#### Chair: Brigadier Niall Stokoe OBE (2015)

Joined the Board in 2015 with initial responsibility for Men/Corps representative football. He replaced Major General "Mitch" Mitchell MBE as Chairman in April 2020.

A former Chairman of the Massey League who has also served as Chairman, then President of Royal Signals Football. Played from regimental level through to Army Crusaders (for whom he still plays for) and is a Youth Coach in the civilian world.



#### Vice Chair: Colonel Sam Shepherd MBE (2021)

Sam was appointed the first female Vice Chair of the Army FA in July 2021 replacing the outgoing Colonel Colin Francis CBE. Sam has been the Corps Colonel of the Royal Artillery since 2019.



#### Mr John Taylor (2013)

The longest serving Trustee, John is the Independent representative on the Board. He has served that position since 2013. An extensive football background is primarily through the Middlesex FA where he has been Chairman since 2011 overseeing the move to a new HQ in Northolt in 2018; a community development that includes two 3G pitches. He also serves as an FA Councillor too.

Dave has been the Army Reserve Trustee since 2015. I am very pleased to report to you that we returned to football in stunning fashion. At unit level, the leagues and Army Cup were up and running from the off and we competed in 7 and 5 a side formats too. At the Corps level both the Women's and the Men's seasons went extremely well with the Massey's two divisions competing as well as the Edwards and Woolwich Cup for Women and Men respectively. For the Women's Corps competitions, it was a particularly significant season with the 1st and 2nd Divisions being named after Cpl Channing Day, an Army player killed whilst serving with the RAMC in Afghanistan, and Lily Parr, the first professional English Women's footballer. It was poignant to be able to hold the final games of each in Aldershot with Channing's parents there to present the trophy for the first time.

As I look forward to the coming season, I am very pleased to report that the Chief of the General Staff has accepted the position of President of the Army FA and that we will, with both the Army SM and DCGS as Vice-Presidents, have fantastic representation for our game at the very highest levels of the Army. - In conjunction with the Army FA Office ensure we remain compliant with safeguarding regulations as a Bd and a game.

- To deliver Flexible playing opportunities for all in order to increase participation in Unit Football.
- To deliver Inclusive playing opportunities for all in order to increase participation in Unit Football.
- To deliver Accessible playing opportunities for all in order to increase participation in Unit Football.
- Provide the support to the Regional Secretaries in order to fulfil the above and ensure they receive the necessary recognition.

#### **WOMEN'S FOOTBALL**

- Develop Women's grassroots football at Unit level whilst continuing to enhance our successes within the Inter-Corps Leagues and Cup Competition.
- Secure sponsorship for the Inter-Corps League and Edwards Cup competition.
- Widen the reach of Army representative football across all parts of the UK through carefully selected fixtures and locations.

#### **MEN'S FOOTBALL**

- Widen the reach of Army representative football across all parts of the UK through carefully selected fixtures and locations.
- Further professionalise the representative set-up and player experience to facilitate development as players, as a team and most importantly, as people.
- Develop closer relationships across all 3 representative sides to facilitate mentoring, learning and development opportunities and share ideas and best practice.



## ARMY RESERVES & ARMY CRUSADERS

- Joint training weekends between the Men's and Women representative teams, continue integration on future OSV. With the 2022-23 season planning an OSV to North America for the beginning of 2023-24 season.
- Women's representative team to maximise and build on the historical win against Army Women in 2021-22
- Army Reserve football to be selected as the organisation to participate in a funded OS Defence Engagement - possibly the Balkans.
- Staff succession strategy looking at the future especially in terms of senior leadership team.
- Formal recognition of the Army Reserve Men's Master's Team.

#### **ARMY CRUSADERS FC**

- To organise centenary celebrations, with a range of games, an overseas tour concluding with a centenary dinner.
- To make sure that Army Crusaders FC remains a representative football team and receives the necessary funding and support.
- Seek to expand the Army Crusaders and incorporate a Womens' representative side.

#### FOOTBALL DEVELOPMENT

- Increased participation via more formats of the game including Futsal, 7 v 7's, Walking Football and Master's Football.
- Coach education relevant to the requirements of the adult 11 v 11 game at Unit, Corps and Representative level.
- Support and mentoring for new coaches (incorporating 11 v 11 and wider formats), with positive action to enhance diversity and the Women's game.

#### **OFFICIALS**

- We shall continue to time Referee courses to coincide with Army FA competitions, thereby enabling new referees the chance to referee straight away.
- We shall take advantage of the FA's accelerate pathways for promotion to level 5(5ABC) whilst retaining the ability to train our own referees to level 4 and we will continue to pursue this avenue.
- We will be aiming to supply 3 officials to every game at Corps and above level and are looking to appoint an all-female team for the first female Corps fixture 22/23.
- Underpinning shall be CPD for all referees as well as the ensuring the continued requirement for tutors and mentors is addressed.

## WELCOME..... SECRETARY ARMY FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION

It is a privilege to be appointed as the new Secretary of the Army Football Association replacing Major (Retd) Billy Thomson BEM. Billy and I have worked closely over the past 15 years. We have had some great times and have developed many memories. Billy leaves the role with great distinction having been a fine ambassador over 21 years not just within the Army but for the Football Association too. I take this opportunity to wish Billy the happiest and healthiest of retirements.

I have been fortunate to work within the football industry for most of my working life. I will always be proud to be the Co-Founder of Aldershot Town Football Club as a mere 25-year-old when Aldershot FC was liquidated and lost its Football League status in 1992. We spent 16 years from being initially accepted into the 3rd division of the Isthmian League before finally reaching our target of returning the name of Aldershot to the Football League in 2008. During my time "within the walls" at Aldershot I served as full time Company Secretary for a decade and also, in the later Football League years, held the post as Head of Media including when the club reached the last 16 of the League Cup before playing Manchester United in the 4th round in 2011. These days I have reverted back to standing on the terraces as I did originally as a seven-year-old without any official involvement, but we retain strong links between the two organisations. Locally to the Army FA

HQ area I am proud to be the Vice Chair of the Aldershot Divisional Football Association which has a huge military heritage dating back to 1894. It was a day of personal pride for me when I was able to author a book "To Make A Dream Survive" in 2015 sharing the unique journey covering those experiences. (It's available on Amazon!!).

I have, however, developed a firm passion for the Army Football Association since replacing the legendary Brian Le Breton in October 2007. During that time, it has been a pleasure to be involved in so many aspects viewing the progression of the Association watching the noticeable enthusiasm and commitment from so many participants them players, management, coaches. administrators or, indeed, referees. The period of 2014/18 included so many commemorative occasions that were a joy to be involved in too. Being able to view the growth of so many areas of the sport has been comforting and rewarding. People make that happen and we must never rely on the fact that somebody will step into the role when another person vacates. It is our responsibility with the mechanisms we possess to identify, encourage and nurture-to help and support.

One of the most inspiring parts of that period has been as Secretary of the Referees'. To see so many officials progress from their basic course and progress through the levels to national football has been enlightening. Perhaps more remarkable has been the noticeable proactivity from those who have reached the higher echelons giving back their time to the next batch of Army officials. It is a wonderful camaraderie that has worked. The greatest example I can give is from 2016.





When Andy Halliday MBE officiated in the FA Cup Final between Manchester United and Crystal Palace only to follow four days later by taking a group of basic referee course students to the Army Sixes on Queens Avenue in Aldershot to mentor before taking charge of the Sixes Final. That photo of Andy with his FA Cup and Army Sixes medal epitomises to me what Army football should be all about. Giving back to help those who want that support and guidance to be able to make something of themselves for the benefit of the organisation too.

Travelling around the country last season from watching pure delight from teams competing in the Army Sixes or UK North Sixes through to seeing what it means to means to win the Edwards or Woolwich Cup. From small sided through to 11 a side I love to see the participation and enthusiasm and want to see more of it. It is a fantastic sight to see.

In my first year in the role of the Army FA's Diversity and Inclusion Trustee, I had a straightforward mission – to achieve the minimum level within a benchmarking scheme for equality. This was the UK Equality Standard for Sport Scheme which is used by the wider FA. This work involved analysing the diversity of our board members and staff, reviewing our publications and communications and ensuring that we were stating our unequivocal commitment to Diversity and Inclusion at all levels of the game. We achieved the Foundation Standard Level in February 2022.

To some degree, the foundation level is a check list of the minimum requirements and to go further in this scheme we must look in greater depth at what Diversity and Inclusion really means to us within Army FA. The Chair is clear on the need for Army FA to be a place of opportunity which welcomes all who have the desire and aptitude for the game.

By doing further benchmarking the board can identify who we might not be reaching and how we can break down any barriers. We can look at ways to increase Army football's capacity to act as a force for good within the communities we live among. I look forward to starting that work with the help and cooperation of everyone in Army FA.




#### **MAJOR STEVE CLOUT**

On the 1st August 2022 Steve moved to a full-time post at the Army FA as Assistant Secretary and Referees' Secretary. Many of you will know Steve as the Secretary for football in the Army Reserve, a role he has held for the last twelve years. I was humbled and honoured to be appointed Head Coach of the Army Men's Senior Team towards the end of August 2021, a prestigious and exciting role with big boots to fill following on from some high-quality Army coaches in recent years. Taking over a team that hadn't played a game since their 1-0 victory against the RAF in March 2020, a team which had lost quality players like Rob Farks and Dan Stoneman, to name but two, was a real challenge but a challenge which I looked forward to.

In October players and staff met for the first time for Training Camp 1, with some familiar senior players returning to the fold and some new faces joining the squad. Training camps between October and December were planned as a develop and rebuild phase, allowing time to get to know the players and opportunities for new and current players to stake their claim for a place in the squad come January 2022.

Our first training camp culminated in a friendly against Aldershot Town Academy team, a fixture that will become a traditional first game of the season and a game that allowed every player the opportunity to play at least 45 minutes of football in an Army shirt, a friendly, but competitive match that resulted in a last-minute goal to give Aldershot Town Academy a 3-2 victory.

November and December saw a repeat of October's camp with more friendlies and more new and current players showcasing their football skills and talent. Our second fixture was held at Billericay Town Football Club to play against Lloyds of London FC, a game in which Jamie Turner & Scotty Hynd scored hat-tricks. Our third fixture was a reinvigorated friendly against the Civil Service FC on a dark cold stormy evening in west London, which finished as a 1-1 draw against a resilient Civil Service side.



With a squad in mind for the IS competition, players were invited back for January and February training camps, which had three tough friendlies planned. In January we drew 1-1 away to a strong Guildford City team, followed by a convincing 5-1 victory against Aldershot Town U23s. In February we travelled away to Windsor FC who hosted us superbly, but unfortunately the result did not go our way on an extremely windy night. But a good phase in which the camps and games enabled the selection of the squad to be fine-tuned in preparation for the IS competition.

Unfortunately throughout the IS competition, I had to watch from afar due to an operational deployment, although I was able to maintain good communications with my coaching staff. First up were the RAF who had come off the back of a comfortable 2-0 win against the Royal Navy; we'd analysed their team and knew this was going to be our toughest test. But we made a fantastic start, scoring within the first few moments of the game, but sadly it wasn't meant to be. A strong and well drilled RAF team took their chances well and won the match and the IS competition at a canter. To their credit, our staff and players regrouped and focussed with real intent for our final game against the Royal Navy, a must win fixture. A couple of experienced players came in to support the team, which the staff and I were grateful of, and they helped contribute to a squad that were determined to show how good they really are. With more emphasis getting our defensive play right, and a few adjustments from the first game, the squad bounced back with a fantastic attitude and togetherness. It was a tough night in Yeovil,

but the players fought hard, withstood some pressure from the Royal Navy, but importantly played their football and demonstrated their potential. The result was a well-earned and well deserved 2-1 win which saw us retain the Mercury Cup.

Over the whole season there were a few players that stood out with some great performances and outstanding commitment. But it was Fus Leigh Phillips that pipped a quality field, and he was named Player of the Season, an accolade and achievement he fully deserved. With 10 Army players selected for UKAF, lots of new talent to look at, and a squad full of confidence and determination, we look forward to next season with real optimism. Already we are better prepared, equipped and organised, ready for the season and the Inter Service games which will fully expect to competitive in.

With the impact of COVID 19 resulting in a pool of players being over-aged for this season's U23s squad, the start of the 21-22 season was heavily focused on identifying talent across all cap badges as we aimed to develop a new crop of future Army footballers. We received some excellent player recommendations by Corps and Regimental coaches and our staff got out and watched as many matches as possible. The new players have added great depth and value to this year's squad, proving that Corps and Regimental football is a great stepping stone to Representative football.

Our first training camp of the season was used to look at players in a competitive environment across two fixtures. The first, on day two of pulling the squad together resulted in a 3-0 defeat to a strong Royal Artillery outfit, followed by a 2-1 win away against an Andover Town XI later in the same week. Further fixtures in 2021 resulted in a 2-2 draw against Fleet Town, a good 2-0 away win in the Aldershot Senior Cup against Wessex side Fleet Spurs and a hard fought 1-0 away win against Devizes Town.

Our first fixture of 2022 was against a good Army Reserves, who we knew would be well-organised and disciplined, which proved to be the case as we struggled to get any momentum in the game. Nevertheless, we remained persistent, and we found a late winner through a Callum Vincent strike to seal a deserved 1-0 win. Two days later, we were away to high flying Godalming Town in the Aldershot Senior Cup QF. With only five minutes left on the clock and 2-1 down, the Army youngsters came back to score twice to win 3-2, with Callum Vincent capping off a fine hat-trick as the team got full rewards for a battling, gritty and hard fought performance with flashes of innate brilliance.

The Inter Services started with a dominant, confident performance against the Royal Navy, which resulted in an accomplished 2-0 victory, a

great start to the competition. Then the second game finished 2-2 in a gutsy draw away to the RAF, another fantastic, well-earned result which should have seen the team deservedly crowned IS Champions. Disappointingly an administrative misunderstanding saw the team receive a deduction in points which resulted in the Roual Navu being handed the trophy after a 3-2 win against the RAF in Portsmouth, Bitterly disappointingly for all involved, though we took solace knowing our performances on the pitch was that of a champion team. We dusted ourselves off and then focussed on the Aldershot DFA Cup semi-final against a very talented Fleet Town outfit. Fleet were well organised and strong and inflicted our first defeat in 9 matches; the prestigious competition was won by Hartley Witney, an accomplished Step 3 team.

On reflection, it was a fantastic, positive season and as Head Coach there was much to be pleased about and immensely proud of; great performances, good results and a crop of promising players with huge potential. Another 8 players had exposure with the senior side this season and 3 former U23 players prior to the COVID pause, Sean Thomson, Jordan Brooks and Scott Hynd, all featured in recent UKAF fixtures, the very top level of military football. Army U23 football continues to have a positive influence on young talented players that have a proven pathway to progress to the highest level of service football.

As we all look forward to what we hope will be another promising season starting early September may I ask if any Regt or Corps coaches have any promising young players that they wish to recommend for the new season, please contact Head Coach @GerwynGriffiths on Twitter.

The 21/22 Season has been a considered success, with wins against the Prison Service and Wales FA, draws with the Army Reserve and RAF and a solitary loss against the Royal Navy. Competitive in every fixture, with enough chances and opportunities to win every game, we suffered with key injuries at early stages of each game, which cost us dearly. Additionally, we lost some of our best players this year, retiring from the Army after full careers. #### **LOOKING FORWARD**

That said, the next 3 years look incredibly busy for us. We are moving forward with vigour and season 22/23 looks particularly exciting with the European Masters' Games (EMG 23) moving to Tampere, Finland in July.

Consequently, the Army Trustees have agreed to support a Trial, which is being planned for early Oct 22, the aim of which is capturing the talent across the Army, in time for EMG 23. There will be little time to rest between events post EMG23, as there is an additional Military OSV being planned for 23/24 as a tour of Australia, where we may have the opportunity to play in the Australian Inter Service Competition in November, Following that, the WMG25 are also being planned for delivery in Taipei in May 2025. The subsequent requirement is to generate a 30 strong team, that is rapidly becoming key activity and we are looking, specifically, for players in the 35+ category in order to provide the best opportunity for success and follow up our Gold Medal performance in Auckland 2017.

#### MASSEY REVIEW - 2021/22

The 2021/22 season began with nervous anticipation following our slow emergence from the global pandemic. Safety was of course, of paramount importance and it was crucial that we maintained a balance between meaningful force protection and competitive competition. We must start therefore, by thanking all players, staff and officials for the extra work and dedication required to simply get the season off the start line; it has been no small feat.

#### **DIVISION 1**

The Infantry were reigning champions following what can only be described as a unique season, and the Royal Engineers, continuing a nice habit, yet again won the Woolwich Cup. The Royal Artillery re-joined the top league following their promotion and producing a good run at the annual Quads tournament. There were certainly no clear favourites from the start.

The Royal Artillery started the season with blistering pace and topped the table after the first handful of games. The 2019 champions, REME got off to a slow start and found themselves at the foot of the table early on. As the season progressed the Royal Engineers strung together a batch of good results at the point where the Royal Artillery started to slip away. Operational commitments hit the Infantry hard which made reaching the standard set in the previous season difficult.

As the season drew to a close, the Royal Engineers found themselves out in front and eventually won the league by 2 points with the RLC coming a close second. The trophy was presented at the RE Corps Football Reunion which fittingly coincided with the 150th anniversary of their FA Cup win. The Infantry were relegated to Division 2 whilst the Royal Artillery were matched against the RAC in the playoff to play in Division 1; the Royal Artillery won the play-off in late June 22.

#### **DIVISION 2**

The 21/22 season was set to be incredibly competitive, with the RAC missing out on promotion after losing in the play-off to the RLC and the AAC sliding to Division 2. It was anyone's guess who would finish top of the league heading into the start of the season.

The RAC set the pace and by midway through the season they were looking unbeatable although in hindsight too many draws were to cost them. The AAC were competing well alongside the RAPTC and were still in contention. The AGC seemed to struggle to find any momentum this year and will be looking to come back stronger next season and the Int Corps and AMS will be pushing hard to be in contention too.

As the season drew to a close, the RAC needed one point from their final game to win the league and gain promotion. As is so often the case in football the visitors found another gear for this

game and won convincingly 3-1. This left the door open for the RAPTC to snatch the league on goal difference if they could win their final two games and overcome a 7-goal deficit. The RAPTC went on to win both games and the league, scoring 11 goals in the process and displaying the benefits of rolling into some important games straight off the back of a successful OSV to Canada. In the playoffs, the RAC faced the Royal Artillery but were unable to get over the final hurdle.

#### INTER CORPS WOOLWICH CHALLENGE CUP

The Inter Corps Woolwich Challenge Cup was introduced in 2007 having been presented by the Royal Artillery to commemorate their departure from Woolwich after almost 300 years. The current holders, the Royal Engineers were looking to retain the trophy in the 150th anniversary of their FA Cup win; yet another trophy they have been known to hold.

The first round of the competition saw REME get a bye whilst the RLC secured their place in the next round by beating the RAPTC by a single goal. The quarter finals saw a goal fest for both teams as the RLC scored 6 goals against the AMS without reply and the REME won their game against the AGC 6-1. The star of the show was striker Greg Peel who bagged himself five goals.

Next up for REME was the Royal Artillery who presented a much stiffer challenge. Both teams were in good form, taking the game to penalties. The REME came out on top with a magnificent performance from their keeper as he saved three penalties. The RLC ran out comfortable winner against the AAC at Aldershot to book their place in the final.

The final took place at Shrapnel Park, home of Gunner football and a fitting tribute to the Woolwich Cup. In a fairly even fist few minutes the REME took the lead through good.

Yet again Cirencester Town looked after us really well and the plan will be to hold it there again next year.

Whilst Women's football is continuing to grow, we need to work on developing grassroots football at Unit level. This is harder to achieve within the women's game due to a lack of numbers in a lot of locations, however my Director of Football, Maj Mark Normanton is working hard in this area and has a number of initiatives that he would like to bring into the game. Capt Caitlin Lower has stepped up to be the Assistant Director of Football and alongside Mark will help develop Unit football by creating a Southern League to match the Northern League (already in existence) as well as running other national and regional tournaments.

The Army FA is also working hard to attract sponsorship for both the Inter Corps leagues and representative teams which I am very grateful for - hopefully the Women's EUROs will create even more interest in Women's football!

The Army Snr and Amazon's Development sides have had a good season which is covered in detail later in the report. Build up work for the Inter-Services went well and I was so pleased to see the fantastic way the teams worked and trained together and how this represented itself on the pitch via some competitive matches. The Inter-Services did not go our way, both games were hugely contested and unfortunately the Army were unsuccessful in the pursuit of the trophu. However, there were some really good lessons learnt and highlights included 6 Amazon plauers stepping up to the Senior Squad; this bodes well for our development as we look forward to the new season. In addition to this we also had 5 players selected for the UKAF Trg camp and Presidents Cup in the Netherlands in May which is fantastic. The Assistant Director of Football has been working hard to set up matches for next season and will be handing responsibility for the Representative teams to Capt Jack Dimmer when he returns from Ops in Jul/Aug. This season both the Snr and Amazons will be conducting training and matches in different regions of the UK. The aim is to try and widen the pool of opposition beyond Aldershot whilst also promoting Army football in areas we don't usually get access to, such as the South-West and North West. This is how QPR's energetic forward Demi Edwards combines her work as a medic [until joining a medical regiment recently, she was working c.30 hours a week full-time in A&E at Frimley Park Hospitall with FAWNL Division South East football. She is a LCpl in the Queen

Alexandra's Royal Army Nursing Corps (QAEANC), employed as a Nurse, and also represents the Army and UK Armed Forces (UKAF) in prestigious matches and competitions in the UK and overseas.

Having grown up in Hereford Liverpool fan Edwards was part of the Wales international youth set-up, but after leaving school, being too far away from big cities and clubs severely restricted her footballing options.

She decided to follow her older sister - also a footballer but her main sport was hockey - in joining the Army.

"I was at that age where I either pushed to pay football full-time by moving to an academy or I had to get a job, and my family couldn't afford it really. So I thought 'well, I can play football in the Army and get paid.""

Her first stint actually ended in Phase 2: "I think I was just young, I was training to be a medic... I made the silly decision to leave, which I regretted quite quickly. Two weeks later, I re-applied." And, after re-joining in 2015, she has never looked back.

Football was absolutely the driver behind her career choice: "Being a footballer, you're naturally into finess and stuff, and obviously the Army is all finess, so it was just an easy decision for me.

"The Army's done amazing things for me and I've had so many opportunities, which I probably wouldn't have got if I had not joined. And realistically, I'd probably have been dropped [by Wales], because of all the girls I was playing International football with only one of them for U19s is now in the International Women's side [Angharad James]."

The 28-year-old is certain that being in the Army has helped her football particularly with being based more centrally so she can find good, accessible and suitable'civvy' (civilian) clubs for her standard; first Crystal Palace and now QPR. Her football also helps her Army life and hospital work in terms of understanding team cohesion and mental health: "If I have a really bad shift, I know I've got training that evening. It takes my mind off it and it keeps me going."

"Edwards says her Army coaches were and are always very supporive in helping find civilian clubs because it's good for the player, and for the team, to be playing regular league football.

All male and female soldiers have the chance to play Corps football for their regimental teams [all 'Cap Badge' sides have a positive 'one club' ethos] against other regiments.

The best, like Edwards, then get to step up to a aquad representing the British Army, with increased competition, training demands and the coaching and surround support to match. They play against high-level oposition, go on overseas tours, as well as taking on the Navy and RAF in the hotly-contested annual Inter-Service tournament. The real cream of the talent, again, like Edwards, are selected for the UKAF squad (from across the three services) and play against European counterparts.

"We played against the Chelsea development team," offers Edwards enthusiastically, as an example, "I'd never, ever have been given that opportunity otherwise, to play against girls at the top level."

What do her teammates at QPR, who have had a very decent season and should secure a top-five finish say abouth Edwards Army career?

"They're always interested and ask a lot of questions about it. One or two recently asked me about joining up and I told them, 'It would be the best thing you've ever done.' They're probably not going to break into the WSL and become professional so, join the Army; you'll be playing football nearly full-time and getting paid for it."



Twenty-four Army Reserve units entered the 2021/22 Army Reserve Challenge Cup with the first-round games kicking off way back in September. This was an excellent turnout post Covid, and everyone was encouraged for the future. With most of the Army Reserve units having to squeeze there military training into the last half of the year finding suitable weekends for matches was a challenge leading to a delayed May final.

The Army Reserve Challenge Cup Final was held at the Aldershot Military Stadium on Saturday 7th May 22.6 SCOTS lifted the trophy for the first time following a 3-1 win over 4 LANCS. A first half goal by Pte Ryan Campbell gave 6 SCOTS a half time lead. Pte Danny McInness scored two in the second half and although 4 LANCS LCpl Jake Swarbrick pulled one back to give the two-time winners a lifeline they could not capitalise on the strike. 6 SCOTS will now meet the Army Challenge Cup holders 4 Regt RLC in the Army FA Super Cup later in the year. The match will be played at the home of 6 SCOTS in Glasgow.

#### **SEASON REVIEW**

Football restarted in the Army Reserve in August 21 when the Men's representative team held a training camp based in Middle Wallop. The Station side provided the opposition for an afternoon training match, there were also fixtures against a Fleet Town XI and a strong Farnham Town side. Three matches and three wins was a great start to what would become an undefeated season. In January the men played out a draw against the U23s before playing and winning against United Hospitals of London. Another draw against the Army Masters team was played at the home of Aldershot Town FC.

The Army Reserve Women's Team had a challenging season with many late pull-outs from their opposition. The team did manage to play the Army Women's Team with a historical 2-0 win.

The Army Reserve Men's Sixes competition was held over a stormy weekend in November 21.





A small number of teams braved the extreme weather that hit the usually sunny Grantham on Saturday. A sunny Sunday morning was more of what the players are used to from a Grantham sixes competition and 152 Regt RLC went on to become Sixes Champions with 81 Sig Sqn winning the plate. All will be glad to know that we will switch the tournament back to the August slot for 2022.

In May both the men and the Women's teams enjoyed the Army Reserve Football training Camp in Cyprus. Based at RAF Akrotiri the women played a Combined Service XI and also participated in the inaugural 5-a-side competition held in Ayios Nikolaos Station. The men played the Royal



Anglian, RAF Akrotiri and the Yorkshire Regiment with three wins out of three, being the only team to beat the Anglian Regiment all season.

The final outing of the season was as part of the Armed Forces Celebrations. The Army Reserve Men and Army Reserve Masters Team played against their respective Scarborough District League XI teams.

Both teams drew which was a fitting outcome for this event which saw a good crowd, media interest and a visit by the Mayor of Scarborough.





#### **SUPER CUP**

In November 4 LANCS retained the Army FA Super Cup defeating 7 Regiment RLC, 4-2, at the Mike Riding Ground, the home of North West Counties League Longridge Town. The match is competed by the winners of the regular Major Unit Challenge Cup and Army Reserve Challenge Cup. This was carried over from the holders of the 2019/20 competition due to the interruption of Covid-19. 4 LANCS, who defeated 21 Engineer Regiment 7-2 in the 2019 final, came from behind to win the match with four second half goals.

The Army FA has been an outstanding supporter of UKAFF. The Army's players, coaches and officials have been vital members of both squads as we returned to our first full season of football since the Covid-19 pandemic. Both the UKAFF Men and Women's team have played several high-profile competitive and friendly fixtures, concluding with the Men's team hosting the Centenary of the Kentish Cup in June '22.



# **UKAF WOMEN**

After nearly 2 years without a fixture, the UKAFF Women's squad became the first UKAF team to return to action post pandemic. In July 2021 we travelled to Hyde FC south of Manchester to play an important and poignant fixture against the GB Police. The fixture was arranged to commemorate and pay respect to the victims of the Manchester Arena terrorist attack. With families of the victims in attendance it was a truly special and moving occasion. After a very competitive 90 minutes the game ended in a 1-1 draw with Sgt Kelly Davis opening the scoring for a dominant UKAFF side, only to see the GB Police team equalise late on.

Next up was a previously arranged Remembrance fixture versus Chelsea Women's Super League Academy squad. The game was well attended virtually via BFBS steam, but also with a crowd of over 550 in attendance at the Kingsmeadow Stadium. The crowd witnessed an outstanding display from UKAFF Women that showcased the talent currently in Women's football across all three services. Chelsea started 7 Youth Internationals and there was even a start for 1st team player, Lauren James, a full England International. UKAFF Women surprised their hosts and took the lead through an excellent counterattack which saw Cpl Olivia Dixon force an own goal from the Chelsea defence.





Chelsea revitalised after HT came flying out the blocks, but some great defending allowed UKAFF Women to hold onto the lead and still create the best two chances at 0-1 through Cpl Dixon and Officer Cadet Jade Widdows. An unfortunate end to the game somehow saw Chelsea managing to score two late goals in the 94th & 97th minute to win the game 2-1.

The season ending fixture saw the Dutch Women's Squad visit the UK for the President's Cup competition in May '22. A very strong UKAF Women side were totally dominant during the first half and could have easily been leading early on, but against the run of play the Dutch managed to score. UKAFF women reacted well and brought the score level before half time through Cpl Olivia Dixon. UKAFF Women produced another dominant 2nd half display and created several chances which they were unfortunately unable to capitalise on. With the game finishing 1-1 at full time, the Dutch secured the win in a 4-3 penalty shootout.





# **UKAF MEN**

UKAFF Men's squad returned to action in Sept '21 with a fixture against Loughborough University at Aldershot Military Stadium. The game finished in a comfortable 4-0 win for UKAFF Men with several new debutants impressing the coaching staff and giving them something to think about ahead of the upcoming Kentish Cup.

Next up was the annual fixture for the Friendship Trophy against the Irish Defence Forces (IDF) which has become one of the most important fixtures for UKAFF – both in terms of squad development but also prestige. As always it was a highly competitive fixture with excellent football on display from both teams. With UKAFF men went into the final stages of the game with a 2-1 lead after going a goal down early in the game, and it looked like the Friendship trophy would be staying in the UK, however the game ended 2-2 after a last-minute equaliser. The IDF took the win on penalties, and the Friendship Trophy travelled back across the Irish Sea for the first time in a few years.

With the Centenary of the Kentish Cup pushed back to Jun '22 due to the inability for the Dutch and French Squad due to Covid travel restrictions, UKAFF Men finished the calendar year with another solid performance with a 1-1 draw against Luton Town FC Academy.

In May '22, in build up for the delayed Kentish Cup, UKAFF Men played another friendly fixture against Loughborough University (winning 6-1) before travelling to Ireland to avenge the loss on penalties, 7 months before. This fixture lived up to its expectations once again with UKAFF taking the win with a last-minute winner (after the Irish had equalised in the 91st minute). An outstanding 2-1 win in Dublin at the home of Shamrock Rovers saw the Friendship Trophy return to UK shores and provided the ideal preparation for the Kentish Cup.

UKAFF Men finished the 21/22 season by hosting the Kentish Cup at Havant & Waterlooville FC. Named after Brigadier General R J Kentish CMG DSO, the Kentish Cup was first played in 1921 with the purpose of fostering relations between Armed Forces. The tournament was originally played for between The British Army, French and Belgian

Forces, but the British Armyhanded the competition to the Combined Services Football Association in 1980. The French temporarily withdrew in 1986 and were placed by the Netherlands. France came back into the competition in 2005 when Belgium withdrew.

The competition took place over the period of the 20-24th June 2022. UKAFF men opened the tournament against the Dutch with a 3-1 win. The Dutch then faced a very strong French team 48hrs later and suffered a 4-0 defeat. This meant the final fixture of the tournament, UKAFF Men against the French, would be the decider. With the French going into the game with the better goal difference, UKAFF needed to win the game to retain the Kentish Cup for a record-breaking 5th time. A highly competitive game saw the French go in at half-time 1-0 up. UKAFF Men dominated the second half and carved out several great chances, scoring an equaliser with 25mins left to play. Unfortunately,

despite constant pressure, the French defence held up and secured a 1-1 draw, regaining the Kentish Cup.

Overall, the 21/22 season has been a great year for both UKAFF squads, with the organisation going from strength to strength both on and off the pitch. As always, we remain indebted to the outstanding support of our sponsors and especially to the single Service Football Associations. Whilst the fixture calendar for 22/23 is still being finalised, it promises to be every bit as exciting with the Women due to travel to the Netherlands for the return fixture of the Presidents Cup, the Men's team hopefully travelling to Gibraltar for a competitive fixture, and both teams hosting their IDF counter-parts in May '23 for the first UKAFF combined fixture.

2021/2022 Season was a difficult season within the UK Midlands with many units still struggling with Covid related issues, return to work and deployments. As we breach out of the Covid hangover and return to some normality the 2022/2023 season is looking much more hopeful, with more teams available and registered. We actively look to encourage sport back within the Army.

Some units who were active preferred to play in the RAF Services Leagues, this is understood to be owing to the increased travel requirements within the Army Midlands Division. Previously, geographically East and West Leagues were created to counter distances, however, due to reduction in numbers it has returned to a single League format. The fact it appears the majority of Midlands Units do not play in Army Leagues has been identified with the Army FA and a matter that will be addressed with the Army FA Leagues Committee to understand the reasons why and how this can be challenged moving forwards.

In total there were only 24 fixtures completed; everyone with at least a referee provided. The Referee section within UK Midlands had 52 registered match officials which included six progressing from trainee and a further six promoted. With a lack of military football in the region Referees have had the requirement of using civilian football more during their promotion packages.



The Army UK South Football League resumed in September of 2021 with some 65 teams entering. It was the first time football had been played in almost 2 years due to the global pandemic and for all it was welcomed addition to the year. Teams had the opportunity to win various leagues, the Major and Minor Unit Cups, the 6-A-Side Competition as well as the overall League Winners Play offs.

The superb She Kicks article featuring Army Medical Service, Army and UKAF player LCpl Demi Edwards (QARANC) further showcased the opportunities within the Soldiers' Game in the UK's most popular female football magazine.

Army Sports Engagement is looking forward to what experiences can be provided for both scholar and soldier in the 22/23 season.

We are also working closely with "player 4 player", https://www.player4player.com/a group of consultants and ex pros Gaizka Mendieta, Emile Heskey, Stiliyan Petrov and Gareth Farrelly in the Midlands. Their company focus on Player care and Player wellbeing. We are aiming to arrange a charity match between the Masters/Vets against retired select Pros in November to highlight Mental Health when Pro footballers and service men and woman retire.



After the turbulence of Covid-19 putting paid to the 2020/21 Army Challenge Cups for the first time outside the war years since 1899 outgoing Trustee Col (Retired) Neil Blenkinsop was keen to emphasise the point of Unit football in his programme notes for both competitions. He stated, "Unit Football is the foundation of all Army Football. It critically underpins and nurtures our higher representative game. The Army FA constantly strives to maximize participation in the 'Soldiers' Game' through flexible, inclusive, and accessible playing opportunities for all. The Army Cup competitions provide an excellent opportunity to deliver on this objective".

This was further endorsed with the excellent number of 124 teams entering both competitions. Add a further 32 for the Reserve Cup and Unit football is indeed in encouraging hands.

The finals didn't disappoint either at the Aldershot Military Stadium.

After disposing of 2020 runners up 3RSME in a seven-goal semi-final thriller 4 Regiment RLC lifted the coveted trophy for the first time since 2006. Pte Terrence Cuffy netted a late winner to cement a 3-2 victory versus 1 Mercians whilst also completing his hat-trick in the process; Cuffy was also awarded the Man of the Match. It had been a tough route to the final for 4 Regt who progressed through the quarter finals with a penalty shoot out success versus 21 Signal Regiment.

Army FA Vice President Lieutenant General Stuart Skeates CB, CBE led the presentation party alongside FA Premier League Referee Chris Kavanagh and Pam Howson, representing Towergate Insurance, sponsors of the Unit Cup competitions for 38 years. The match was also shown live via Forces News Facebook page.

The Minor Units Final saw a new name on the trophy as a first half goal from CSgt Nigel Hanson confirmed a 1-0 victory for RMA Sandhurst (PS)





versus 5 Regiment AAC. 5 Regt's Airtpr Sabin Thapa was awarded Man of the Match. Sandhurst were a formidable opponent throughout the competition netting 27 goals and conceding just once. The post-match presentation party was Army FA Chairman Brigadier Niall Stokoe OBE, Pam Howson from sponsors Towergate Insurance, Army FA Unit Trustee Col Neil Blenkinsop and Col (Retd) Tony Workman OBE.

It was also a rewarding moment for W01 Gavin Bloomfield. The RMA Head Coach also previously led 7 Regiment RLC to Army Challenge Cup Final and also the UK North Major Units Cup whilst at 6 Regiment RLC 2017.

Major (Retd) Billy Thomson BEM retired as Secretary of the Army Football Association in July after serving 21 years in the post; the longest in the history of the association.

Driver Thomson originally joined the Royal Corps of Transport (RCT) in March 1971. On completion of Basic and Trade Training he was posted to 402 Tp, to be part of the ANZUK Force, Singapore. In 1976 he was posted to 68 Sqn Rheindalen BAOR where he played for the Sqn before injury cut short his playing days. Whilst in BAOR Billy coached 4 ADTR before, upon returning to the UK, W01 (RSM) Thomson enjoyed success coaching Junior Leaders Regiment (RCT/RAOC).

In 1991 a posting to Aldershot saw Lt Thomson as Team Manager and Coach of the permanent staff within Depot and Training Regiment RCT. In 1992 they were winners of the Army Minor Units Cup (UK) before travelling to Dusseldorf to win the overall competition. The same year Lt Col (Retd) Stan Goold approached Billy to become Assistant Secretary of the Army Youth team. After a year in that post Capt Thomson was then approached by the Vice Chairman of the Army FA, and at the time Commander of the RCT Training Group, Brigadier Andy Massey, to become Assistant Manager of the Army Men's team. Upon the retirement of the Army Team Manager Lt Col Tony Workman in

1994 Capt Thomson was appointed Team Manager. This also included the same role within the Combined Service Football Association (CSFA) now known as United Kingdom Armed Forces Football Association. (UKAFFA).

During a 10-year period there were many successes including Inter Service Winners (1992/93 and 1993/94 (shared)), South West Counties (1992/93 and 1998/99) and Kentish Cup (1996 and 1998) This was alongside successful Defence Engagement tours over the years to Mauritius, South Africa, Brazil, Thailand, Nepal and later to Croatia; the latter saw the Men's senior team visit to commemorate the 65th anniversary of the Liberation of the Dalmatian coast. Tours of Australia and China also took place within the UKAF Football Team.





In 2001 upon the unexpected and sudden death of the Secretary Army Football, Major (Retd) Terry Knight, Major Thomson made the decision to apply for the post. Having been successful with his application, he retired from the Army five years early, and a new career began that would last 21 years.

At the time of his appointment, The Football Association (FA) were just beginning a new Development Strategy, that required all County Football Associations, which Army Football is one, to submit Development Plans. Development/ Strategy plans, which continue today, are linked to FA funding, which is crucial for the progression of Army Football.

He also became the Army Representative on the Football Association Council. A position he has held throughout. During his tenure, he has sat on several committees, Representative Matches, Judicial Panel, and National Game Finance.

As a Representative Match Committee member, Major Thomson became the Vice Chair followed by Chairman of the England C Team which features players who play for clubs outside the Premier League and English Football League. Currently, the majority of selected players are full-time professionals with National League clubs

As Chairman of the England C Team, Major Thomson represented England, at varying tournaments in which the England C Team played, at home and throughout Europe. Competitions which Maj Thomson attended included visits to

Russia, Estonia, Bermuda, Barbados and Turkey.

There have been some huge initiatives during Billy's tenure within Army Football. Over a 20-year span three representative teams has grown to nine, now including Reserve (Men and Women), Crusaders and Masters teams in addition to the growth of a Women's Development team.

A vital period for the Association was in 2011 when the Army FA became a registered Charity alongside the formation of a Board of Trustees under the Chairmanship of Major General Bruce Brealey. The following year saw the Army Sports Control Board's move from the traditional home of Clayton Barracks to Fox Lines, adjacent to the Aldershot Military Stadium and all Army sports facilities.



In 2013 the Army Football Association (AFA), Football Development Centre, (FDC) opened. and was registered with the FA as an approved centre to deliver Coach Education. The facility was a hub of activity hosting courses until the FA's recent swich to online courses.

In May 2013 the Army FA commemorated its 125th anniversary. As part of the celebrations a charity match against an FA Legends team at the Reading FC was organised. The then England Manager, Roy Hodgson, managed the FA Legends team, who were captained by current England boss Gareth Southgate. England U-21 manager Stuart Pearce coached the Army prior to the match and on the day.

2013 was a busy year as it also initiated the Army FA Civil Engagement Road Show where a group of eight soldiers held a UK tour visiting Football League clubs enabling integration with community groups in addition to taking the Army's brand and its people into the heart of the communities. This continued through to Covid-19 when a halt was brought to proceedings. In November the inaugural FA Premier League Under 12 Truce tournament was held in Aldershot hosted by the Army FA. This was defined originating from World War 1 providing educational purposes initiated bu a moving ceremony commencing with An Ode To Remembrance followed by the poem "In Flanders Field" before The Last Post and the laying of wreaths. Billy was always at his happiest if Arsenal were tournament victors!

The period 2014 to 2018 was a special period for the association commemorating 100-year anniversaries of World War 1 and poignant fixtures versus German Bundeswehr. There was plenty of drive from Billy, his staff and the Board of Trustees. It all started in December 2014 at Aldershot Town FC where approaching 3000 spectators attended to commemorate the 1914 Christmas Day Truce. The Armu were 1-0 victors in an occasion that was featured live on the BBC One Show, Guest of honour was Sir Bobby Charlton MBE. This was followed by the "Over the Top" commemoration of the Battle of the Somme event in July 2016 in Guildford before a further match v the Bundeswehr was held at Burton Albion and St George's Park to host Men and Women's matches.

Perhaps the biggest occasion was held in November 2018 driven by Chairman Major General "Mitch" Mitchell MBE. Nottingham Forest and Notts County joined forces with the Army in the The Greatest Games of Remembrance, Notts County hosted the

women's match at their stadium in Meadow Lane, and The City Ground hosted the men's match. Over 13,000 spectators attended including many school children involved in Educational Projects commemorating 100 years of the end of The Great War. The initiative raised £50,000 for local, national and international charities supported by the British Army and Bundeswehr.

Army football remains a hub of activity as we continue to return to normality post Covid=19 restrictions. When Billy joined the organisation, emails were in the introductory stage whilst social media was yet to be born. Whether it be the ASCB, Army FA Trustees or the FA Billy has been hugely respected throughout. We wish you every happiness and the best of healthy in your retirement Billy.

The Army Football Association were truly saddened to learn of the passing of *Major (Retd) Mike Crowe MBE*, aged 90 in January. Mike was a stalwart of the Association first becoming involved as the Football Officer of the Queen's Own Highlanders in 1961. He remained involved as a volunteer for over 50 years.

Between 1971-75 Mike was the manager of the BAOR team and took great satisfaction when the British Army team were beaten 2-0 in 1975. In 1980 he was responsible for the Combined Services team in Hong Kong.

During his time in Scotland when Mike was 21 C/OC at HQ Company, The Bridge of Don he developed a friendship with Sir Alex Ferguson who was, at the time, manager of Aberdeen and used to train within the barracks where Mike was responsible for the organisation. They developed a firm friendship. Mike's involvement within Scottish football extended to being made an Honorary Life Member of the Scottish Football Association where he also served as a Council member. Mike retired from the Army in 1986 but always maintained his involvement as a volunteer with the Army Football Association living in Farnham, close to the Aldershot HQ.

He was particularly proud of being invited to become an Honorary Vice President of the Army Football Association in 2002 stating that the appointment was the "pinnacle of a long career in football". Prior to that appointment Mike had been the Secretary of the Massey Trophy for seven years.

However, Mike's first love was the Infantry. The "Crowe" Cup is still competed for on an annual basis at the Infantry Sixes.

Up until three years ago Mike still used to visit the Association offices on a regular basis and was always a welcome guest at staff functions.

Major (Retd) Billy Thomson spoke at Mike's funeral and recalled a story Mike re-laid to him in fondness. He said, "It was when Mike was based in Aberdeen. Sir Alex Ferguson was invited to a dinner night in the Officers Mess. A car was sent to collect Sir Alex and on returning to the mess where Mike was present to greet Sir Alex, he was surprised to see Lady Ferguson sat in the car. Sir Alex got out of the car and Mike boldly went up to him and said, "It's a gentleman's evening Alex". "Unfortunately, Lady Ferguson is not invited". Lady Ferguson returned home and the following day a large bouquet of flowers arrived from Mike and all at the Officers Mess.

Graham Brookland also recalled an occasion when he was Head of Media at Aldershot Town FC and they played Manchester United in the fourth round of the Football League Cup in October 2011. "If you see Sir Alex, please send him my regards and let him know I am still about", Mike asked Graham. United won 3-0 and Graham did get the opportunity to speak to Sir Alex after the match and explains further, "As soon as I mentioned the name Mike Crowe Sir Alex stopped in his tracks holding up proceedings for his live interview with Sky TV. He expressed genuine interest and asked how he could get in touch with Mike. I gave him my business card and within two days a wonderful personal letter from Sir Alex arrived in our Armu FA offices for Mike. The content of the letter was wonderful and showed the obvious affection Sir Alex had for Mike.

# Maj Gen Mitch Mitchell CB MBE

The recognition of "Mitch's" service as our Chairman has been long outstanding as he originally retired from the role on Tuesday 28th April 2020, not long after the outset of Covid-19. Mitch has been an outstanding Chairman of Army Football. Initially becoming involved as a Trustee in 2010 he spent five years as Vice Chairman under General Brealey before becoming Chairman in 2015. He oversaw the Game(s) of Remembrance between 2014 and 18 in particular the momentous occasions in Nottingham commemorating 100 years. As a Trustee, Vice Chair and Chair it has been a truly special period for the association.



A quote I read in Ben Bartlett's book 'Constraining Football' stated, 'Football means searching' (Rene Maric). For me this description aptly illustrates the nature of the game and is particularly suitable for the Army Football Development area of our sport.

For whilst the initial focus on the return to traditional affiliated football has been successful, other areas of football development have changed significantly. Our traditional methods of training and developing our coaching staff for Unit, Corps and Representative teams are no more, and the course content, method of access and the coaching pathway has changed significantly. Online education is the new norm, so we will have to change how we do things to avoid a return to the days of unqualified, poorly prepared coaches with little support or direction just doing the best they can.

We must also embrace the FA concept of participation. This involves us adopting other playing formats such as Futsal, 7v7 leagues, Walking Football and Masters Football; this will ensure we meet the FA's targets on affiliation and player registration, as well as maximising opportunities for all to be involved. The popularity and participation in walking football is increasing nationally. We have an over 35's community eager to still play competitively and remain involved in the game. Futsal provides opportunities in a highly technical environment that will challenge players and coaches, and transfer to traditional formats of

the game. Units may not be able to field 11 players but competitive leagues and cups of smaller numbers of players can be implemented.

The Football Development Manager, Steve Stone, has been advocating these changes for some time now. And with all the adjustments being experienced both internally and externally in relation to Army Football, there are opportunities to move forward and embrace the changes.

Our football community is spread across a large demographic unlike any other County FA. For successful implementation and adaptation, local and regional organisers and leaders will be required forward thinkers who will be innovative, motivated and determined to support new initiatives and work with Steve on these ideas. We need to provide a steadfast, committed volunteer network of coaches, organisers, committees, secretaries and innovators to support and drive new ideas in Army Football Development.

Regards, Jim Lt Col Jim Fallon Now that the FA have taken the organisation and administration of all coaching courses in house, and the County FA's are no longer responsible for delivery and assessment of courses, we can reflect back on the figures for the last version of the FA Level 2 football coaching course.

Despite losing 18 months of courses to Covid restrictions, The Army FA still managed to qualify 93 coaches at level 2. It literally became a race against the FA deadline to get learners over the line but fortunately by the end only 8 learners failed to complete their projects and/or visits before the deadline.

The replacement course for the level 2 is now titled the UEFA C Licence and can be accessed via the FA Boot Room website now.

I have asked the FA if we can host 2 UEFA C courses to allow military personnel to access the course, as it appears that military learners are compromised by not always living and working in the same County when applying on- line to attend courses. At the time of writing, I have had no reply to this request so unfortunately, I can't provide any dates for planning purposes. As soon as I get any further information, I will let you know.

A UKAF, in conjunction with Jersey and Guernsey, UEFA B License course is being held at HMS Temeraire in Portsmouth starting on 25th October 2022. At the time of writing, we had 9 Army applications, successful selection and loading for the course will be decided by FA staff. It is hoped that if the course is successful, we can host the next one for 2023-24 season.

Graham Brookland will be taking over as Secretary of Army Football from 1st August so any new initiatives will be on hold until then.

In total there have been 38 promotions from Level 7 through to 2b during 2021/22.

In addition, there was an upturn in conversions from Trainee Referee to Level 7 after completing five matches upon attending a basic referee courses during the season. They did this by also utilising the Army Sports Control Board (ASCB) Statement of Training Requirements (SOTR) scheme whereby they would receive a full funding of their course upon meeting the criteria set.

Andy Halliday and the Referee Developer Workforce, Si Thorburn, Chris Steadman and Dan Smith have been busy running four more basic referee courses around the country all of which included a small sided competition for the trainee officials to be able to experience first-hand in refereeing immediately. 53 Military personnel have successfully completed their basic referee course this season with 28 already meeting the criteria to receive promotion from 'Trainee' to Level 7.

We were tasked to retain 137 officials from the 2020/21 season and met this with a total of 141.

There are to be changes to the Grassroots Referee Progression Pathway which will be implemented by the Football Association and this will have an effect on Army Refereeing. FA Referees Manager Lou Saunders outlined the new plans at the RAFA Day held in Aldershot in May. There will be more to follow on this, and the Army FA are in a position where it must balance how the foundations can be implemented with the awareness that we have a voluntary structure unlike many counties who are in a position to employ a Referee Development Officer (RDO). The new levels will introduce 5C (L7), 5B (L6), 5A (L5).

There were also changes to the Army FA Executive Referees Committee during the season including the confirmation of a new Vice Chair in WO2 Gaz Dunn (REME). We are also grateful for the role Cpl Dec O'Shea (REME) has played during the season as RDO before stepping down from this position recently.





Congratulations are also due to Committee member and UK Midlands Chair WO1 Bri Slinn (REME) on receiving the Meritorious Service Award in the New Year Honours List 2022.

As we look ahead to the 2022/23 season Capt Steve Finch (RLC) and Cpl Dec O'Shea continue in the Football League. Steve will be approaching 200 professional matches during the season whilst Dec made excellent progress in his first season in the Football League with some fine appointments including the EFL1 match in April between promotion challengers MK Dons v Sheffield Wednesday.

Within the divisions the UK South area saw over 70% of referees officiating on a fixture during the season (either at Unit, Corps or Army level), with the majority of inactive match officials either deployed or tied down with priority work commitments. The UK South committee will ensure that inactive officials are supported on their return to refereeing and provided a mentor report within the first few games back.

Currently there are 40 military referees across the North, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

The UK Midlands has been successful with appointments, development, and promotions but there has been a severe lack of league football in the division. Many Units are preferring to play in the RAF Services Leagues, this is understood to be owing to the increased travel requirements within the Army Midlands Division. Previously, geographically East and West Leagues were in created to counter distances, however, due to reduction in numbers it has returned to a single League format, this is out of the control of the Referees' Committee.

There have been many departures from the Army during the course of the season. These include Sgt Colin Allan (Infantry). Colin became a Referee in 2003 and officiated in the 2014 Army Cup Final. WO2 Chris Bonnar (Infantru) has been an excellent administrator as UK Scotland Secretary for many years. Capt John Brown (Infantry) refereed the 2018/19 Army Challenge Cup Final, W01 Rob Finn (RE) has been a huge influence especially within the UK South mentoring officials whilst also officiating in the 2017 Cup Final and an excellent support mechanism to many. Sgt Craig Jinks (R Signals) has been an Army FA official for over 20 years and provided superb commitment and dedication during this period. He received the Meritorious Service Award in 2013 whilst also being awarded the most prestigious individual honour for an Army Referee in 2017- the Dobsons Trophy whilst representing British Forces (Germany). SSgt Tony Ficetola (RA) became a referee in 2016 and soon progressed to Level 4 whilst being an enthusiastic member of UK North Referees. We thank all referees who have left the services during the past year and wish them well in the future.



# STOKE CITY APPRENTICES STEP INTO A SOLDIER'S SHOES AT PARSONS BARRACKS

Stoke City U18s were put through their paces during last week's visit to Parsons Barracks in Donnington, Telford, where the players participated in a range of team building, problem solving and educational activities.

The event was organised by LFE partners, The Royal Corps of Signals, who are the British Army's information and communication specialists.

While it was a valuable transition event, in which players got a real-life insight and learned about apprenticeships and degree-level funded education and career opportunities, it also served as a personal development and team-building activity.

Under 18's Coach and Player Care Officer Danny Pugh was pleased with how the players adapted to the environment and the impact it had on them as a group:

"I was not sure how they would take to it, but from the start, they were all really involved and threw themselves into it. The staff were excellent with the players, from the way they communicated and their demonstrations. The next day the players were still on a high, talking about the different things they were doing and how each of them coped with each scenario," he told LFE.

On arrival, the players broke off into two teams of five and were taken through six different activities, from dealing with road traffic accidents to coping with the physical demands of carrying heavy rucksacks and working through assault courses. Each scenario demanded leadership to find the best way to solve a situation and Pugh, who kept a close eye on the young Potters throughout, noticed some individuals stepping up.

"The activities encouraged players to take ownership of a situation, organise one another, and give and take orders. Personalities started to come out, they relaxed, and players that you might not see as leaders took control of situations that they would not have at the training ground.

"In a way, it was very relatable to the leadership qualities you need on the football pitch, giving out key pieces of information. It provided lots of different experiences – was very hands-on and they were fully immersed in it.

"I am new to the role, so it gave me the chance to see them in a unique environment and I was really pleased with how they bought into it. They spend five days in the building with us, with a structured routine of football and education, so each day can be very similar for them. This provided something completely different — it got them out of their comfort zones, away from training ground and college, and gave them a real eye-opener."

As part of a wider commitment to transition, LFE offers career opportunities to apprentices through partnerships with external organisations such as The Royal Corps of Signals. Alongside the opportunity to study for qualifications through apprenticeship schemes and degrees in information technology and cyber engineering, The Royals Corps of Signals career pathway also encourages soldiers to pursue their sporting ambitions and hobbies throughout their careers.

The Royal Signals Football Association, for example, is one of the most successful outfits in the British Army, boasting alumni of Scottish and English Leagues, FA Cup and World Cup winners, as well as having a strong representation at both Army and UK Armed Forces level.

WO2 Barry Rizza, who is an ex-Inverness Caledonian Thistle footballer, and WO2 Lee Fraser, are delivering the STEPS programme; an initiative formed to help young footballers transition into an army career using the traits they have acquired during their footballing journeys. Through the partnership with LFE, Barry and Lee visit academies around the country and help organise career events for the players to gain an insight into the opportunities available.

Speaking to LFE about the work he and Barry are doing, Fraser said: "We did a lot of research and we recognised the lack of pathway for released academy players and, from that, produced the STEPS programme that we have been building ever since. The STEPS anagram takes you through what the programme offers: you become a soldier, get trade skills, experiences, personal development and sporting success.

"Our most recent success story is Tom Broadbent, who came to us after being released by Bournemouth earlier in his career. In 2017, he was the left-back in the army football team. He came away from the army with lots of football experience, confidence and was a top athlete, and ended up signing for Bristol Rovers, before winning promotion with Swindon Town in 2020. His journey with the army is fantastic and is a fitting example of the opportunity that we can offer. A lot of young footballers are well equipped for an army career, because of the great work academies do with them from a young age."

And like Pugh, Fraser was delighted with how well the Stoke City youngsters engaged with the activities.

"The career days give the players a really good insight and it was great to see how much Stoke City enjoyed the day," he said. "The feedback has been really positive. They threw themselves into everything and that is something that we find with all of the academy players. The coaches are watching them and they naturally have that competitive edge.

"When we ask them questions, what we usually find is that most do not know about how much sport you can play in the army, the number of jobs there are and we discuss the stereotypes, like how dangerous it is.

"It is not about recruiting soldiers; it is about opening their minds up to different things and getting them away from the training ground environment. We want them to think about a plan B and the importance of having a plan B in their back pocket."

In his new role, Pugh not only looks after the apprentices' football development but also supports released players with their transition via a three-year tracking and monitoring process. Something that the former Premier League midfielder is keen to encourage his young Potters is exploring other interests away from the game.

"We want to make them all professional footballers, but we are aware that that can't happen," Pugh explains. "It is important that these young players understand that there is no harm in having other interests away from football. You have so much time on your hands while you are playing, so using that spare time to explore and make yourselves aware of other things, whether you are going to

stay in football or not, can only be a positive thing.

"We will do things like this, the education side of it, cooking lessons, but also, we are looking at the transitional phase. When they leave the club, whether that is to another team or another career, my role is to help them with that next step. Through the tracking and monitoring, it will be a case of looking at ways we can help them – there is a real sense of responsibility to do that across the board.


"It is something we want to grow over the next few years and events like this tie into that commitment."

Stoke City Apprentices Step into a Soldier's Shoes at Parsons Barracks - League Football Education (LFE)

on 22 March 2022





Football will attend, and aid in forming a Committee We are, dear Sir, The original minute from the first ever Army FA meeting in 1888.







The Army FA has a long and distinguished history. Since its inception, records have been kept as well as a multitude of artefacts, many of which are of historical significance from both a football and military perspective. Whilst the documentation and the artefacts have been safely maintained and stored, they have never been on public display or shared with the wider public and history research community. However, in 2021, Army FA officials Graham Brookland and Billy Thomson sought to rectify the situation.

In the first instance they sought out colleagues from the Football and War Network whom they had developed a working relationship that originated from the Games of Remembrance in 2018. Following a number of preliminary discussions between Graham Brookland and Dr Alex Alexandrou, Chair and Co-Founder of the Network, Alex visited the Army FA headquarters in Aldershot in August 2021, to examine the historical artefacts and documentation, as well as meet the Army FA team.

It is fair to say that Alex was blown away by what he was shown. He immediately recognized not only the historical significance of the documentation and artefacts but also agreed with Billy and Graham that a significant project had to be developed from a number of perspectives that included: preserving, digitizing and archiving minute books, Army FA Challenge Cup Final programmes and other documentation dating from the late 1800s onwards; organizing, documenting and cataloging photographs, pennants, trophies, medals and other artefacts; developing exhibitions based on the artefacts and documentation; developing a webbased resource platform that will act as a research tool for historians and members of the public;

as well as creating school-based and veterans engagement projects. Further vindication of the significance of the artefacts and documentation came in the form of Alex's son, Louie, who was fascinated by what he saw, read and touched. Thus, giving credence to the aim of engaging young people in relation to the history of the Army FA.

Following this initial meeting and viewing, it was agreed that Alex be tasked with connecting with Network colleagues with expertise in key areas who could further advise on all aspects of the proposed project. This led to a number of meetings and visits in the year to date. The first visit was by Dr Alex Jackson, a curator from the National Football Museum, who examined the documentation and artefacts with his expert eye. He advised the team on issues such as preserving, digitizing and storing the fragile and faded 19th and early 20th Century documents, preserving and displaying artefacts made from fabric; how to maintain the trophies, as well as ideas and topics for exhibitions and community engagement activities. Alex went away and compiled a comprehensive report with his observations, thoughts and recommendations, which would prove to be very beneficial in further developing the project.

Alex Alexandrou then facilitated a visit by the Army FA team to Exeter City with Dr Will Barrett acting as the club host. Will has played a pivotal role in developing the club's history from being hidden out of sight in boxes in a cupboard, to turning the whole of the St James Park stadium into a museum that is open to all and has at its heart not only telling the wonderful history of the club in every nook and cranny but also heavily engaging with the local community.

Will spoke about how the club achieved this transformation in partnership with the University of Exeter supported by a number of National Lottery Heritage grants, explaining the grant application process and the importance of community engagement activities. The Army FA team came away extremely impressed by what they had seen and heard, which has enabled them to develop ideas about how to create exhibitions from the various artefacts at their disposal. Will then visited Aldershot to examine the documentation and artefacts and give his expert advice and guidance as to how to further develop the project. His observations were extremely beneficial from a number of perspectives and are being acted upon.

Based on the advice and guidance of Alex Jackson and a briefing paper he had produced, the Armu FA team along with Alex Alexandrou then made contact with colleagues at the National Army Museum. This led to Dr Glyn Prysor, Director of Research and Dr Tasha Swainston, Archivist, hosting the Army FA team and Alex Alexandrou at the Museum. It was a very positive meeting and it was agreed that the National Army Museum would become a partner in the project. This will entail preserving, archiving, digitising and storing key documentation; preserving and exhibiting key artefacts; developing an online open access research resource; developing seminars, talks and school and community-based projects. Following on from this meeting, Glyn and Natasha visited Aldershot to view the documentation and artefacts. They advised on how to catalogue each item, as well as explaining how they would preserve, archive and sore individual documents and artefacts at the Museum.

Since that visit Alex and Gill Jones have meticulously sorted and catalogued each item by subject, date and type of document and artefact, as well as the condition of them. This task has now been completed and the inventory sent to Natasha who will now begin the acquisitions process in relation to the transfer of documents and artefacts to the Museum.

We are now entering the next phase of the project which will firstly, seek and bid for grant funding from both internal and external sources. Secondly, develop topics for exhibitions both at Aldershot and at the National Army Museum.





A poignant occasion in the Royal Signals calendar was held in May with the final of the McBean Trophy. Originally the Signallers Cup the competition was renamed in 2017 after Major Tony McBean; a brave and gifted goalkeeper who was involved within the Corps football team for over 20 years. Tony tragically lost his life in 2016 to motor neurone disease but remained involved and embraced his role with enthusiasm and passion until the end.

is Royal Signals football to celebrate that we are once more playing The Soldiers' Game at a cracking venue and between two excellent sides. He will be watching as ever, in a black and white shirt all the while exhorting the keepers to be braver while nodding and saying 'quality' under his breath when they are.

Tony's family were in attendance as guests for the final where 11th (Royal School of Signals) Signal Regiment were the victors in the final defeating 216 (PARACHUTE) Signal Squadron 4-1 played at Tamworth FC.







To mark the 150th year anniversary of the FA Cup. A Generations Cup competition was formed to include all the 15 teams that took part in the competition 150 years earlier.

The Royal Engineers were placed in Group A alongside The Civil Service and Clapham Rovers.

The games were played at the home ground of Reigate Priory FC in Surrey, a fitting venue for the competition. Which is the oldest known football pitch in Great Britain.

The Generation Cup came with a set of rules which meant all different age ranges would feature on the pitch at any one time. 3 under 30's 5 30 - 50-year-olds and 3 over 50's had to be on the field of play at any one time. Although some sides took these rules as relaxed. In true Sapper fashion REAFC stuck to these rules firmly.

The first Sapper fixture was against Clapham Rovers. REAFC coming away 5-2 winners after Clapham took an early 0-2 lead. The second fixture saw The Civil Service win 3-1 win. A great fixture which could've gone either way. A truly great occasion to be part of. The winners of the group would then go on to the final at St George's Park a few months later. Unfortunately, REAFC missed out on goal difference.

But not all of them.....

Winners from Group C were Crystal Palace and Group B Upton Park. Due to unforeseen circumstances, Crystal Palace were short of a couple more "experienced" players. Up stepped REAFC Club Manager Major Si Mayers and former player Jamie Scarisbrick. Si and Jamie played both fixtures for Crystal Palace on the main pitch as St George's Park. The Sir Bobby Charlton pitch as it's called is the exact replica to the pitch at Wembley and is utilised by the English National teams when they train in Burton before a fixture.

Crystal Palace went on to win the Generations Cup with 5-0 victory over The Civil Service and a closely fought battle against Upton Park saw them lift the trophy after a 1-0 win.



2022 marked the 150th year of the Football Association (FA) Cup. The oldest and most famous cup competition in the world. Very few are aware that The Royal Engineers participated in the first ever FA Cup competition way back in 1872, reaching the final but unfortunately suffering a defeat to Wanderers FC on the day. Three years later, The Sappers got their hands on the FA Cup after a 2-1 victory over Old Etonians FC in the 1875 final.

To celebrate the anniversary of the competition, two members of The Royal Engineers Association Football Club (REAFC) were invited as guests of the FA to Wembley Stadium to watch the final. Furthermore, Colonel Alan Mason, then Club Chairman of REAFC was given the honour of walking the FA Cup out onto the Wembley pitch before the kick-off of the final between Liverpool and Chelsea.

The idea was for the Chairman's of Wanderers FC and REAFC to both walk out before kick-off carrying a trophy each. Wanderers carrying out a replica of the FA Cup they won 150 years earlier and REAFC to carry out the current trophy which Liverpool would go on to win a few hours later. A fantastic day for both members of REAFC (Col Alan Mason and Sgt Matthew Kenny) and for them to celebrate the proud history of an amazing football club.









On the 14th May 2022 I was honoured to represent the Army FA at the 150th Emirates FA Cup Final at Wembley Stadium as part of the medal award ceremony, this was extra special for me being a lifelong Liverpool fan.

The time had now come to walk up the famous steps to the Royal Box to hand over the medals to HRH the Duke of Cambridge. A truly great day that will live long in my memories.
