the University of Essex in Colchester. Over 150 teams took part in all competitions.



Facilities and Funding

With Local Football Facility Plans (LFFP) in place for each of our local authorities, work continued in engaging appropriate partners to take forward identified projects.

Across the season, meetings and calls were held with local authorities to revisit their respective LFFP, which acts as an investment portfolio across four investment pillars: 3G Pitch Provision, Grass Pitch Improvement, Changing Rooms/Pavilions, Small-Sided Football Facilities.

This engagement was aligned to the Playing Pitch Strategy action plan work completed in conjunction with Active Essex, Sport England and the other NGBs to establish short, medium and long term priorities for grassroots football facilities. During the 2019/20 season, two projects were successful in applications to the Football Foundation (FF) panel:

- Hutton FC: new ground, including grass pitches and small pavilion
- Saffron Walden Education Trust: Saffron Walden High School full-size floodlit 3G AGP (in partnership with Saffron Walden Community FC)



Football Stadia Improvement Fund

Over the course of the 2019/20 season, Essex senior status clubs received funding through the Football Stadia Improvement Fund.

This fund is there to support clubs playing within the FA National League System to meet their ground grading requirements. The table below outlines the clubs who received investment:

FA 3G Pitch Register

There has been a growth in the number of 3G pitches listed within Essex on the FA 3G Pitch Register during the 2019/20 season. It requires that all 3G Football Turf Pitches used for affiliated match play should meet the standards set in the FA 3G Pitch Performance Test.

This ensures there is a high-quality standard across all 3G pitches. There are now 48 pitches (of varying sizes) within Essex listed on the register (up from 30 during 2015). This has ensured football matches continue to get played in adverse weather conditions.

Protection of Football Facilities

The protection of existing football facilities is a key priority for football. Housing growth is playing a significant factor in the development of future facilities.

Disused football facilities can be at risk of being lost or reallocated for other purposes as part of LA Local Plans to identify key sites for housing growth, with submission to the Government for approval. Playing Pitch Strategies are an important assessment tool in the process.

We work closely with Sport England to comment on, and provide evidence in regard to, any sites which could be lost to football to ensure they are not lost or to ensure replacement facilities are developed to offset any potential loss of pitch stock. Over the course of the 2019/20 season, we commented on 36 different planning applications.

FA Grass Pitch Improvement Strategy

Over the course of the 2019/20 season, The FA finalised their FA Grass Pitch Improvement Strategy which aims to improve 20,000 pitches over the next ten years.

One of the first initiatives from this was the piloting of a new Football Foundation funding programme, 'Enhanced Maintenance Fund', designed to support grassroots clubs with the costs of the additional maintenance to improve their pitches.

In the initial rollout of this fund, twelve Essex-affiliated clubs benefited from the six-year grant which will allow them to invest strategically into the improvement of their grass pitches over the next ten years. Across the twelve who were successful, the Football Foundation will be an investing circa £58,000 into 78 pitches.

The Essex County FA continued to access the services of the Grounds Maintenance Association's Regional Pitch Advisor who, in the 2019/20 season, visited a number of grass pitch sites across the county to provide pitch assessment reports against a new defined grass pitch quality framework.

Local authorities continued to work under increasing budget pressures and constraints, which has resulted in less intensive pitch maintenance programmes. We actively engaged with some of our local authorities to assess their pitches and provide them with some recommendations which can be implemented in their schedules to aid pitch improvement.

Across the twelve who were successful, the Football Foundation will be investing circa £58,000 into 78 pitches.

FA 'Parklife' Programme

The London Borough of Barking & Dagenham (LBBD) have been continuing to develop a Parklife development at Parsloes Park.

The current plan for the site is to develop three 3G pitches (one of which will be a stadium development) and an eight-team changing ancillary build, which will also include a gym and a studio. The project has currently secured the following funding pots:

A funding application has been submitted to the Football Foundation for £6,388,062, which may rise, with a decision expected in March 2020. The development has now received planning permission from the local authority, and through the Greater London Authority.

The next stage for the programme is to go out for construction tender and operator procurement - for which the Football Foundation are aiming to source a national operator. The timeline is scheduled for an opening from September 2021.

Covid-19 Support Funding

Covid-19 brought grassroots football to a standstill in March 2020, leaving many clubs in difficult positions financially, particularly those who maintained or operated their own facilities. In response to this, the Football Foundation developed three funds to support the grassroots game.

Football Foundation Pitch Preparation Fund

This fund was aimed at helping clubs and organisations to get their natural and artificial grass pitches ready for when Government advice allowed football to start again after 'Lockdown 1' restrictions were loosened.

Every applicant needed to be a club or organisation with a minimum of twelve months 'security of tenure' over the pitches they wished to improve by freehold, leasehold or licence, plus the legal responsibility for maintaining them. There were 123 successful club/organisation applications from Essex, with investment totalling £349,350.

Football Foundation Club Preparation Fund

The Club Preparation Fund was designed to support clubs to get their buildings ready for football's return after the Government loosened 'Lockdown 1' restrictions.

Clubs and organisations who managed their own building and had a minimum of twelve months security of tenure were able to apply, providing the buildings served outdoor football pitches which were used for affiliated football. 140 successful club/organisation applications were made in Essex, totalling an investment of £70,000.

Football Foundation Matchday Support Fund

This fund offered a range of grants for eligible National League System (Steps 1 to 6), FA Women's Pyramid (Tiers 1 to 5) and Welsh Premier League clubs to help them prepare for the safe return of football, and supporters to their stadia.

Grants ranged from £1,000 to £20,000, dependent on the facility requirements and step level. 51 successful club applications were made in Essex and 100% of these were eligible and successful, meaning an investment totalling £284,000.

Alongside the Football Foundation funding, Sport England also released an Emergency Community Fund for grassroots sports organisations in response to Covid-19, which a number of Essex-based clubs and organisations also accessed.





Education

Association of Colleges Sport Funding: English Colleges FA College Football Hubs

The FA have partnered with British Universities and Colleges Sport (BUCS) and the English Colleges FA (ECFA) to support the development of grassroots football across England through the introduction of 'FA College & University Grassroots Hubs'.

All college football hubs will be expected to engage and retain new players from the college and the community (30% female, 10% disability, 10% from ethnically-diverse communities), retain baselines and grow community and student football by a minimum of 5% each year, as per funded targets.

- retain and grow male and female, adult and youth participation
- develop inclusive playing pathways for football and Futsal which offer a wide variety
 of flexibility, including playing opportunities for the local community
- embed student leadership programmes at every college and university hub, which generate more and better coaches, referees and volunteers to service the grassroots game
- open up facilities to support grassroots football clubs to gain access to sustainable use of new and existing sports facilities
- this is achieved via a collaborative approach, involving a wide range of football stakeholders such as the education sectors (schools, colleges and universities), County FAs, affiliated clubs and local charities

The College Grassroots Hub pillars are: Operating Standards, Community Football, Student Football, Collaborative Working and Developing a Workforce. Colleges funded include: Palmer's College (Tier 3), South Essex College (Tier 3), Barking & Dagenham College (Tier 3), Sir George Monoux College.

University of Essex

The University of Essex (UoE) continued to grow their partnership with The FA and ourselves, through the investment into higher education by holding a hybrid Tier 1 status.

Significant football development success has continued at the hub site, driven by the full time development officer. Key highlights include women's football becoming a focus sport and men's football followed for 2020/21 due to their success. Both the women's and men's teams were BUCS League champions in 2019/20, gaining promotion from Tier 2 to Tier 1.



Futsal

A new Football Foundation-funded Futsal midweek competition launched in the sports arena. The North Essex Youth Futsal League (NEYFL) kicked-off with eight local teams' Under 12s playing regular fixtures before lockdown.

The league had plans to expand in the 2020/21 season, with age groups planned for Under 12s and Under 14s. However, the league has not restarted due to Covid-19, and the restrictions associated.

There has been an expanding programme of school provision (girls only), with qualified students delivering in five different schools, alongside hosting one-off schools Futsal competitions on-site for boys and girls in years three to four and five to six. There have been over 20 teams in attendance across the season.

Recreational Football Offer

The fully-affiliated 11v11 Flexi-League continued to be a popular recreational football offer on campus, increasing to a record ten teams taking part during the course of the season. This was overseen by four qualified student referees. Two FA Just Play Centres were registered, with capacity increased to 42 participants twice a week prior to lockdown.

Female Football

There has been an expansion of the on-site offer for female football, with provision extended to three affiliated teams (two in BUCS and one development squad), plus an addition of a social female-only Futsal session.

Volunteering & Leadership

There has been an increase in student volunteering and leadership, including a dedicated volunteer football activators scheme with two male students, and one female.

An additional two students have gained valuable personal development and employability opportunities through involvement on the FA Women's Leadership Programme, one in 2019/20 and one accepted onto the 2020/21 season scheme.

Student volunteers continue to support the delivery of the intra-mural five-a-side, university Futsal programme, County FA Futsal Qualifiers and on-site school events. Over 20 students have been active in volunteering and leadership.

Coach Education

The University continued to be a hub for the delivery of FA-accredited courses for the community and students, with five FA Level 1 courses, one Futsal Level 1, FA Level 2 Blocks 1 & 2 and an FA Futsal Level 2. Due to the Covid-19 restrictions, two courses were postponed.

Finally, the exciting and welcoming news that the University of Essex would be returning to play community football following their application to re-join the Essex & Suffolk Border League for the 2020/21 season was accepted.



Equality and Inclusion

We continue to promote equality and inclusion throughout the organisation and the wider workforce, including promotion of a number of religious occasions and international days through our social media accounts.

We continued to work with Stonewall and The FA to support the Rainbow Laces Campaign (for the second season). This was even bigger and better than the season before. We worked with seven leagues compared to three the previous season (as well as the Essex County Cups):

- Pope and Smith Chelmsford Sunday League
- Southend Borough & District Football Combination
- Essex Sunday Corinthian League
- Colchester & District Sunday League
- Southend & Basildon Sunday League
- Braintree & North Essex Sunday League
- Essex County Women's League

We have started to work towards 'Intermediate Level' of the Equality Standard and we also continue to support various other projects across the county, including working alongside the African Nations Cup, Braintree Mosque and the Southend Mosque.

Safeguarding and Welfare

In October 2019, the Safeguarding Department undertook a new and different approach to engaging and delivering continuous training to an experienced base of welfare officers and club officials.

Presentations, delivered by Mind, Colchester United FC and a youth referee, covered topics such as gangs, knife crime, County Lines, mental health for under 18s and poor practice. These were all very much topics in the media. Resources were made available for leagues and clubs to share and disseminate through their memberships.

In delivering the Safeguarding Strategu, the department works closely with the volunteer taskforce in meeting FA DBS (Disclosure & Barring Service) compliancy. As certain roles within under 18s football require an accepted FA DBS, it is vital parents/carers are confident that those coaching their children meet these requirements.

Part of the process is to work with volunteers to manage and maintain this process. As part of The FA's Safeguarding Operating Standard, we conduct safeguarding visits to clubs. These include checking credentials as well as meeting club volunteers, parents/carers and players.

In February 2020, we were assessed by The FA's independent auditors. The assessment covers many aspects of the game, from compliancy, education, case management, operational delivery and leadership.

In March, we were advised that the Essex County FA had met the standard, noting strengths in good practice: "the association delivers topical, awareness-raising CPD events to grassroots volunteers using subject matter experts to deliver topics." The assessors also said the "Essex County FA is ensuring that safeguarding is at the core of its governance structures and operational practices."

In recognising that it is so important to engage with under 18s, we were delighted to recognise the art skills of Charlie, who won our competition to design a banner to promote safeguarding. Although it was not possible to give the banner its first outing (due to Covid-19), we look to use this at all of our future events.

Covid-19 saw many challenges for clubs and volunteers, including the requirement of risk assessments, enabling members to participate in a safe and secure environment. Whilst contending with the many demands of the pandemic, safeguarding continued to play a vital and important part, with full processes in place throughout the whole of grassroots football.

Marketing and Communications

Website

As our central information point for grassroots football stakeholders the website at www.essexfa.com is regularly reviewed and updated with content to create key reference and resource pages on cups, players, referees, coaches, clubs, leagues, volunteers, facilities, safeguarding and inclusion.

In-line with our 2018-21 Moving Forward Strategy, we target an increased number of visitors per month. 165,176 unique visitors accessed our website during the 2019/20 season, which was fractionally down on the previous year (by 5.59%), likely due to the reduced football activity from March to June, plus increased social media activity.

Another strategic target, which contributes towards our visitor statistics, is to promote at least 16 key priority football news items on a monthly basis. This was either achieved or exceeded every month in 2019/20, covering articles across many areas of the game.

#SquadBooster, our portal to pair players with clubs, published 605 team adverts in 2019/20, attracting visits by 9,820 individuals, making it the eighth most popular page on our website (fourth if you exclude competition-related pages). This is always backed by social media, particularly on the exceptionally-active Twitter hashtag.

Elsewhere, we pledged in our strategy to introduce a permanent function on the website as a regular opportunity to monitor customer satisfaction. The 2018/19 season saw us embed and integrate 'Freshdesk' functionality which adds a variety of new and improved services for handling stakeholders' online queries, providing enhanced support.

The Covid-19 pandemic caused a great deal of difficulty to grassroots football from March until the truncated culmination in the season. We created a dedicated Coronavirus Update page to ensure crucial information and support was made available in a simple and streamlined way. This page was viewed on 9,801 occasions up to and including 30th June.



Social Media

Facebook, Twitter and YouTube have continued to be key engagement and promotional vehicles for sharing news and information in an increasingly online world. These core channels have informed and educated grassroots football quickly and efficiently.

We use our social media feeds to grow the game to a growing network across a wider platform of partners. Our Moving Forward Strategy targets an increase in Twitter followers to 32,000 (delivering 700 tweets on a monthly basis) and 16,000 Facebook likes (40 posts per month). The post frequency was exceeded on both platforms during every month in 2019/20.

By 30th June 2020, we'd attracted 4,343 new Twitter followers to reach a total of around 25,825 (on-target). 10,873 tweets were dispatched (up 4,528 on last season), generating 22,651,000 impressions (up 8,583,000). Our activity attracted 152,398 profile visits and 24,271 mentions (up 8,681). Our @EssexReferees and @EssexCoaches were also very active.

Amongst our most popular 'hashtags' (which group together tweets about a specific subject or conversation) were #SquadBooster (pairing players with teams) and #FootballsStayingHome (bringing the Twitter football community together during Covid-19 lockdown). Our #CelebrateEssex competition was also very popular once more.

The monthly competition recognised local unsung heroes through a nomination and voting process across ten roles. It showcased personal stories, increasing their visibility as role models to engage new members and inspire newcomers to join the grassroots community as volunteers. In 2019/20, 90 nominations were received, with 10,445 votes cast.

Twitter Analytics confirmed that we broke our monthly records for the number of tweets, tweet impressions, mentions and new followers during the season, and we also achieved the accolade of becoming the most-followed County FA in the country in May. Meanwhile, 710 new Facebook likes in 2019/20 meant we'd reached a total of 9,681 by the end of the season.

As well as routine updates, our Facebook account was also the home for our re-worked Fair Play Awards, following a similar nomination and voting model to the successful #CelebrateEssex. Positive acts included a striker purposefully missing a penalty he felt was incorrectly awarded, and praise for a youth goalkeeper on another team who performed exceptionally.

One youth side also received a successful nomination from a referee for the way they, and their management team, conducted themselves at matches. This included not reacting when a penalty wasn't awarded to their team late in the game at 0-0. Across six categories between October and March, 9,668 people were reached, with 397 post engagements.

New promotional videos, distributed through YouTube and the website, have been particularly well-received during 2019/20, especially with the additional face-to-face educational challenges. During May and June, we were particularly prolific at publishing videos, largely providing online learning opportunities for referees and coaches. 157 new subscribers were attracted.

Videos on our channel were viewed on 12,200 occasions, totalling a 'watch time' of 695.5 hours. The most popular included videos on club registration, referees keeping fit at home and a referee 'yellow armband' initiative for under 18s. A bespoke 'Coaches' video was also published on our website and social media, allied to a positive Coach Education news story.





Communication

It is our strategic goal to deliver efficient and effective communication to all football stakeholders in Essex. In addition to our website and social media streams, we achieve this in a variety of other ways, including a fortnightly E-Mail newsletter.

We produced regular, branded E-Mails to update subscribers on key developments. Subjects always included items for coaches, referees, clubs, players and volunteers, as well as other important news. 19 E-Mails were dispatched, of monthly frequency during late 2019 and increasing to approximately every fortnight in 2020. The audience grew by 244 during the campaign.

The FA's Annual Stakeholder Survey was supported promotionally, with the aim of achieving a 10% year-on-year increase in responses. The survey was opened in October 2019 and an initial website news story was created, backed-up by Twitter and Facebook posts.

Staff supported this with additional awareness, resulting in 993 responses. In addition, respondents who requested a 'call back' from the County FA received this, resulting in increased engagement and additional, specific feedback.

An Annual Report was produced and published, updating football stakeholders on all of our key activities, as well as a County Handbook containing essential details such as rules, regulations and key contacts. Work is also underway on the production of a pilot Essex County FA podcast to provide an additional, audible means of sharing news and information.



Branding and Commercial

Work has continued to nurture a defined image which helps to achieve our wider, specific, strategic goals. A consistent, high-quality brand has been maintained in partnership with a branding partner.

Visually-appealing infographics and signage (such as a media background) have been created which represent County FA activities and present information efficiently and concisely. This has contributed towards the maintenance of existing and new commercial opportunities for a selection of partners and provided a window for new external investment to support Essex football.

BBC Essex

BBC Essex have again been huge supporters of grassroots football during 2019/20. As well as welcoming us to broadcast live draws alongside special guests for the Senior, Saturday Premier and Women's Cups, they also invite us for topical discussions.

Throughout the year, the following subjects have received coverage: Soccability, anti-racism, female football, #CelebrateEssex 'Footie Dad' nominations, FA Grassroots Football Survey, County Cups consultation. Further afield, local referee, Emma Guest, also appeared on BBC Five Live to talk about referee coverage in grassroots football.
