Competition History



This is the 114th Final of the Hertfordshire FA Charity Cup and the first to take place since 2019

The Hertfordshire FA Charity Competitions have long been an opportunity for the football community in the county to come together to raise funds for worthy local causes and this afternoon's final continues a tradition dating back to the start of the last century.

The proceeds from matches played in these two competitions are collected and distributed to charities nominated by the competition finalists. The top eight clubs in the county (with the current exception of Watford, Stevenage and Boreham Wood) are invited to contest the Charity Cup, with the next sixteen entering the Charity Shield.

The first ever Charity Cup was played in the 1900-01 season and was won by Cheshunt, the first of six victories for the club, the most recent of which was seven years ago. Over the years however the competition has been dominated by four clubs, with St. Albans City, Barnet, Hitchin Town and Bishop's Stortford having secured 83 wins between them.

A victory for St Albans this afternoon would further extend their lead as the most successful club in this competition and take their total to 27. Potters Bar meanwhile will be looking to add their name to the trophy for a second time having previously lifted the Charity Cup in 2007 in what was their only previous appearance in the final.

Today's match will be 45 minutes each way, with kicks from the penalty mark if necessary. Teams may use five substitutes from a list of five provided to the referee before kick off.

The Nominated Charities

This year's competition is proud to be raising funds for two worthy causes nominated by the finalists

Potters Bar have nominated Mayfair Lodge Fundraising Friends, a charity dedicated to supporting residents of a care home in the local area. Their recent fundraising efforts have gone towards the provision of a tea room and dementia garden.

St Albans have nominated Youth Talk, which provides free, confidential counselling services to people aged 13 to 25. Their goal is to provide the best possible mental health support to young people in St Albans and the surrounding areas, ensuring that every young person can talk to someone who can help with whatever is worrying them.

Club Profile Potters Bar Town



The Scholars are aiming to add their name to the Charity Cup for a second time

Formed in 1960 as Mount Grace Old Scholars, referring to the local school, Potters Bar Town have enjoyed a successful 64 years as a club. Nicknamed the Scholars, from their academic roots, Potters Bar Town have progressed on and off the pitch, reaching the Isthmian Premier League in Step 3, to date the best division we have ever played in.

It has been an interesting journey full of twists and turns, from using turnstiles from the old Wembley Stadium in 2007, to improving the main stand at the club following a highly successful FA Cup campaign which peaked when 2,011 fans packed into the Lantern Stadium to see Andy Lomas equalise in the 101st minute against Barnet.

Chairman Peter Waller has been at the heart of the family club since its inception, alongside wife Carole and more recently son Adam. Now under the stewardship of Max Mitchell, the Scholars are in search of their first piece of silverware in Hertfordshire since winning the Charity Cup in 2007, following their Charity Shield successes in 2003 and 2005.

In what promises to be an exciting season, as the club progresses to a 3G pitch, Potters Bar Town are entering a new era with silverware in our sights.

Club Profile St Albans City



Non-league stalwarts have seen highs, lows and some unique moments of football history

Having formed in 1908 our league journey began in the Spartan and Herts County leagues. Both were won prior to the Great War. After the war City joined the Athenian League. Winning that twice in three years was an achievement that paved the way to joining the Isthmian League in 1923. Within a year City were crowned champions of that league too, making us the the first to win the Spartan, Athenian, and Isthmian League championships. By the end of the decade the club had won the Isthmian title on two further occasions. The 1920s could be seen as St Albans City's golden days with three Amateur Cup semi-final appearances also being made.

City achieved just two more top two finishes before, along with Corinthian Casuals, being the first club to be relegated within the newly expanded Isthmian League in 1974. A second relegation was endured nine years later but it proved to be the spark for an upturn in fortunes. City turned to one of their former players John Mitchell to be manager and with two promotions in three years the club was back in the Premier Division of the Isthmian League. City were later denied promotion to the Conference in 1993 after finishing second to Chesham United when they took exception to a 140-year-old oak tree situated within the terrace. The tree was felled in 1998, clearing the way for City to join the Conference South as founder members in 2004 following a play-off victory over Bedford Town.

Having battled against relegation for much of that first season, the Saints, now managed by Colin Lippiatt, gained promotion a year later with victory in the play-off final over Histon. After just one season in the Conference National, we were relegated back to the Conference South, but went down with the highest points total of any side to finish bottom of the Conference since the league added two extra Divisions. Life back in the Conference South was far from easy and in 2011, following a deduction of ten points and a fine of £9,500 for financial irregularities, we were then relegated to the Southern League.

After just three seasons, Graham Golds and Jimmy Gray led us back into the Conference South with a play-off victory at Chesham United. Facing relegation in 2016, City turned to Ian Allinson with the former Arsenal player not only guiding the club to safety but settling in for a six-year stint at Clarence Park. Allinson left the Saints in October 2022 with his replacement, former City player David Noble, leading the club straight into the play-offs. Victories over Chelmsford City and Dartford took City through to the promotion final where a dominant Oxford City side were triumphant, leaving the Saints to settle for another season in the National League South.


