INTRODUCTION FROM THE CHAIRMAN



The 2020-21 Season continued to provide us with a variety of unique challenges as the grassroots football community collectively adapted to the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic. But in the face of adversity, it has been humbling to see how the volunteer workforce across the game have adapted to these challenges and ensured that the game was able to restart as safely as possible.

The Association has also had to react to various challenges and changes over the last twelve months, to ensure that the business is able to recover and thrive as we head into the 2021-22 Season.

At the start of the season, the Association had three members of the Board of Directors retiring and three new appointments. Mick Sale retired from Council, Mike Barnard ceased being a co-opted member, and Mark Warren took over as Chairman of our Regulatory Committee.

Two new Directors, Peter Heafield and Keith Halliday, were appointed by Council, and following a thorough recruitment process, the Association were able to secure, as an Independent Director, Mrs Toyin Higgs, who has taken on the portfolio of the Association's Safeguarding Champion.

Sadly, 2020-21 saw us lose three stalwarts of the Association and grassroots football in Staffordshire, in Peter Heafield, Gordon Leadley, and Edward (Ted) Evans. All three will be greatly missed, along with other members of the football family in Staffordshire who we have sadly lost over the last twelve months.

During the pandemic, the Association continued to utilise the Government Furlough Scheme and I must praise my fellow Board Members, the Chief Executive Officer and his staff, for their continued support and efforts which leaves us in an sound financial situation as we head into the 2021-22 Season.

However, on a more concerning note, the pandemic caused serious financial losses at The Football Association, which inevitably had a lasting effect on the County Football Associations with a reduction in funding.

Staffordshire FA had a reduction in funding of almost 30%, which unfortunately resulted in four members of our staff being made redundant.

The pandemic also prevented the Association with our ambitions to purchase and invest in the Yarnfield Football Centre facility, a decision which was not taken lightly, but was made in the best interests of the Association and Staffordshire Football.

In February 2021, the Association went through the FA's Independent Safeguarding Operating Standards Assessment, which was conducted by Girling Hughes Associates. Numerous members of staff and board, including myself, were interviewed at some length and we were all extremely pleased to hear that our Safeguarding Assessment had resulted in the Association having an Unconditional Pass. I was informed that only five County Football Associations had ever achieved this; again well done to all.

By the time you receive these papers the Association will have completed, submitted, and attended an interview on our new 3-year Strategy and Operational Plan 2021-24. We also have work to do to produce the new Code of Governance, and as part of that process we will need to review our Articles of the Association. It is planned that these new Articles will be presented to you for approval this time next year.

In closing my annual report, I can only emphasise the hard work, dedication and support that has been shown by the Board Members, Council, Management Team, Staff Colleagues, and the Volunteer Workforce across Staffordshire—thank you all.

INTRODUCTION FROM CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER



In opening, my best wishes and thoughts go out to all those involved in the Staffordshire Football Family who have been affected by Covid-19. At times like we have experienced over the last twelve months and beyond, it is a cliché to say that football is not important when we put things into context and perspective, and this of course is correct.

Our national sport plays such an important part in the lives of so many people, but along with so many other facets of society, grassroots football has been affected as Government guidelines restricted movement, closed facilities and brought the game to a halt, while every attempt was made to control and reduce the spread of the virus.

We would like to express sincere thanks for what you have done and continue to do as a volunteer, coach, referee, committee member, player, or one of the additional various roles that allows the local game to take place. You have been called into action to get the game back up and running, week in week out, under ever changing Covid-19 regulations and guidelines, and you have adapted incredibly well to the challenges faced.

Whilst we are grateful for the Government support received, the pandemic has had a big financial impact and we need to consolidate over the coming months, but this is no different to other charities and businesses. As such in such unprecedented times, it was critical for us as the Governing Body for the game in Staffordshire to provide leadership, and I was immensely proud of our staff and Board who immediately set about supporting our volunteers and doing everything they could to ensure that the game was ready to return at the earliest possibility.

In times of adversity people come together for the common cause and 'Staffordshire Football' has done just that, proving that united we are stronger and hopefully this can continue moving forward. Football rivalries are important, but it is more important to protect our game so that the local game can be preserved for many years to come.

It's been a tough twelve months but important lessons have been learnt; we were forced to work differently but in many cases this has led to more efficient processes and these improved practices should be utilised as we move forward into a new beginning. Traditions are important, but these should be combined with modern, more efficient ways of working to make things easier and more accessible for our volunteers.

The support received from the Government and The Football Association has enabled us to continue to provide a service to the game; however, like many organisations we have been adversely affected financially by the crisis and we were forced to lose 27% of our workforce. This is never a good situation, both for the effected individuals and in terms of the resource and support that we can offer to the game. However, we aim to rebuild quickly and efficiently, and we are working hard to ensure that we continue to provide a quality service to our football workforce.

We will shortly be announcing our new 2021-2024 Strategy, the theme of which will be Staffordshire Football working together to make our local game stronger, promoting recovery and growth. Thank you to all those that have fed back your thoughts through our consultation process; it is clear that there are certain aspects of the game that you think that we should be focussing our resource on, we hear you and the new strategy has been written with you at its heart. We are committed to supporting the best interests of Staffordshire Football to support, develop and work collaboratively with you all.

On a final note, on behalf of the Staffordshire Football Association, we would like to acknowledge and sincerely thank all the staff and volunteers who contribute to the successful delivery of the game and in turn the many opportunities the game provides at a local level. These individuals have played a vital role in the survival of the game in such unprecedented times and those collective efforts should not be underestimated.

FACILITIES & INVESTMENT



The 2020/2021 season has been another strong season for clubs and partners through securing investment to support a variety of projects. Whilst the season was disrupted by lockdowns and uncertainty of how the season will finish, investment has continued to be secured to help continue to improve facilities for clubs and leagues across the County.

Throughout the last 12 months, continued support has been provided to help ensure Staffordshire's football facilities can be improved. Facility improvements continue to be the Number 1 priority for players, clubs, leagues, coaches, match officials and volunteers, providing a safe, quality environment for players to develop their skills and for clubs and leagues to help provide sustainable football activities for seasons to come. Coupled with the Coronavirus response, over £2.3Million of investment has been brought into the County via projects and supported by the Football Foundation.

Improving facilities for everyone who takes part in the game in Staffordshire remains a key priority for the Staffordshire FA with work continuing to secure funding through the Football Foundation, working with partners to improve football facilities for all players, coaches, volunteers and officials to help enhance their football experience and provide a strong base for the game to develop.


FACILITIES & INVESTMENT



2020/2021 INVESTMENT

With the support of the Football Foundation and Sport England, Staffordshire Football will benefit from several facility improvements to provide new 3G pitches, improved grass pitches, clubhouse upgrades, fencing, storage, and new goalposts. Projects include:

- New full size 3G pitches to be provided at Leek Town FC and Wombourne Leisure Centre.
- New Goalposts, Storage Containers, Security Fencing, Pitch Maintenance Machinery, Car Parks, Portable Floodlights, Changing Room Improvements and Pitch Drainage works have been supported at Shelfield United FC, Four Oaks FC, Eccleshall FC, Abbots Bromley Sports Association, Eastwood Hanley, Hednesford Town Youth, Kidsgrove Athletic Youth, Leek Town Youth FC, Bulls Head Marchington, Chasetown Youth FC, Madeley White Star FC, Kidsgrove Ladsandads, Rocester Juniors FC, Staffordshire FA, Brocton FC, Stafford Rangers Juniors FC, Essington AFC, Ball Green Academy, Waterhouses Junior FC, Burntwood Dragons & Phoenix, Blessed William Howard School, Four Oaks FC, Midland Soccer Academy, Cheadle Town Juniors FC, Holditch Miners FC, Norton Cricket Club & Miners Welfare, Madeley White Star FC, Blythe Bridge Juniors FC, Hanley Town Youth FC, Milford Athletic FC, Stoke Town FC and Stone Old Alleynians.



GRASS PITCH MAINTENANCE FUND



Since 2012, The Staffordshire FA have been providing support to clubs, leagues, Local Authorities, Education sites and other facilities who manage their grass pitches, providing specialist advice in partnership with the Grounds Management Association to volunteer and professional grounds staff. This has involved visiting over 120 sites with over 320 grass pitches.

Following the investment secured in the previous season, a further £213,712 has been secured by clubs during the 2020/2021 season from the Football Foundation, with a total of £308,768 set to be invested into a further 32 pitches in total. Since the launch of the fund, 123 grass pitches have been funded, totalling over £1.495Million that is to be invested over the coming seasons.

The clubs who will be benefiting from this investment which has been secured this season are as follows:

LOCAL FOOTBALL FACILITY PLANS


In December 2020, the Football Foundation released the details of all 318 Local Football Facility Plan across the Country. Local Football Facility Plans are detailed reports that map out the football facilities needed across every local authority area in England. In Staffordshire, our plans were complete in 2018 and we have since been working with The Football Foundation, Local Authorities, clubs, leagues and partners to start to deliver our plans in Cannock & Rugeley, East Staffordshire, Lichfield & Burntwood, Newcastle under Lyme, Stafford, Staffordshire Moorlands, South Staffordshire, Stoke on Trent, Tamworth, Walsall and Wolverhampton.

The Football Foundation, Premier League, The FA and Government have all committed funds to deliver these plans, but we now need to work with Local Authorities and partners to turn them into reality. Over the coming seasons we will continue to work to help deliver these plans, to update and refresh them when the time is right and to bring further investment into the County.

GRASSROOTS FOOTBALL AWARDS



Following on from the nomination process earlier in the year, and a very difficult but rewarding judging process that followed, Staffordshire FA have recently been out and about across the county presenting various individuals and organisations with an FA Grassroots Football Award for the 2020-21 Season.
