Just like last year, our national 2025 Grassroots Football Award winners will enjoy a once-in-a-lifetime experience, joined by legends of the game. Our glittering Awards Presentation Ceremony will again be held at Wembley Stadium ahead of the Community Shield Final. Throughout the day, we'll be celebrating our amazing volunteers and raising the profile of volunteering in grassroots football.

WHOSE STORIES STAND OUT?

This year, we're looking for those inspiring winners' stories – such as volunteers overcoming obstacles, creating opportunities, bringing football to more players – which can be picked up by the media and inspire a whole new generation of volunteers.

What do they do and who do they do it for?

What difference have they made to other's lives?

What makes them stand out so much for you to nominate them?

How are they making football better for more people?

Have they done something that might be picked up by the media?

As well as using the nomination form, nominators can upload a video to YouTube, Vimeo or similar platform and add the link to the nomination form. There's also a box to add a description of the video.

There are 12 categories for the 2025
Grassroots Awards including the Bobby Moore
Award. People can nominate as many people
as they want, in any categories on the online
portal. County FA staff can also nominate
people for the Awards.

Nominations are open from 28 February to 6 April.

Every County FA then hosts a judging panel which creates a shortlist for their area. Finally, the national judging panel comes together to select the winners from these shortlists.

Remember, the Bobby Moore Award is extra special because it honours the club, league, project, team or individual that represents the spirit of grassroots football in a truly outstanding way.

MATCH OFFICIAL OF THE YEAR

We're looking for a Match Official who:

Is an advocate for inclusivity – making the game welcoming, equal and diverse.

Handles challenging situations – demonstrating composure even when dealing with dissent, discrimination, or high-pressure moments.

Is a role model for other referees – embodying respect, teamwork, and integrity.

Is consistent and reliable – maintaining high standards across all matches.

Encourages a positive matchday experience – for players, coaches and spectators.

Has passion for the game – inspiring others through their infectious enthusiasm.

It's beginning to dawn on me that I've touched lives in a way I didn't realise.

They can be a referee, a referee observer, coach, mentor, developer, appointments officer or any other role in the match official community.

Lorraine's reward


Carrying the Community Shield trophy onto the pitch and placing it on its plinth.

In providing football for over 5,700 players – from u15 to walking football – the League brings a joined-up pathway for players of all ages and abilities, with Respect at the core.

NEW VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

We're looking for someone who's burst onto the scene this year and had a real impact. We want to know about the volunteer who started volunteering in a new role in grassroots football during the 24/25 season.

In particular...

An inspiring individual, young or old. Someone who's immediately had a big impact at a club, league or other organisation. This might include sessional football through and England Football programme such as Just Play, Wildcats, Squad Girls Football or Comets Disability Football.

In Adam's first six months, the club was able to renovate the clubhouse, revamp the kitchen, update the changing rooms and create a new lounge area, and bring in new sponsors.

Make sure the whole space is safe, week in, week out.

Transform poor pitches into good pitches.

Create a playing environment that's always welcoming.

Meet our 2024 winner Arnie Ross

Single-handedly taking care of four different pitch sites for multiple teams, Arnie also runs the clubhouse and finds referees – always with a warm welcome and big smile.

Arnie's reward

Conducting the pre-game pitch inspection with Wembley's Head Groundskeeper.

CLUB OF THE YEAR

We're looking for a club that's done something amazing...for their players, volunteers or beyond. A club that is inclusive and plays a big part in its local community.

In particular...

An England Football Accredited club that's:

Recruited, rewarded or supported volunteers.

Improved its facilities – on the and off pitch.

Secured new funding to make football better for more people.

Grown their offer for more people to enjoy more football at their club.

Utilised FA initiatives like The Greater Game, Just Play, Comets, Wildcats, Squad.

Meet our 2024 winner Anchorians FC

Bringing football to a huge array of players – from children aged 3-18, to men's and women's teams, disability, home schooled, vets and walking teams...the club offers free fitness clubs, free meals and free washing facilities.

Their reward

Paul Merson will be joining the club's charity fund raising match this season.

THE BOBBY MOORE AWARD

This is for the volunteer that represents the best of grassroots football in your county. We're looking for someone or a group of people who is truly exceptional.

What we're looking for...

Someone who's had a big impact over a period of time by:

Retaining, recruiting or rewarding players and/ or volunteers to ensure grassroots football represents its community.

Raising the profile and increasing the accessibility of grassroots football.

Making an impact through grassroots football on issues important in their community.

Meet our 2024 winner Steve Parker

From being a player to manager, to chairperson, Steve has focused on bringing football to absolutely any child. With 39 teams offering male, female and disability football, Crewe has secured its own ground for the first time thanks to Steve's efforts.

Steve's experience

Handing out the winners and runners-up medals to Manchester City and Manchester United's players and coaches after the Community Shield at Wembley stadium.

HOW TO PLAY YOUR PART

Your thanks means the world. And there's no better way to thank our fabulous volunteers that putting them up for a national award.

As a County FA you are best placed to encourage nominations from volunteers, players, clubs and leagues across your county.

Getting the word out

To help you get more people to nominate, you'll receive a press release, a full set of promotional assets and a content plan to help you post on social media.

We suggest the following:

Update your web page with a news story about the Awards.

Post on your social media channels – Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, TikTok and others you use.

Send out emails to your groups.

Use local stories from your area.

Write about the Awards on your County FA e-newsletters and magazines.

Email your working groups and County FA representative.

Approach your local media with press releases.

Print posters around the County FA ground or large clubs in your areas.

Use your County Cup matchday programme insert.

THE JUDGING PROCESS

All nominations for your County will come into an online platform. <u>Click here.</u> Your password will be sent to you separately.

It's important to make sure all the nominations have been verified by your County FA and are with you during the transfer window. This means there are no late entries to consider, and everything is on time.

Use the transfer window to move categories to other County FAs. They will get an email notification when you've transferred them across. This has to be completed by the **09 April 2025**.

Your County should select 12 local winners, one for each award category. These should be chosen by a local panel, selected by your County FA. Please be as diverse and inclusive of your football communities as possible, and remember we're looking for newsworthy winners' stories.

It's your chance to represent the inspiring people who make football happen across your County!

The Judging panel:

We suggest you give your Judging Panel the nominations before coming together.

They can select their top three to bring forward for discussion.

Invite Community Leaders outside of football for their valuable insight and impartiality.

They can select their top three to bring forward for discussion.

And you need to decide what to do if there is a tie break situation.

Good luck and enjoy – we can't wait to hear the inspirational stories you discover this year!
