- 322 reports for 21/22 season, compared to 186 for 20/21 season 73% increase.
- Percentage of cases found proven for 21/22 87.9%, compared to 87.6% for 20/21 season.
- Average of 35.2 days from receiving a report to closing the case for 21/22, compared to 34.9 days for 20/21 season.
- We introduced an online witness statement form, which has been shortlisted for the Data & Insight award at the County FA Recognition Awards.
- We created a partnership with Leicestershire Police, so that participants can dual report misconduct to the police, in addition to creating a Discrimination workshop, which has been delivered 3 times reaching over 200 people.
- We joined the Regional Discipline Panel Pilot Scheme in January 2021, which has allowed us to access a more diverse and independent pool of panel members to hear our cases.

PARTICIPATION - FEMALE FOOTBALL

Recreational Football

- Approved, trained and supported 6 new Weetabix Wildcats providers, which
 provides £6,000 additional investment to support the programme, bringing
 the total to 20 Wildcat centres giving girls the perfect environment to get
 into football.
- Approved, trained and supported 4 providers of the new Squad Girls programme, which targets girls aged 12-14, giving girls the opportunity to play football their own way. This has secured £4,000 funding to support delivery of the programme.
- Approved and supported 3 Female only Snickers Protein Just Play providers, giving access to turn up and play football for women aged 16+.

Club Football

- As part of a Club Innovation project, we provided £5,500 to support 11 clubs to start a female team, supporting the development of a Female Pathway to help them maintain their England Accreditation.
- We supported 3 clubs through a Sport England Legacy Fund application, to receive £1,000 each to help develop female football in areas of economical deprivation.

SUCCESSES - FEMALE FOOTBALL

Epworth Forest – Mums Just Play

Epworth Forest applied for and delivered a Snickers Protein Just Play program for mums to have a kick about whilst their daughters were training at the club. The session has seen over 28 ladies attend, with the club now opening the sessions out to the local community. With the success of program, the club have affiliated an adult female team for the first time. They will continue to run the Just Play program for those players who would prefer a more casual football session.

Weetabix Wildcats

Sileby Juniors helped bring the Weetabix Wildcats program to life by allowing us to record a football camp they ran for their Wildcats. The video shows what the Wildcats sessions are all about. Fun, Friends and Football!

The video will help us promote the program across Leicestershire and Rutland to new players and clubs.





PARTICIPATION – DISABILITY FOOTBALL



Total Investment across all disability targeted programmes £5,500

Club Football

- As part of a Club Innovation project, we provided £4,500 of funding to support 6 clubs to start a disability team and support the development of a Disability Pathway, helping them maintain or increase England Accreditation.
- 5 Clubs were nominated to be part of the FA Disability Mentor programme and will receive support from, an appointed mentor as they develop their disability football provision.
- The County FA supported two clubs to apply for £1,000 through a Sport England Legacy Fund application, to help develop adult female disability football in two key areas of the county (City Centre & Loughborough).



PARTICIPATION



- 7 active FA Just Play Centres 3 female targeted centres, and 2 targeted participation of ethnically diverse communities.
- In partnership with Leicester City in the Community, we delivered a summer inner city flexi 11v11 league, targeting ethnically diverse communities – 4 teams and over 80 players participated.
- 51 teams participated in the local qualifying round of The FA Pokemon Youth Futsal Cup.
- We successfully applied for £8,000 to invest into the development of adult male teams across England Football Accredited Clubs.



ENGLAND FOOTBALL ACCREDITATION

Transitioned clubs and leagues from the FA Charter Standard programme to the new England Football Accreditation framework.











SAFEGUARDING



- Following independent assessment by the NSPCC/CPSU, the County FA were deemed to have met all 78 required safeguarding standards.
- Evidence was provided to the assessors which demonstrated the County FA's commitment to embedding safeguarding across the business.
- Several areas of safeguarding practice were identified by the assessors as exemplary. 13% of affiliated clubs with a youth/inclusive offering received a formal safeguarding visit, providing bespoke support and guidance to enhance or develop their commitment to safeguarding Children, Young People and Adults at Risk in grassroots football. Clubs receiving a visit were chosen at random.
- Following the conclusion of the visits, new resources have been produced by the County FA, in response to feedback from club officials and parents/carers, to enable key safeguarding information to be more widely disseminated, including an editable Welfare Officer poster and Safeguarding contact information card.



YOUTH VOICE



Youth Engagement Strategy

The County FA developed a strategic plan to support the engagement of young people within Leicestershire & Rutland by gaining their opinions, to help develop the game. The plan was formed as part of consultation with partners and young people within the county before being signed off by Staff, FA Council and Board of Directors.

LRCFA Young Leaders

As part of our Youth Engagement Strategy, we wanted to appoint a group of Young Leaders to represent the voice of young people within the county. Following an application process we have selected 11 leaders, to work alongside the County FA to help advise and guide our work so that we can support and give voice to young people under the age of 25.



COACH DEVELOPMENT

ENGLAND FOOTBALL

- UEFA B course at Holmes Park with 24 coaches completing the course.
- 6 coach CPD sessions, engaging over 300 grassroots coaches.
- Engaging with over 12 England Football accredited clubs to pilot the support of club bespoke coach development sessions.

REFEREE DEVELOPMENT



- Record 10 Referee Courses delivered (190 referees recruited).
- 8 CPD events delivered, with on average of 25 referees attending, including Premier League referees as guest speakers. Over 200 referees engaged across the season.
- New Referee Call Back Evenings- All new referees returned for one evening to receive additional training post completion of the referee course.
- Weekly fitness training at Holmes Park between May-July preparing for summer fitness tests, with 15 in attending every week.
- U18 survey allowing the County FA to deliver an u18 referee evening, with 28 u18 referees attending. All Under 18 and newly qualified referees now receive a 'yellow referee armband', helping to spread awareness.



REFEREE DEVELOPMENT



- Implementation of the Arising Referee Programme, supporting 15 referees to make the step from youth football to adult football.
- Mentor recruitment with 27 Referee Mentors.
- Observer recruitment with 22 Referee Observers.
- 26 referees promoted within grassroots football, with further promotions to the Championship, National League and National League North/South.





MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TRAINING

- FA funding awarded enabled the County FA to offer training in Mental Health First Aid to grassroots volunteers.
- 25 volunteers attended a one hour 'Introduction to Mental Health' workshop.
- 12 volunteers attended a half day workshop with MHFA England, and are now certified as Mental Health Aware.







- The Leicestershire and Rutland County FA obtained Foundation level of the Equality Standard for Sport.
- The Equality Standard is a framework for assisting sports organisations to widen access and reduce inequalities in sport and physical activity from underrepresented individuals, groups and communities. It is based around two broad themes: developing the organisation and developing the services it provides.
