

INTRODUCTION TO THE ARMY FA BOARD OF TRUSTEES



Chairman: Brigadier Niall Stokoe OBE (2015)

Joined the Board in 2015 with initial responsibility for Men/Corps representative football. He replaced Major General "Mitch" Mitchell MBE as Chairman in April 2020.

A former Chairman of the Massey League who has also served as Chairman, then President of Royal Signals Football. Played from regimental level through to Army Crusaders (for whom he still plays for) and is a Youth Coach in the civilian world.

Vice Chair: Colonel Sam Shepherd MBE (2021)

Sam was appointed the first female Vice Chair of the Army FA in July 2021 replacing the outgoing Colonel Colin Francis CBE. As part of her role Sam will be the Safeguarding Champion for the Army FA. Sam has been the Corps Colonel of the Royal Artillery since 2019.





Mr John Taylor (2013)

The longest serving Trustee, John is the Independent representative on the Board. He has served that position since 2013. An extensive football background is primarily through the Middlesex FA where he has been Chairman since 2011 overseeing the move to a new HQ in Northolt in 2018; a community development that includes two 3G pitches. He also serves as an FA Councillor too.

Colonel Dave Jones MBE QVRM (2015)

Dave has been the Army Reserve Trustee since 2015.
In addition to being the current Chairman of the Reserve he also Chairs the Army Crusaders (Officers) football and has been involved in significant overseas Engagements, most recently spending nearly a year in Baghdad as part of the NATO Mission Iraq and previously in Kosovo.





Lt Col Jim Fallon (2018)

Joined as a Trustee in 2018 Jim, an Evertonian, is responsible for Football Development. He has over 15 years' experience in a variety of coaching roles from junior to adult including Futsal and Mentoring adults. He originally completed his Level 2 in 2005.

Colonel Neil Blenkinsop (2020)

Neil was appointed Trustee in early 2020 concentrating on Unit football. The passionate Sunderland fan who played regimental football from 1992 to 2014 is deeply committed to the development of grass roots football within the Army.





Lt Col Chloe Plimmer-Sayce (2020)

Chloe replaced Trustee Col Ash Boreham as Women's representative in the early part of the initial Covid-19 lockdown. A player from corps through to Army level Chloe was most recently the Vice Chair of the Royal Engineers AFC. She was also RE AFC Secretary from 2015 to 2019.

Major Nigel Bamford (2020)

Nigel joined the Board in June 2020 with the responsibility for Army Referees. The Wolverhampton Wanderers fan has extensive experience as a player, coach, and Tutor. He was manager of AMS between 2015 and 2020 and also a Level 4 Referee and Observer.





Lt Col Alex Atherton (2020)

Alex joined as a Trustee: appointed in May 2020. He is responsible for Army Men's representative and corps football. Previously Alex had been Vice-Chair of RLC AFC for five years. He has also played for Army Crusaders.

Major Jill Rogers MBE (2021)

Major Jill Rogers has recently joined the board of trustees as an advisor on Diversity and Inclusion. A total football novice, her sporting interests are sailing and cycling. However, she is a fast learner and hopes to finally get to grips with the offside rule after some coaching from the board.



In June 2021 the Army Football Association Strategy 2021-24 was presented to the Football Association. The presentation attached details of the work undertaken by the Army FA to assure the Football Association of our commitment to their new governance structures and the steps we are taking to ensure we remain a professionalised and exemplar County within the FA.

Throughout we impressed upon them how football (accepting we are not the only discipline) were seen as more than just a sport within the Army and that the values required of the game and by the FA as National Governing Body chimed with the values and standards by which we all live and work. We also made clear that the involvement of our players, coaches and officials extends well beyond football in the Army. With many of those who have gained coaching qualifications with the Armu FA working as coaches in their spare time with their local amateur teams. And players too involved at representative amateur level, including LCpl Demi Edwards (RAMC) who recently scored for QPR FC Women in their Capital Women's Cup victory over Actonians Ladies. In addition we have 200 officials who also officiate or remain involved within the civilian structure from grass roots through to the FA Premier League; indeed Cpl Declan O'Shea (REME) has been promoted to the Football League list after just two years as a National League official.

We were delighted that the FA has confirmed that the Army FA has been awarded a Grant to support the delivery of the targets set out in the NGS, as agreed by the NGB, from 2021 to 2024.

Chairman, Brigadier Niall Stokoe MBE said, "I am pleased to report that the presentation was well received, and we have secured our funding from the FA for the next three seasons. What was of particular value though was that this required us, the Board of Trustees, to look at both our structure and the further professionalisation we must undertake. We are in a good place, but there is work to do. Rest assured the Board of Trustees and I are committed to doing this and will continue to deliver for the good of The Soldiers' Game. "

Like the vast majority of sport across the 3 Services, last season was particularly difficult for UKAFF. Despite working tirelessly to ensure a safe and compliant return to football, it was not possible to restart UKAFF activity or hold the 2021 Inter-Services' Competitions, International fixtures were cancelled and opportunities to plau within the UK were rightly prevented by national lockdowns and the critical requirement for Armed Forces personnel to support the Government's national response to the pandemic. Despite the challenges, UKAFF, along with the single-Service Football Associations and the UK Sports Board, have worked tirelessly to ensure that football can start as soon as possible and towards the end of the 20/21 season some football has been played. In June, the UKAF Women's Team returned to competitive football with a well-earned 1-1 draw with GB Police in a fixture to commemorate the tragic loss of life as a result of the Manchester Arena Terrorist Attack in 2017.

Looking ahead, the future is more positive. UKAFF has signed an innovative sponsorship deal with Avanti Communications. Avanti will collaborate with UKAFF to introduce high tech sustems to monitor and enhance individual and team fitness and training, while also providing the financial support for UKAFF Men to host the Centenary of the Kentish Cup towards the end of 2021. We aim to play all the Kentish Cup fixtures at Havant & Waterlooville FC near Portsmouth and attract support and interest from the local community and across Defence. We are also optimistic that our annual fixtures with the Irish Defence Force will begin again soon. UKAFF Women will commemorate Remembrance with a possible fixture against Chelsea FC and will travel to the Netherlands in 2022 to play for the President's Cup. Planning is now well underway and the continued support of the Army FA has been vital to the restart and recovery of UKAFF over the coming months.

Finally, not being able to play competitively also meant that it was not possible to say proper 'goodbue' to our players, coaches and officials who left the Armed Forces in the past 15 months. There are too many to mention individually and their commitment to football across Defence will not be easily forgotten. However, our departing Men's captain, Cpl Rob Farkins, deserves a special mention. Having left the Armu in 2021 following a 12-year career, UKAFF will miss his dedication to football, inspirational leadership both on and off the pitch and talent at the centre of defence. 'Farks' has been instrumental and critical to UKAFF's success in recent years and represented both UKAFF and the Army with distinction; he will be sorely missed and we wish him well.'

ARMY FA VICE CHAIR

There has been a change in the position of Vice Chairman within the Army FA Board of Trustees.

This is due to the departure of Colonel Colin Francis CBE. Colin, who was awarded a Commander of the Order of the British Empire in the 2021 New Years' Honours List. has left the Armu.

He was commissioned into the Royal Logistic Corps in 1993 and appointed as Corps Colonel in 2017.

A veteran of operational tours in Iraq, Afghanistan, Bosnia, Macedonia and Kosovo he commanded at every level on operations, up to unit level and was appointed MBE for his contribution to operations in 2009.

Colin became a Trustee in 2015 and appointed Chairman after the departure of Colonel Richard Hayhurst OBE in 2019.

A proud Chairman of the RLC FA Colin also chaired the Crusaders (Army Officers Football Club).

We express our sincere appreciation to Colin for his superb contribution to Army Football and wish him well in the future.

WE WELCOME OUR NEW VICE CHAIR COLONEL SAM SHEPHERD MBE.

Colonel Sam Shepherd MBE commissioned into the Royal Regiment of Artillery in 1997. During her career she has served across the UK and Germany and has deployed on operations in Northern Ireland, Iraq, Macedonia and Afghanistan.

Her early career saw her deploy on Operation TELIC 1 and 3 as a Forward Observation Officer after which she became the Adjutant of the Army Foundation College (Harrogate). Promoted to Major in 2006 her initial grade 2 appointment as SO2 Organisation & Deployments within London District earned her an MBE.

Her Battery Command tour with 17 (Corunna) Battery, Royal Artillery followed, and it was in this role that she deployed on Operation HERRICK 15 in support of the 5 RIFLES Battlegroup A posting to the Land Warfare School as the lead staff officer responsible for the planning and delivery of the new 8 week Junior Command and Staff Course gained her promotion to Lieutenant Colonel and selection for the Advanced Command and Staff Course. She fulfilled the role Chief of Staff 102 Logistic Brigade for 15 months before assuming Command of 5th Regiment Royal Artillery in January 2017. Following command, Colonel Shepherd was posted to London District as the Deputy Chief of Staff and assumed the Regimental Colonel Royal Artilleru appointment in October 2019.

An avid sportswoman, her primary playing passion is rugby and as blind side flanker she represented the Royal Regiment, the Army and the Combined Services. However, an active supporter of football and a Spurs fan to boot (no pun intended!) she is delighted to have assumed the role of Vice Chair of the Army FA. Other interests include baking, hiking and playing the piano.





In June DASCB Maj Gen Shaun Burley CB MBE had the pleasure of presenting the ASCB Director's coin to the first recipient of the award.

Capt (MAA) Kevin Haley RAPTC has represented service football at the highest level for two decades. This includes Corps (RAPTC & AMS), Army (various levels) and UK Armed Forces.

Since retiring from playing, he has taken on the roles of RAPTC FC manager and Army Senior Team Secretary, this clearly demonstrates his dedication and passion to serve both Corps and Army Football.

Away from the pitch, Capt (MAA) Haley has impressively managed the Army FA Roadshow, delivering clinics to schools and communities around the country and he has promoted the sport passionately.

Capt (MAA) Haley organised the first Army female 5-a-side competition and has been instrumental in supporting numerous OSV's at various levels and he has achieved all this and more, whilst continuing to be successful in his career.

He is widely acknowledged within the Army Football family as a superb role model and is a POC for many players and coaches. Although his preferred role is 'a solid' centre midfielder who isn't shy of a 50/50 challenge and thrives on the physical aspect of the game, he has only ever received one yellow card in his service history which spans well over 500 caps.

A fine example of someone who is competitive but fair and epitomises the qualities of a sportsman and symbolises what it is to be a sportsman, role model, leader, manager, and coach. Moreover, he is one of the good guys, who has been selfless in ensuring he has supported the UK Armed Forces over many years, in many countries and simply excelled!

Congratulations Captain Haley, a very well-deserving recipient of the very first Army Sport Control Board Director's Coin.

Capt Kev Haley commented, "I was initially shocked by the presentation but thankful to receive the first DASCB. I thank the DASCB, for taking the time out to personally present me with the first coin. I hope this was the first of many as there are so many people doing a huge amount of great work, usually in their own time within sport that unfortunately goes unnoticed. I hope the introduction of this coin gives those who dig out blind for their sport the recognition they deserve".

The credentials for the DASCB Coin is in recognition of individuals who have continually or exceptionally gone above and beyond in their role in support or delivery of Army Sport and to have an emphasis on performance and achievement rather than seniority and length of service to sport.

The Army Football Association Chairman's Coin has also been introduced in 2021 and the first presentations of the award will be made in October.



AFFILIATION & PLAYER REGISTRATION

To measure our County FA vision (2021/24) and smart goals and objectives it is imperative that the correct affiliation and player registration procedures are implemented as per the guidelines below:

 Affiliation to the Army FA is to be completed using the Whole Game System (WGS). If a unit manage or operate a football league, unit football or any other type of football competition and they have not registered on the Whole Game System you are to contact the affiliation secretary who will assist you in the registration process. All guidance notes for everything WGS can be found at https://grassrootstechnology. freshdesk.com/support/home

All players regardless of how many times they play must be registered through https://clubs.thefa.com and must include the individuals email address. This is a mandatory requirement for season 2021/22.

There is no restriction on the number of players that can be registered on the WGS.

Leagues, Corps Secretaries and Competition organisers cannot permit entry into a football competition without the team first receiving an affiliation number from the Army FA for the 2021/22 season. The affiliation for all units is free for season 2021/22.





A BLOG FROM FORMER ARMY FOOTBALLER MATT SPRUCE AND AN INSIGHTFUL OUTLOOK ON THE MENTAL HEALTH EFFECTS OF FOOTBALL DURING COVID-19 AND HOW TAKE IT ALL FOR GRANTED.

"THE BEAUTIFUL GAME: SPORT AS A VEHICLE FOR WELLBEING"

How have you found the last 12 months? Personally, I have found it a challenge. To move to a new house, have a baby as well as a two year old, leave the Army, resettle, job hunt, interviews and then start a job all under some kind of pandemic restriction has made everything a little more complex.

You may laugh but I have missed playing football.... I know, selfish and sad... but I have played since I was a child and throughout my adult life. Every posting, every new Town, 5-a-side, 7-a-side, Sunday league, non -league, for the Army Medical Services, for the Army, even on Operations around the globe Kosovo, Iraq, Afghanistan, Yemen... and then there are the Exercises in Kenya, Cyprus, Uganda, Germany, New Zealand, France, and the

Czech Republic....I have always had the escapism of playing the game. At every level, from having a kick about in the gym to playing at Fratton Park against the Royal Navy, the buzz and team cohesion is the same. A freedom to focus on nothing other than the game, the ball, your team, the score.

I read a quote "you will never miss "normal" until it's gone" and boy have I missed normal. Physical activity is vital for health and wellbeing, it is something I have always prided myself on. The varying degrees of lockdowns gave me the freedom to do "daily activity" which I embraced... but it wasn't enough. I found myself getting a little more stressed and having a little less tolerance.



Team sports require you to place the good of the group above your own self-interest. It might feel good to run the length of the pitch, take on every player.... It's more likely that you'll lose the ball to the other team. In football, how many you score doesn't matter. All that matters is that your team wins!!

I am hoping to play for a Charity team called North Wales Dragons, they play in various charity cups but most importantly, they train every week. On a 4g pitch under flood lights, the excitement I have for turning up, meeting new people, and playing the beautiful game is ridiculous...!! I am nearly 40 ...!! I have had the opportunity to play football throughout my career, culminating in being a part of the Army Masters team that won the World Masters Game in Auckland 2017. If I could offer any advice, regardless of your age, gender, or ability...... Keep playing the Soldiers game...!!!

Suffering from cabin fever and feeling guilty as I had everything, and people had lost so much. I knew I missed the game. Of course, I couldn't talk about it, even writing about it seems ridiculous and selfish, but not having that hit of passion, adrenaline, commitment, and cohesion took its toll.

For many people, sport is taken for granted. It is something that exists in the background, it is seen as a bit of fun on the weekend but ultimately, not all that important, for me, this couldn't be further from the truth. I struggled to process how I have managed to play football in every warzone I have deployed to, often to break barriers with locals, often to bring people together and a vehicle for leadership and cohesion. Yet here I was, in the UK, BANNED from playing.

The physical importance of sports is well known but participating in physical activities also has an incredibly beneficial effect on your happiness. This boost in happiness comes from a range of sources, both neurological and psychological.




The Army Masters' Football Team has grown in stature since the 'Veterans' fixtures, between the 3 services, were formally initiated in 2002. In Sep 2016 the 'Vets' team were invited to participate in the 2017 World Masters' Games (WMG17) to be held in May, in Auckland, New Zealand. At this point, in order to compete and have suitable personal injury cover, the Army took the unilateral decision to deliver Football for over 35s, for serving personnel only, thereby, changing the status from 'Vets' to Masters, the Masters' concept was born. The team had a hugely successful first outing in New Zealand, winning 8 of 9 fixtures and the Gold Medal in the 35-40 category.

That success brought fresh impetus to Army Masters' Football and the team has grown exponentially with a player base of 40+ players across the Army, including a number of Army Reserve players. COVID-19 and the global pandemic has clearly stymied our efforts to play over the last 18 months, but with some hope for the 21/22 season the Team Management are preparing a number of fixtures to build some impetus towards WMG22 in Japan.

Capt Matt Spruce has been a stalwart of Masters' Football since its inception, covering the Secretary and associated Administrative functions, bringing his passion for football to bear and moving Masters' Football forward since Auckland. Matt has left the Army and is building a new career, forcing him to step down and concentrate on his personal and professional development. He will be back, once he has the time to join the Army Reserve and the Masters' Team would like to formally thank him for all of the great work, he has delivered on our behalf over the last 4 years.

That said, the team is in good hands as the former Captain and Head Coach of Army and UKAF Football has stepped up. 

The frustrations of Covid-19 were put to one side on the first Friday in June as the name of the Infantry returned to the Massey Trophy Division 1 champions board after a 3-1 victory versus Royal Signals in Aldershot confirmed the achievement. There is no doubting the team, led by Head Coach Capt Jimmy Blair, have been the most consistent in Army Corps football over the last two years.

Indeed, victory versus the Royal Engineers in the final match of the 2019/20 season would have secured the trophy a year previously halted, however, by the initial Covid-19 lockdowns and subsequent cancellation of the competition.

The facts are clear though. Since the commencement of the 2019/20 season Infantry have won 11 of their 14 league matches completed and have thoroughly deserved the accolades that have come their way.

It is a good story for Army football too. A corps in decline and hovering in Division 2 just five years ago re-energised itself devising a structure that would ultimately prove successful.

A jubilant Blair explains the story after Infantry became the top men's corps team for the first time in 17 years, "Proud is the word that sums it up. We have been chasing this for a while. One of the motivations was the winners board in Garretts Clubhouse (Aldershot Military Stadium) where it shows that the last time Infantry won it was in 2004. There was a sheer desire to get our name on there."

"We have had a lot of plaudits in recent years from where we have brought the set up especially since our relegation to Division 2 where we literally had a bag of balls and a few cones. We have brought it to a position where we are fully kitted out, sourced a sponsor, and created several methods to develop the team and structure. The support we have had from the Army FA with the use of the Development Centre in Aldershot was considerable too. If we hadn't won the league it would have drifted away a bit. There has been so much hard work to get to where we are now".



In 2016 The Infantry approached the Army FA for support when they were having serious problems staging matches at Pirbright and it was becoming a dilemma every Friday home game as to whether they would be able to fulfil a fixture. Eventually the home of Infantry football was moved to Aldershot and, primarily, a desire to use the 3G facility at Wavell on Queens Avenue. There were several people involved at the outset. Initially Mark Stones was the "one-man band" for the Infantry followed by Lee Waghorn (Wagsy) who played a huge role in the progression as Jimmy alludes to, "Stonesy carried that and it had a big effect on the team. There would be times when he used to have half a dozen turn up for training and then the others role up the next day just to play and that was it. You can't operate like that and I really felt for Stonesy. It must have been frustrating. That was the lowest point. Lee took it over after the team was relegated and thrown out of Pirbright and homeless. It was Lee's early conversations with the Army FA to help provide a home to have a firm base was key.

We were then able to bring coaches in such as Lee Barry and Scotty Ralfe."

"At the time I was on my Level 2 with the Army FA and Steve Stone. My involvement was just to observe matches. Little did I know it but the second time I came to visit I became involved with the coaching and a season and a half later I became the manager. We were all finding our feet as new coaches at the time. Nowadays we have a full squad turn up for training and have a strength in depth that has paid off. "We had a lot of players come through too and didn't have the consistency at the time of regular players. Back in 2016 we only had one Army player, Adam Wakley whereas now we have 6/7 Army players that we have been able to develop. The consistency has opened interest within the units which has been of help too. There used to be an abundance of talent in the Infantry when they won the league in the late 90's with many Combined Service standard players."

After winning Massey Division 2 in 2017 unbeaten throughout the season the club has just kicked on from there due to the huge enthusiasm provided from within.

Capt Blair continues explaining how he became manager and how they started to professionalise the organisation. "Our manager went on a sixmonth deployment and we weren't sure what our roles were. Wagsy made a key decision and appointed me as Manager. We had Scotty Ralfe, Leighton Wilks. Mark Rider became Kitman and Matt Little, originally the kitman, showed a real aptitude for analysis. We started to record all our matches and the players were receptive to this as they could see what they were doing well and what they could do better. We approached the PCRF in Aldershot for physio support and this worked well. The care and attention from the side-lines were important too. We stretched all of this. We even got a couple of Wheely bins from Rushmoor Borough Council to pack with ice and cold water for when the players came off from training that they would use. Marginal gains but really important because it has worked."

The outset of Covid-19 has provided challenges to every household, every business, every Army unit. For the Infantry it came at the worst time too as they were just 90 minutes from the final match of the 2019/20 season with a winner takes all situation with the Royal Engineers. That match was cancelled and the season null and voided. That produced its own difficulty for Jimmy and the interaction of his players.

He continues, "There is no face to face contact on a regular basis for Corps teams as we are not together daily in the same unit. To have 15 months without meet ups or contact due to Covid-19 was a challenge. To not be able to complete last season was a frustration especially as we knew that if we beat the Royal Engineers, we would have won the Massey and I truly believe we would have won the match. The worry was that the winning formula would disappear. We kept in touch via What's App and set them challenges and kept interaction going. I do believe our players look forward to coming to training. We involve them in everything and have little incentives including presenting an Infantry coin on debut for each player. These things are so important."



"When we returned this season and got to November and another lockdown there was a tiny belief that we would come back in December or, at the latest, January. When it carried through and the new strain started to develop, we thought the season could be cancelled again. Conversations started in February/March time with the Massey Secretary, Matty Barton and the Army FA and it was a wait and see but we did have a belief that there was an intent and desire to get the season back up and running at some stage with the league to be the priority which was encouraging."

"The re-start was a "do and die" for us. We knew that if we hadn't won that game versus Royal Engineers then we would have had it all to do. They have been our main competitors and we have had some battering's from them during my time. They have that winning mentality over the years that we hadn't yet achieved. It was probably the most nervous I have been in my time as manager, but we won 2-1 and I knew then that I believed we would do it."

"It has been hard work. My biggest achievement in football to date. I am immensely proud of everybody involved from General Tom (Coppinger-Symes) who was our President to Col Simon Brown who was our Chairman. Lee Waghorn, "Mr Infantry" right from the beginning. All the coaching team. There has been so much hard work put in. Now we are on that board in Garretts we have cemented a bit of a legacy. The aim must be that we continue to hit the right standards and continue the challenge. The sign of a good team is to keep getting your name on that board. The bar has been raised and we have to match that."







After careful consultation the 2020/21 Army Challenge Cup competitions was cancelled in May 2021. The Army FA were proud to be in a position to complete the 2019/20 competitions despite the Covid-19 restrictions and also to commence with the 2020/21 competition, even though the majority of county associations decided not to stage their own senior cup competitions.

The Army Challenge Cups (Major and Minor Unit) were due to re-commence after Easter leave in mid-April in line with the Covid-19 NGB guidelines, lifted on 29 March 21. At this stage both the Major and Minor Unit competitions had a heavy backlog due to the suspension of the competition in November 2020. However, a plan had been devised to complete with a stringent calendar that would have ensured each round being competed for on Wednesday afternoons from 14 April through to the original finals day of 23 June.

Direction was provided to all remaining teams in the competition to make a commitment to comply with the strict dates announced. It was always going to be a tall order to complete but we were prepared to give it a go. A subsequent Army HQ ABN was announced post Easter limiting all Army football matches up to 17 May 2021 to be "Intra Garrison" only. Due to this the cup competitions were duly suspended.

Throughout the second lockdown from Christmas onwards it had been Army FA policy to ensure that all 2020/21 competitions be concluded by 30 June 2021 in order for the 2021/22 season to be able to commence in August with the hope



that Covid-19 restrictions will, by then, be lifted allowing to return to a "normal" football season without any outstanding matches from the previous season.

It was deemed that it would not be possible to complete the competitions within the specified time limits. The Army FA did not take this decision lightly. It is the first time since 1899 (Boer War) that the competition has not be completed outside of the two world wars.

The 2021/22 Major and Minor Unit competitions will commence in September. All affiliated Unit Secretaries will receive an invite via email nearer the time.



Maximising participation in the 'Soldier's Game' though flexible, inclusive and accessible playing opportunities for all

It has proven to be a challenging year for grassroots Unit Football as Coronavirus restrictions severely hampered the fixtures programme throughout the season. The decision to cancel both the Army Challenge Cup and the Minor Units Cup was taken following careful consideration and after all possible options for their continuance were explored. However, covid restrictions made it simply impossible to complete the competitions in the 20-21 season. Equally, it was not possible to complete any of the League programmes in the UK Regions, with Unit Football limited to the arrangement of ad-hoc friendlies and Arms and Services competitions completed during those occasions when restrictions allowed.

However, as we look forward to the upcoming 21-22 season, it is now possible to see a brighter future ahead, and League Secretaries and Unit Football Officers are now actively planning for the return of Unit Football. It is anticipated that all UK Regional Leagues will recommence in the late Summer, and much work is currently ongoing to increase both Team and Player registrations with the Football Association. A number of events to kick start grassroots football are in the planning phase, notably a proposed Festival of Football at Catterick Garrison which will make use of the excellent new 4G facility at Wavell Road. Likewise, the long overdue Army FA Super Cup between the Regular and Reserve Unit champions from season

19-20 will herald the start of the new season, and we look forward to the return of both the Army Challenge Cup and the Minor Units Cup in 21-22.

As always, Unit Football is reliant upon the commitment and support of League Secretaries and Unit Officials. The summer posting cycle has seen a number of notable changes, and we say thank you and farewell to SSgt Garsrud (UK North League Secretary), SSgt (SSI) Noble (UK South

League Secretary and Sgt (SI) Crame (UK Midlands League Secretary). Correspondingly, we welcome Sgt (SI) Lowe, SSgt (SSI) Charles and SSgt (SSI) Hull to the team.



ARMY UK NORTH LEAGUE OVERVIEW

This season has been a frustrating one. Safe to say its been very stop-start but units have tried their best to play as many games as possible. No leagues or Cups were able to be finished and therefore the majority of the games were friendlies (adhering to the Covid-19 guidelines). Some units have managed to play at least half a dozen friendlies which is impressive considering the challenges faced this season.

The annual Royal Signals football competition, the McBean Trophy, is without doubt a sporting highlight in the Corps' calendar. It is named after Major Tony McBean, a brave and gifted goalkeeper who was an influential member of the Corps team for over 20 years, first as a player, then goalkeeping coach and finally Assistant Coach. This role he embraced with enthusiasm, passion, and pride right up until he tragically lost his life to motor neurone disease in 2016.

The McBean Trophy is the Royal Signals' inter-Regiment cup competition. Previously designated The Signaller Cup, the competition was renamed in 2017. The very last Signaller Cup final in 2016 was played in the North East at Consett FC, Tony's local club; he presented the trophy to 1 Signal Regiment after a thrilling game against 3 Signal Regiment, a befitting end to the competition.

The very first McBean Trophy final saw 22 Signal Regiment beat 1 Signal Regiment, again at Consett FC. The winners were presented the McBean Trophy by Claire, Tony's wife, watched by his two lovely daughters and in front of friends, family and the Corps' football community.

Brigadier Niall Stokoe OBE, Chairman of Army Football Association, said "When I think of Tony (which is still very often) I am always drawn to remember how, in the depths of his illness when even messaging was hard, he still texted me about football. I know how difficult it was for him to do it, but when Spurs played Newcastle he couldn't resist - he had to do it. And I had to reply and, if Spurs were winning, spare him no quarter and in those moments it wasn't me texting my dying mate but rather me texting the mad-as-a-box-of-frogs goalkeeper and ludicrously optimistic

Geordie fan with whom I played so many matches. He lived and breathed the game, he lived and breathed being a soldier and that this trophy will always bear his name will be forever fitting."

"The McBean Trophy is an important part of Royal Signals Football, providing an opportunity for all our units to compete against one another. Over the years the competition has highlighted new talent and has provided a number of surprise results, I suppose the beauty of the beautiful game! The McBean Trophy, named after our fellow footballer, much missed friend and Corps legend, Tony McBean, is played in the absolute spirit of the game; with total commitment, a desire to do everything for your team and teammates and of course, with a will to win." - Lt Col Simon Smith, Chairman of Royal Signals Football Association, Commanding Officer, 30 Signal Regiment.

This year, the final was between 21 Signal Regiment and 30 Signal Regiment, significant as both Regiments held a special place in Tony's heart. Tony was the Regimental Sergeant Major of 21 Signal Regiment, prior to becoming the Corps Regimental Sergeant Major. 30 Signal Regiment was the last unit that Tony served with and provided close support to Tony and his family on behalf of the Corps. After an absolutely thrilling match (even better than watching England beat Germany in our opinion), 30 Signal Regiment came out as 5-3 winners, with two goals being scored in extra time. Congratulations to everyone that took part, it really is a very special Corps competition.

FUTURE PLANS



We will see the return of the extremely popular inter unit tournaments, the Open Invitation 1966 Commemorative Cup, Steerment - Carter Shield and the Army Women's Sixes. The 21/22 season will also see the return of both the UK North Cup, Southern Cup (9v9) and newly developed leagues. The winners of the regional cups will battle it out for the converted Women's Challenge Cup. Units interested in entering any competition are requested to register with the Army FA and inform the Women's Director of Football who can both offer advice and give additional details (John.Normanton649@mod.gov.uk).

Trials will shortly be advertised for both the Senior Representative Team and the Amazons Development Team. Both teams will be working closely with all Corps managements to both open up opportunities and develop players. Additional community engagements, utilising the power of sport will also be developed over the forthcoming season with teams from all levels being invited to support.

INTRODUCTION

LCpl Amy Cassidy assigned to 22 Signal Regiment, is a Network Engineer who thrives under pressure & with that brings Success to her individual goalkeeping performances.

In early May our Secretary Major Billy Thomson was approached a week before the FA Cup Final as to whether the Army FA could help to provide 80 flag bearers for the match between Leicester City and Chelsea.

Wembley Stadium played a role in the UK Government's Events Research Programme with regards to Covid-19. The programme involved a series of pilot events in England in April and May 2021. These pilot events incorporated research studies to gather evidence on the risks associated with COVID-19 transmission.

After discussing the opportunity with Chairman, Brigadier Niall Stokoe OBE, invitations were provided to a wide range of activity within Army football involving Men and Women's corps sections and match officials.

SSgt Luke Spires (RAPTC), based at MOD St Athan, was one of the flag bearers and recalls the occasion with fondness. He told **The Soldiers' Game**, "Although the match was on the Saturday, we also had to attend dress rehearsals on the Thursday prior to the game. After an epic drive from Cardiff to London we were met at the gate and everybody was friendly and extremely helpful.

"The team that then hosted us were very attentive and made us feel at ease with what may happen. Apart from the lack of knowledge on how it would all work and the mechanics behind it all, we seemed to move around and changed a lot in terms of how we were coming on, what direction we were opening the flags, how they wanted them folding etc. This was only due to the fact they hadn't staged such an event with regards to football. Once we had established an end state, in true military fashion we devised a plan to execute and their team seemed very content."

As part of the Covid-19 pilot scheme to ease back supporters into stadiums it had been announced that up to 20,000 fans would be admitted into the stadium with all having to provide evidence of a recent negative lateral flow test in order to enter the stadium. This was an advancement on the previous season where the FA Cup, whilst completed, saw the final played behind closed doors.

Saturday was the business end of the Flag bearing arrangements as SSgt Spires continues,

"Saturday Matchday – Well what a day. As a football fan and the restrictions of COVID I believe that the day ran as smoothly as it could with the mix of those that attended the Thursday and those that didn't.

"It was truly an honour to represent the Armed forces on such a stage and we hope that the Army FA got Hash tagged in on social media platforms by all those that put pictures up. The troops performed professionally and were a good advert for the Army under the strict eye of Major Gould who oversaw the proceedings.

"Thank you to the Army FA on behalf of all of us that attended for giving us the opportunity, it was a great day".

The opening ceremony saw British singersongwriter Becky Hill sing the National Anthem alongside B positive Choir and the Band of the Coldstream Guards. The presentation part was led by Prince William, Duke of Cambridge, the President of the Football Association. Leicester won the FA Cup for the first time in their history with Youri Tielemans scoring the only goal of the game.

A further six matches for flag bearers has been approved during 2021/22 including the FA Community Shield, England men and women World Cup qualifiers and the Vitality Women's FA Cup Final.









The Soldier's Game, especially within the Army Reserve has been greatly impacted by the Covid 19 pandemic. Due to the geographical national participatory spread of Army Reserve football an early decision was made early March 2020 to stop all football, even before the rest of Army football was halted.




WOMEN'S REPRESENTATIVE FOOTBALL

After the cancellation of the Massey Trophy in 2019/20 due to Covid-19 it was always the aim of the Chairman Lt Col Alex Atherton and Secretary Major Mattu Barton to do everything possible to ensure that the 2020/21 competition would be completed. When Covid-19 originally intervened in March 2020 Royal Engineers and Infantry were due for a final day face-off in Chatham with both teams level on 19 points from their nine matches completed. It was also a reprieve for AAC who had only collected one point from their eight matches. Roual Signals and REME would have been in a battle to avoid the play-off spot. In Division 2 Royal Artillery were well clear winning seven of their eight matches and eight points ahead of RAPTC who did have games in hand.


It was, therefore, fitting that not only was the Massey Trophy able to resume in May 2021 but to also conclude with Infantry and Royal Artillery winning their respective divisions. Due to the Covid-19 restrictions and the fixtures having to be completed by 30 June 2021 the decision was that each team would play each other once. It was fitting that both divisional champions had 100% records. Infantry returned to actions in positive fashion recording victories at their Aldershot 3G headquarters versus Royal Engineers (2-1) followed up with a 3-1 success versus Royal Signals to secure the title for the first time in 17 years. The trophy and medals were presented by Lt Col Alex Atherton in Calne after a last day 3-0 win versus REME on a windswept wet day in Wiltshire. On the same day long standing stalwart of Army Football, Lt Col (Retd) Tony Workman presented the Bulmer Cup, the annual trophy played for the two corps.

The AAC were relegated from Division 1 after gaining promotion in 2018/19.

Royal Artillery, needing a point from the match, concluded their season with a 4-0 success versus Int Corps at their Larkhill home. 15 goals in their five matches was testament to the strength of the champions who, in the past two seasons have won 11 of their 12 matches and can count themselves worthy and deserved winners. The Division 2 Trophy and medals were presented by Regimental Corps Colonel Sam Shepherd MBE who gave a rousing post-match congratulatory speech.

It just left for one remaining match to determine the final placings in the Massey. The RLC, who finished second bottom of Division met RAC, runners up in Division 2. Played in Bicester on the last day of June a late goal gave RLC a 2-1 win to ensure they retained their topflight status just four years after they had won the league on three successive occasions.

The decision to focus on the league campaign meant that the Woolwich Cup was cancelled for 2020/21. Plans are already in place to get the 2021/22 season up and running in September. The QUADS Tournament is due to be held between 13/17 September with the Massey due to commence on 24 September.

Ideally the FA would like all Level 2 in flight learners to be complete and signed off by October 2021 and all UEFA B Licence in flight learners by July 2022

As with previous overseas deployments Davy got involved in supporting in country charities and kicked off his efforts initially running a full marathon around his Baghdad FOB home, raising £2500 for Save the Children Iraq, for their Covid relief efforts.

As football is always close to Colonel Davy's heart, and as he did previously in Kosovo, he reached out to other charities working across the country using the medium of football to work alongside the most deprived individuals and communities. As we all know Iraq is still in an extremely fragile state with real security issues and running alongside they have had to deal with the real difficulties of Covid. So Davy had many challenges with making contact with organisations playing football and supporting disadvantaged groups and people.

However, through his links with the United Nations in Iraq, two organisations were highly recommended and he got to know their work and would became very worthy recipients of surplus football equipment from the Army Football Association in supporting their excellent efforts.

The two charities were OROKOM for Relief and Development and Al-Nawaeer Organisation for Development Rehabilitation & Training. OROKOM is a non-profit, non-religious and non-political NGO formed in 2009 aftermath of the sectarian conflict that took place in Iraq in order to build the peace in the community and assist the vulnerable groups which affected by this conflict. They use sport and especially football to break down the barriers. Al-Nawaeer, work with the poorest in Iraqi society providing education, training and employment opportunities. Their model is to empower individuals and communities on a journey towards a stable future for the country and its population.

Covid-19 has provided unique challenges for all and Army Refereeing is no different. We were delighted that some of the 2019/20 season was able to be completed in September 2020 and able to provide a full complement of officials for the Army Challenge Cup Major and Minor Units, Woolwich and Edwards Cups. This was also carried over to being able to field officials for the conclusion of the 2020/21 Massey Trophy in May/June and the appointments of WO2 Dan McLaren (RE), Sgt Leon Bradley (R Sigs), WO2 Graham Cairns (REME) and Capt Andy Desroches (REME) for the Edwards Cup Final at Cirencester Town FC. Congratulations are also due to WO2 Niall Anderson (R Sigs), W01 Simon Towe (Infantry) and Cpl Luke Quinton (REME) for their appointment to the delayed 2019/20 Reserve Cup Final between 4 Lancs and 154 Regiment RLC, played at Annan Athletic FC in July.

Looking ahead to the 2021/22 campaign the challenge of retaining referees will be hugely balanced with the resumption of acquiring new officials through the basic referee courses. Indeed, the gap between the last course prior to the inception of Covid-19 and the July 2021 course in Grantham was 20 months; during that time close to 100 individuals expressed an interest in becoming a referee.

In line with the recent submission of the 2021/2024 FA strategy to reinvigorate The Soldiers' Game we have been set targets by our governing body and we relish the challenge faced to achieve. During the course of the season the following has been set:

Recruit 43 officials,

Convert 26 officials (Trainee to Level 7)

Progress (promote): 12 officials

Retain 136 officials.

During Covid-19 training and development has changed within the Football Association structure with an initial online course required prior to face to face activity headed up by Andy Halliday MBE, recently appointed as the voluntary Referees' Development Officer (RDO) supported by Tutors Simon Thorburn, Dan Smith and Chris Steadman.



It is also imperative that we reinvigorate the interests of those referees who have re-registered but have not had the opportunity to officiate over the past 18 months or so and need support to get back involved in the game. Divisional training programmes have been or are being devised within the regional committee structure. We are also planning a "Return To Football" RAFA Training Day and Awards dinner for October in Grantham where we will also recognise those who have departed during the past two seasons and we haven't had an opportunity to pay our own tributes and respect.

There has been success with regards to promotions gained within the past season between Levels 7 and 5. The periods were extended and for Levels 5 to 4 all candidates who originally applied during 2020/21 had their applications carried forward to the new season.

The following were successful in gaining promotion:

Levels 7/6: Sgt Leon Bradley (R Sigs), WO2 Graham Cairns (REME), WO2 Rhys Davies (AGC), WO2 Barry Ellison (RLC), SSgt James Garsrud (RAC).

Levels 6/5: Pte Macaulay Antell (RLC) (joins the Army from Hampshire FA), WO2 Dan Bishop (RAPTC), SSgt Gibril Jallow (RLC), Cpl Brian Russell (RAMC), Sgt Shaun Smith (Infantry)

We were also delighted to see Cpl Declan O'Shea (REME) appointed to the Football League list for 2021/22 as a specialist Assistant Referee; just two years after joining the National League list. There is a separate article on this in the review. He joins Capt Steve Finch (RLC) who completed his 150th professional match during last season.

The Army FA were one of 19 county associations to appoint a Mental Health Champion for its Referees with Secretary Graham Brookland appointed. There are plans afoot to develop this with involvement with the "Medicine Ball Challenge and particular military charities supporting ABF- The Soldiers' Charity, Mind and Combat Stress.

15 learners arrived after completing the online Laws of The Game modules (arriving with a better start point & knowledge), & the online safeguarding course. A bigger commitment upfront, which will hopefully result in better retention.

This was an excellent course with all students getting fully involved from the start, which also gave them the opportunity to witness the team of referee developers, WO2 Andy Halliday MBE (RAPTC), Sgt Chris Steadman (RAMC) & Sgt Simon Thorburn (R Sigs) officiate in a fixture. Thanks to SSgt Dan Smith (RE) who provide superb instruction to the course as well, ensuring the first course back had a full team of developers.

them progress in the coming seasons.

Many thanks to Sgt James McNee (RLC) for organising the administrative side in Grantham. This didn't go unnoticed the efforts he put in and made the developers & students life's easier.

The course cost is £120. Learners are expected to pay this to the Army FA before arrival on the course. The registration fee of £20 to the Army and English Football Associations is covered within the course cost. SLC's are not to be used as SOTR through the ASCB is the only method now.

A note on SOTR – Learners will be reimbursed through the Standard of Training Requirement (SOTR) Scheme. This will be completed by the Army FA through the Army Sports Control Board (ASCB). This will cover the face to face training phase of the course and the online Safeguarding course. Learners will receive a reimbursement of £150 on completion of the criteria's set by the Army FA. Criteria's can be found below:

- Completion of 5 fixtures (4 fixtures being open aged).
- Completion of 1 mentor report from a senior official.

Dates have been arranged for the 2021/22 calendar. The face-to-face part of course will take place over a three or four-day period. Dates and locations can be found below:

- Catterick Garrison Monday 13th September 2021 to Thursday 16th September 2021.
- Football Development Centre, Aldershot Tuesday 18th January 2022 to Thursday 20th January 2022.

CPL DECLAN O'SHEA (REME) WAS PROMOTED TO THE FOOTBALL LEAGUE LIST AS A SPECIALIST ASSISTANT REFEREE DURING THE SUMMER; JUST TWO YEARS AFTER PROMOTION TO THE NATIONAL LEAGUE. THE SOLDIERS' GAME CAUGHT UP WITH DECTOREFLECT ON A MARVELLOUS ACHIEVEMENT:

YOUR PROMOTION TO THE FOOTBALL LEAGUE

"Promotion to the Football League has been an ambition of mine since I started officiating. It was always dubbed the 'Hallowed Ground' by colleagues I come through the system with and that no one slips through the net onto the Football League, and successful selection was because you were good enough to be there. I think that's what makes it such a special achievement for me as I've always looked forward to this point. I've been very fortunate to have friends that were/are Football League officials so have always aspired to be where they are and not jealous of them in a nasty way, but jealous in the fact I wanted what they have got and that on its own turned into being a fantastic motivator but also a great support mechanism. The officials I know have offered advice whenever I have asked for and ultimately helped me to achieve promotion."

THE PROGRESS YOU HAVE MADE JUST TWO SEASONS AFTER BEING APPOINTED TO THE NATIONAL LEAGUE.

"The National league is a fantastic division and also a great achievement to obtain that status as a match official, it's real football, the journeys could be hundreds of miles, overnight trips, live TV games and a lot of teams who have dropped out of the EFL and have some very experienced pros playing for them. I think 90% of the division is full time professional which just shows you that it doesn't really fit it's 'Non-League' title."

"I had a really strong first season when I was promoted to the panel which ended with me being appointed Reserve Assistant to the playoff Eliminator between Yeovil and Barnet, I finished high up the merit table but unfortunately made a KMD error by ruling out a goal for Offside which was in fact onside between Fulham v Swansea in a Premier League 2 fixture, this decision alone probably stopped me promoting in my first year, and that's how tight it really is, one KMD error can define your season and I don't think people quite understand the pressures we work under even at that level of the game.

My Second season was much the same without the error, I worked extremely hard on my fitness and image and my technical performance with my coach, and I am by no means the finished article now but I'm certainly better than I was 12 months ago, and I think that the real difference is the work you put in away from match day.

My second season had a few more pressures in terms of tv exposure, I was appointed to seven live games across all competitions, which naturally brings its own challenges.

At the End of Season two I was appointed Assistant Referee to the Play Off Semi Final between Torquay Utd v Notts County, Not only was the game huge because of the competition, it was also another live broadcast game and one of the first occasions fans were allowed in the ground post COVID-19 restrictions, I think there were around 3000 in for the lunch time kick off but it sounded and felt like 10,000 which took so real focus to block out after 10 months of football behind closed doors."

THE ROLE THE ARMY FA HAVE PLAYED IN YOUR PROGRESSION

"I've spoken about the importance of the Army FA in a few other things I have been involved in, and the same applies the support mechanism from everyone top to bottom is second to none, from good luck messages before certain games to openly advertising my success and appointments.

The opportunities are there for everyone if they want them, and the Army FA can facilitate that, the desire to achieve the next level has to come from the individual, but when that desire is shown the Army FA have the tools, the contacts and the capability of making it happen."



A THANK YOU TO ALL

"The List is too long to be honest, there will be people who don't even realise they have helped me along the way, and that could be something as simple as reviewing a clip of a decision for me and giving an honest review, or answering the phone whilst I'm sat in the car travelling to grounds for hours on end and just giving up time in there day to talk about what I'm about to do, and how I can do it well, which sounds very selfish when you say it out loud but it shows how invested people have been in me as well. I think it's important to never lose sight of that. And that's why I try to attend everything I can to support the people at the start of their refereeing journey.

I think I'd be in a spot of bother if I didn't mention the family! From my parents and Sisters who have always shown the support of everything I do to the family members and friends around the country I've called in on randomly for a brew and a bite to eat whilst travelling.

The two that get the brunt of everything though are my wife Jade and Daughter Ruby, they have been there when the bag has been slung in a corner over the years and the words 'I've had enough of this get mouthed' and they have been there watching the live games I've been on and to celebrate when the promotion letters drop. I am hugely fortunate to be able to do what I do and come and go two/three times a week sometimes without question. Without their support, it is absolutely not achievable."

WHAT IT WILL MEAN TO YOU OFFICIATING IN THE FOOTBALL LEAGUE?

"It still has not really sunk in to be honest and I'm not sure it will until Matchday 1 appointments come out. The game of football doesn't change as a concept it just gets technically better and faster, so I will work harder and get fitter to match the challenge. I look forward to the next season and who knows what the future holds, the competition from officials is stronger, and promotion spots are fewer, but I will certainly try to keep progressing."



100 YEARS OF THE ARMY FA REFEREES COMMITTEE


COMMEMORATIVE BROCHURE

During the initial lockdown in March 2020 Referees' Secretary Graham Brookland noticed in the archives that the Army FA Referees' Committee was formed in October 1920 and that during the course of the 2020/21 season it would celebrate 100 years of existence.

In order to commemorate the centenary appropriately he decided to author a small brochure highlighting the achievement. He told The Soldiers' Game, "Initially the plan was for a 12/16-page documentation of the key events. However, after delving into the archives more thoroughly it was quite apparent that, to do justice to a wonderful organisation, it would warrant more pages. Once I started to view the history it was obvious that there was so much to cover. I then met with Major Retd Eric Trengove who, as part of his many voluntary roles with Army Refereeing over the years he was a former Editor of the Referee's magazine. Eric provided me with all the magazines dating back to the 1960's. They were fascinating to read."

"I then decided that I wanted to capture as much as I could. Every Cup Final during those 100 years to every committee member and Chairman. Every achievement that was recorded to individual contributions from the current era with people like Andy Halliday MBE who officiated in the FA Cup Final only five years ago to Danny McDermid who was the last Football League Referee in the Army. Then from the past with characters such as Ray Coleman who was a Football League official in the 1960's and still registers with the Army FA to this day; Ray is 90 during the 2021/22 season. Former Secretary Brian Le Breton provided a detailed article too and it just grew and grew. The most noticeable aspect of putting the brochure together was the fondness everybody who I spoke to had with regards to their time as an Army FA Referee; for many it was highest point of their Army life. They spoke with such affinity and passion."

"By the time the brochure was completed we were on 104 full colour pages. The aim was to cover the extensive history whilst also looking to the future too. I am pleased with the response and grateful to all those who helped support the project and those who sent goodwill messages on receipt of the publication. I want it to be a record of the wonderful achievements that have been made within Army FA Refereeing over that 100-year period. There are some phenomenal pieces of history recorded."

ENJOY THE READ.



We were sorry to learn of the passing of **Tony Collins** on 08 February 2021, aged 94. Tony, the first black manager in the Football League, was originally spotted through Army Football, just after WW2.

A remarkable man Tony had an active Football League career covering over 300 appearances at York City, Watford, Torquay United, Crystal Palace and Rochdale. In 1960 he became the first black English Football League manager when he took charge of Rochdale and led them to the 1962 Football League Cup Final: a remarkable feat for a Fourth Division club. After seven uears in charge at Spotland Tony had started to make a name for himself as an exemplary scout with an eye for talent. He made a huge impression as Chief Scout and Assistant Manager to Alan Dicks at Bristol City as the club progressed to Division One during the most successful period in their history. He was also Chief Scout at Leeds United under Don Revie and continued to work for Revie when he became England manager in 1974. After another stint at Elland Road he joined Manchester United for whom he worked for between 1982 and 88 responsible for the signings of players such as Paul McGrath and Lee Sharpe. Tony also worked for QPR, Newcastle United, Millwall and Derby County in a distinguished career.

It was, however, through Army Football that Tony was originally spotted. As a teenager during the war Tony played for local club Acton United. He then signed as a junior player for local Football League side Brentford. In January 1944 he received notification to join the Army eventually joining the REME as Cfn A Collins 14735335 after basic training. He originally took up Boxing in the Army but was not so keen. After a posting to Italy a football team from "639 Platoon" was formed to play other units

in the area. A league followed shortly after and Tony became the heartbeat of the team that won the league and cup on a regular basis.

Tony actually caused some concern when he organised a challenge match with some of the locally held German POWs. His CO was somewhat unsettled as he pointed out to Tony that there would be some "very unwelcome consequences for the British if the POWs won the game". Tony scored several goals in the game and the Germans were well beaten on the day. A follow up game was, however, not arranged on instruction from above.

When Tony left the Army as a 21-year-old in 1947, he was approached by Sheffield Wednesday manager Eric Taylor. It all emanated after one of Tony's colleagues in the Army, Pte Ibbotson of C.M.F had written to the Yorkshire club recommending his talents. Taylor responded by letter stating to Tony, "I have had you recommended by Pte Ibbotson as a promising inside left, and I extend an invitation to you to take part in a trial with us at the earliest date convenient to yourself. I look forward to an early reply from you and enclose stamped addressed envelope".

Tony duly attended a trial and was signed by Sheffield Wednesday. It was the start of a flourishing life in football and also, by chance, saw him meet his future wife Edith Murdoch. Edith had served in Italy at the same time as Tony and was the confidential secretary to the Director of Mechanical Engineering (REME). However, whilst catching each other's eye in Italy once they had never spoken. By surreal chance they bumped into each other whilst Tony was at a cinema in Sheffield after signing for Wednesday. They made their introductions and started talking. Tony and Edith married in 1949 and were together until Edith sadly died in 1989.

We are delighted to be forming a partnership with The Football and War Network and will be providing more detail in our 2021/22 Mid-Season Review with regards to the partnership and how we will be working together in the future.

The Football and War Network was formallu launched in 2016 and is based at the Centre for Historical Research, University of Wolverhampton. The Network is made up of military, football club, and other historians who have an interest in the link between football, the military and war. It aims to bring together historians from the academic and football worlds so that for the first time all the academic, practitioner and fan research centred around football, war and history can link up. The Network discusses and disseminates subjects such as: football and the two world wars; footballers involved in armed conflict; football clubs and their relationship with the armed forces; social impact of football on the populace during times of war; the military and political implications of the role of footballers and football clubs during times of armed conflict. In the main, this covers the period 1900-1965.

The Network's activities include firstly, holding seminars at both the University of Wolverhampton and individual football clubs such as Charlton Athletic, Exeter City, Dulwich Hamlet and Solihull Moors.

Secondly, running bespoke school-based football and history projects providing them with football club historians who run sessions on the history of their clubs, incorporating aspects of football, the military and war. These are curriculum-linked school projects for three distinct groups of students. Firstly, for mainstream Year 4 and 5 primary school children. Secondly, for disengaged Year 9 students

in mainstream secondary schools. Thirdly, for Year 9 students in Special Educational Needs and Disability schools. The project is based on social and military history as well as the history of the club. The aims of these school-based projects are: to help children and young people develop their curriculum understanding of history using football and military historical artefacts; and to develop curriculum literacy and numeracy skills with a number of activities. To date these have been run in both Bedfordshire and Oxfordshire.

Thirdly, the Network has created a free access website that has a number of resources that can be accessed and downloaded, as well as an ever-expanding Network Blog Article series that now has 80 articles written by all types of individuals from different walks of life. All these activities are supported by an active Twitter account that has helped to create a vibrant collegiate network of like-minded individuals and organisations who share information and resources, as well as assisting each other and anyone else with research on either particular events or individuals that have a football and military/war link.

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
