





Who Are We

- In 1999 The Preston Soccer Centre was founded, with Sir Tom becoming President in 2005. Our name changed at this time to become The Sir Tom Finney Preston Soccer Centre.
- In 2001 moved to the Cottam Sports Arena/UCLAN Sports Arena
- We are an established and accessible registered children's charity that provides football coaching to all on a weekly basis.
- We are an FA Charter Standard club and a Hub Club working in partnership with the Lancashire Football Association, BUCS and UCLAN.
- 2015 Football activator, funded by FA and BUCS







Who Are We

- In 2014 following the passing of Sir Tom, Graham Alexander became our president and we developed The Sir Tom Finney Football Club as part of Sir Tom's legacy of 'Football For All' and the start of the Hub Club
- The initiative provides the opportunity for children and adults of all abilities to play in a team who were not or are not participating in competitive sport
- 2014, we had 2 teams, 2019/20 season we will have 28 teams
- Our partners are, BRC, Lancashire Constabulary, Preston City Council, Active Lancashire, Lancashire FA, Lancashire Children's

Able Bodied Coaching

We provide:

- Able bodied football coaching on a Saturday morning for girls and boys aged 4-16 years.
- There is a charge of £4 on the day for those who can afford to pay. Those players from disadvantaged backgrounds, who are referred to us by children's organisations or Lancashire Police and refugee children receive free places.





Disability Coaching

We provide:

- Free disability football coaching on a Saturday morning for ages 4-16 years
- Adult PAN Disability football coaching on a Friday evening for age 16 years plus. We have 65 players registered and an average attendance in excess of 35.
- Four adult pan disability teams now play in local competitive leagues. This means an average of 40 players competing. Coaches, kits, pitches and equipment are covered by The Sir Tom Finney Preston Soccer Centre.





Refugee/Asylum Seeker Coaching

We provide:

Football coaching for approximately 30 refugees/asylum seekers who are housed in Preston and are aged between 20 and 52. This is provided free of charge.

Also free coaching for 4 - 16 year olds on a Saturday morning





Competitive Teams

We provide:

- Competitive football in local LFA Affiliated Football Leagues. The Sir Tom Finney FC currently have 2 x U7, 1x U8, 2 x U9, 3 x U10, 2 x U11, 2 x U12, U13, U14, U15 and U16's. This will be developed year on year to cover all age groups and as many teams as is possible, dependent on volunteer coaches, managers and pitches.
- U9 and U11 Girls only teams, new for 2020/21 season
- 4 Disability Adult teams
- Two adult male competitive football teams playing in local LFA Affiliated Sunday Football League.
- An Adult male competitive football team playing in LFA affiliated Saturday League.
- An Over 35's team new for 2020/21 season
- Adult ladies football
 - We have two open-age teams our first team in the NW counties league and our Development team in the Lancashire Ladies league Premier Division.
- Coach and manager qualifications, kits and equipment have been and are all funded. As with the Saturday morning coaching, those players from disadvantaged backgrounds or who are referred to us are afforded free or subsidized places subject to committee agreement.



Volunteer Opportunities

- Due to the inclusive nature, demand and continual need for volunteers, the Soccer Centre actively recruits adult volunteers from a diverse background and then develops those individuals at the Soccer Centre's and Football Clubs cost to become qualified coaches, managers or admin volunteers. The volunteers in turn give up their time in any or several of the above activities.
- We have over 150 volunteers for both the STFPSC and STFFC. Between 37 and 55 of whom are UCLAN students. 60 during 2019/20
- Our Young Coaches Scheme provides the opportunity for participants between the ages of 12-16 to be mentored and gain experience and knowledge in partnership with the Lancashire FA. All expense and fees are covered by the Soccer Centre in return for them volunteering their time.
- Holiday clubs, organised, advertised and run by UCLAN students with support







Volunteer/Student Benefits

- 1) Qualifications = FA Level 1 and 2, UEFA B, Coaching Disabled Footballers, First Aid, FUTSAL Level 1 and 2, Welfare Officer Course
- 2) Students benefited from £7,500 for qualifications, kit and transport
- 3) Putting theory into practice in a well known and respected club, with high standards
- 4) Holiday Clubs
- 5) Experience of Planning, organising and leading sessions and holiday clubs
- 6) Coaching opportunities here and abroad, Challenger, Canada and USA
- 7) Experience of coaching wide range of participants
- 8) Student Coaches get known and obtain further coaching opportunities



The Future

- 1) Regional Adult Disability league run by students and based at UCLAN
- 2) 2 new U7 Teams annually



HOW MUCH DOES SPORT ENGLAND ALLOCATE TO TACKLE INACTIVITY IN ENGLAND?






