#### **UPDATE**

In February we delivered 2 courses at The FDC. These courses were part of the January sale promotion where a place on the course was available for £85. The courses welcomed 45 aspiring referees for their face to face training, which has taken our total number

face to face training, which has taken our total number of new recruits to 147 this season. So far, 71 have completed their first 5 matches and qualified as either a Youth Referee or Level 7 Referee.

### **FA GUIDANCE**

## **TREATMENT OF INJURIES**

The safety of the players is of paramount importance and the referee should facilitate the work of the medical personnel, especially in the case



of a serious injury and/or an assessment of a head injury. This will include respecting and assisting with agreed assessment/treatment protocols.

Previously, an injured player who received medical attention on the field of play had to leave before the restart. This can be unfair if an opponent caused the injury as the offending team has a numerical advantage when play restarts.


However, this requirement was introduced because players often unsportingly used an injury to delay the restart for tactical reasons.

As a balance between these two unfair situations, The IFAB has decided that only for a physical offence where the opponent is cautioned or sent off, an injured

player can be quickly assessed/treated and then remain on the field of play.

In principle, the delay should not be any longer than currently occurs when a medical person(s) comes onto the field to assess an injury. The difference is that the point at which the referee used to require the medical person(s) and the player to leave is now the point at which the medical staff leave but the player can remain.

To ensure the injured player does not use/extend the delay unfairly, referees are advised to:





- inform the injured player that if medical treatment is required it must be quick
- signal for the medical person(s) and, if possible, remind them to be quick

When the referee decides play should restart either:

- the medical person(s) leaves and the player remains or
- the player leaves for further assessment/treatment (stretcher signal may be necessary)

The Laws of the Game and FIFA instructions indicate that any player requiring treatment must be given such treatment off the field of play, with the least delay possible being made in the progress of the match.

Referees must follow the instruction below when dealing with injured players:

- Play is allowed to continue until the ball is out of play if a player is, in their opinion, only slightly injured
- Play is stopped if, in their opinion, a player is seriously injured or receives a head injury



After stopping

play for a serious injury or when recognising the need for medical attention to a player the Referee authorises up to two medical representatives to enter the field of play to assess the injury only and arrange for the player's safe and swift removal from the field of play

- Any player bleeding from a wound must leave the field of play. They may not return until the Referee or, if appropriate, 4th Official (where appointed) is satisfied that the bleeding has stopped
- An injured player may only return to the field of play after the match has started
- If play has not otherwise been stopped for another reason, or if an injury suffered by a player is not the result of a breach of the laws of the game, the Referee restarts play with a dropped ball

Where a player has blood on their shirt, shorts or socks the player will be required to change the clothing for clean apparel.

If you have to abandon a match due to a serious injury then please report this to the competition and include the time of the match, score and reason for the abandonment. These situations are never nice to be involved in so please speak to a member of the department if you need any support.

How to identify transphobic

- If someone is questioning the gender of another player

- Inappropriate questions or comments about transgender peoples identity or sex assigned at birth e.g. 'aren't you actually a

Support transgender people on and off the pitch by challenging or reporting any transphobia you have witnessed. Always make sure that transphobic incidents are


reported to your Local FA/ League / National FA to ensure an investigation can take place. These incidents should be taken

TRANSPHOBIC CHANTING AND BEHAVIOUR

It is not your job to determine a player's gender. The FA have a Trans Inclusion Policy, which should be referred to and they will support applications confidentially. Once a player has been given dispensation,

they are permitted to play and should not be barred from doing so.

### **GUIDANCE**

Social media is a large part of 21st century life, with everything from political news, to football videos, to personal thoughts instantaneously available at the touch of a button. This has changed the world of refereeing and the accessibility of referees, so the below guidance is in place to offer some best practice on using social media.

- Good news, positive stories and support of colleagues is encouraged; we can all play a part in raising the profile of refereeing.
- Once something has been said or posted, be prepared to be accountable for it. Avoid commenting on clubs, players, or incidents that you have been involved in.
- Fellow referees and observers, at any level, are considered as colleagues. Remember this when commenting on football. Again, avoid negativity but support and praise is encouraged.
- Remember, if you wouldn't say it in a press conference, don't put it on Social Media!

## **DBS & SAFEGUARDING**

## **ENSURE YOU HAVE THE CHECKS**

Safeguarding children is everyone's responsibility. As a referee you have a responsibility to make the game as safe and enjoyable for everyone.

If you are aged 16+ and officiate in Youth football (including Academy games) you MUST have a valid, in date DBS Certificate. Lasting for a three year duration, a disclosure certificate costs just £10.

Please contact Harvey Newstead to start your DBS process via the whole game system.

You must also ensure your Safeguarding Course is up to date and you can check your expiry date on your Whole Game System under the Learning section on 'My Account'.

## RESPECT THE REF

## **TIM SADLER**

We put some questions to local match official, Tim Sadler, about his experiences within grassroots football, the reasons he loves refereeing and why it is vital to respect the ref:



I love that it keeps me actively involved in football and futsal but also that I have been able to officiate at a much higher level as a referee than I ever would have been able to as a player. I have been lucky enough to officiate nationally on many futsal games and internationally at the Cerebral Palsy World Games in 2015. The support throughout my journey and the camaraderie you grow with fellow match officials and other participants within refereeing is great. I have formed many new friendships for life through being a referee and being a member of the Referee Association.

Refereeing has also taught me many life skills such as leadership, teamwork, people management and how to work under pressure. All of these things I have been able to use in my work life outside of football/futsal.
