## RAF FA - ENGLAND ELITE DISABILITY FOOTBALLERS VISIT RAF SHAWBURY

Members of The FA England Elite Disability Talent Pathway team have visited RAF Shawbury to raise awareness of Disability Sport. Visiting the North Shropshire Airbase to complete a brief on England Disability football and complete a hands-on demonstration event was The FA Talent Pathway Manager, James Watkins, accompanied by coaches from the England Blind, Cerebral Palsy and Powerchair disciplines. In addition, elite England players attended to meet staff and trainees from the units Defence College of Air and Space Operations.

The day was designed to brief the station personnel on Disability sport and in particular football through The FA and the Talent Pathway for Elite football. Whilst raising awareness the staff and trainees received a greater understanding of performing at the highest level with either a visual or physical impairment. This is very pertinent as the College trains UK Military Air Operations Controllers in the Air Traffic and Weapons Control disciplines and all Air Operations Systems staff in the Flight Operations and Battlespace Management Surveillance roles. Training is also provided to the Trade Group 7 Air and Space Operations Specialists.
