This new NSPCC learning resource supports sport and recreation organisations in their safeguarding responsibilities towards deaf and disabled participants.

Safeguarding deaf and disabled children in sport is a multimedia resource that will help you to:

- understand what may prevent the inclusion of deaf and disabled participants in your sport, and their additional vulnerability and needs
- consider ways they can be more effectively included and involved
- provide practical guidance for coaches and others providing activities
- ensure that all policies and processes safeguard and respond to the needs of this group
- provide flexible training, presentations and other learning opportunities to managers, staff and volunteers.

- DVD featuring sports/disability scenarios with expert commentary, and interviews with young disabled athletes
- Film clips to highlight issues and questions common to sports
- Guidance and information to support discussions around these themes
- Information on a range of disabilities and their implications for coaching
- Examples showing how individuals, clubs and other activity providers can adopt practices to safeguard deaf and disabled participants more effectively
